

# DIAMOND JUBILEE OF PROVINCE

## MARKED WITH FITTING CEREMONIAL

**Tuesday a Crowded Day—Color  
Lent Occasion by Transfer of  
Natural Resources to the Pro-  
vince — Local Ceremonies in  
Keeping With Occasion**

Registered by the mercury as the hottest day in the year, reaching the 94 mark, Manitobans celebrated the diamond jubilee of the province with befitting ceremonial Tuesday. A happy climax, too, was given the day's celebrations when Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, prime minister, presented Premier Bracken with a cheque in the amount of \$4,822,840.72, in payment in full of the natural resources alienated by the Dominion government from the Manitoba domain.

### Local Observance

The local celebrations, arranged by a representative committee of East Kildonan residents under the chairmanship of Reeve D. J. Allan, opened with a monster street parade, which formed up in the proximity of Watt street and Munroe avenue and proceeded to Bronx Park. Here a programme was opened with the singing of "O, Canada," after which Reeve D. J. Allan, who acted as chairman, briefly addressed the large assembly. In the course of his remarks, Reeve Allan said the people of Manitoba were not only celebrating the Diamond Jubilee of the province, but also the completion of the Hudson Bay railway, which made Manitoba a maritime province, and the handing over to the province of its natural resources.

Mr. Arnold M. Campbell, president of the Lord Selkirk association, was the other speaker of the afternoon, and gave an historical review of the arrival of Lord Selkirk and his contingents of settlers, remarking that East Kildonan, in addition to celebrating the Diamond Jubilee of Manitoba, was celebrating the 118th anniversary of the arrival of these pioneers. He told the large gathering of the trials and tribulations they went through, including a grasshopper plague and floods, and the feuds which raged between the two trading companies operating in the west at that time.

The addresses were interspersed by some interesting platform attractions, which included a Maypole dance by small girls, under the direction of Mrs. Wallace; the singing by the Ukrainian choir, of about 50 voices, all members of which were residents of East Kildonan, and who sang under the direction of P. Yundack.

Another interesting feature of these attractions was the Highland dancing to the strains of the bagpipes, played by Piper Wray.

A programme of sports was also run off.

In the evening the platform attractions were repeated, with the addition that Ukrainian folk dances also were staged, while the speaker was Rev. R. G. McBeth, who reviewed the history of the province. All the speaking and singing was conveyed to the assembly by means of a large amplifier.
