

# 500 attend Angus McKay tea

Over 500 people from as far away as Thunder Bay attended the Angus McKay 25th anniversary tea, June 1.

Former teachers and students returned to reminisce over tea served by the school's grade six students. Principal M. Tobin said the tea lasted until almost 11 p.m., with many guests reluctant to leave.

"There were a lot of people who I guess haven't seen each other for a number of years," Tobin said. "We let them stay as long as they wanted."

Highlights of the tea included a 40 page history of the area and some of its families, prepared by grade five teacher Agnes Johnson and her class. The students interviewed a number of area residents to complete the history, which goes back to the Selkirk settlers. Copies are available for loan to the public at the school library and Mr. Tobin said several are already in circulation.

Also on display was a museum of artifacts from the school and area's history. The junior and senior school choirs entertained the guests.

The afternoon session of the tea was opened by River East assistant superintendent John Potter, while assistant superintendent Walter Green opened the evening sessions. Also attending the tea were representatives of two of the oldest families in East

Kildonan, Anne Henderson and Leslie Norman Munroe, as well as the first caretaker at the school, Charlie Gordon. Councillor Anne Jorowski also attended the

tea. Tea convenors were Diane Carroll and Elfrida Schroeder.
