

East Kildonan City Council History 1960 – 1971

January 1960 – Mayor George Suttie, Aldermen T. Armstrong, E. B. Bodie, S. C. McLeod, J. S. Botterill, E. Rudolph and W. T. Snowdon

January 1960 – E.S. Peever 312 Bronx, A. J. Reid 561 Trent and C. Prevette 665 Munroe are appointed as Citizen Members of the Parks Board.

January 1960 – East Kildonan's share of the Greater Winnipeg Mosquito Abatement District is \$3,400.00 for 1960.

January 1960 – Council is given notice that the River East School Division intends to put a money by-law to the voters for \$945,000.00. The purpose of the by-law is to provide money to build a new collegiate for North Kildonan (River East Collegiate) and an addition to Miles MacDonell Collegiate. The addition to Miles Mac will add 8 classrooms, plus rooms for shops, home economics, library, laboratory and an auditorium/gymnasium. River East Collegiate is to consist of 15 classrooms and rooms for shops, home economics, laboratories, commercial, library and an auditorium/gym. The vote is held on February 9 1960.

January 1960 – The Greater Winnipeg Transit Commission gives notice that it intends to operate a bus route in the Oakland Avenue area.

January 1960 – The East Kildonan School District responsible for Grades 1-9 complains that the River East School Division responsible for Grades 10-12 has not passed on money destined for it. The City of East Kildonan has passed on all the money owing for school purposes to River East which is then to forward a large part of it to the East Kildonan School District. Council has paid \$565,013.24 to be given to the East Kildonan School District to River East but River East has only passed on \$239,287.00 to the East Kildonan School District. River East has put it into the bank, earning interest on the money while the East Kildonan Board has to borrow money from the bank to pay its bills. By Provincial Legislation River East has to pass on the entire amount owing to East Kildonan School Board as soon as it receives it.

January 1960 – Only 24 homes now require the pick up of night soil as all other homes have been connected to the sewer system.

January 1960 – Sand and salt is purchased from the City of Winnipeg for use on a trial basis to deal with the slippery conditions found on Henderson Highway.

January 1960 – There are number of complaints about the large number of dogs running at large in the 900 blocks of Consol and Fleming.

January 1960 – A snow fence is put in front of the Canada Dry Plant on Golspie.

January 1960 – Grey St. is discontinued as a truck route; Gateway Road is made the official truck route for the area.

January 1960 – Council is told that Oakland Ave will only be a transit route until May 15 1960 when McLeod Avenue will be used instead. The bus will travel down McLeod from Henderson to Raleigh, north on Raleigh to Edison then back to Henderson.

January 15 1960 – Wilson Auto Electric Plant opens at 600 Golspie.

January 1960 – Police officers now receive 2 weeks holidays after the first year, 3 weeks after 15 years and 5 weeks holidays for the 25th year only.

January 1960 – A cabinet shop is approved for a home business at 558 Melbourne.

January 1960 – Twenty-four dwellings in East Kildonan are still without sewer services

February 1960 – The Oakview Soda Bar at 817 Henderson plans an addition.

February 1960 – The Victorian Order of Nurses receive a grant of \$750.00 for 1960 and the Industrial Development Board of Greater Winnipeg receive a grant of \$500.00.

February 1960 – East Kildonan now pays \$125.00 per child for children enrolled in the Kinsmen School for Retarded Children up from \$100.00.

February 1960 – Council is to buy 612 Oakview for \$6,100.00 as it intends to eliminate the 600 block of Oakview.

February 1960 – A building permit is issued for the construction of the Munroe Shopping Centre. The shopping centre is to contain 13 stores and construction costs are estimated at \$185,000.00.

February 1960 – The addition to Angus McKay School is to begin in the spring.

February 1960 – Mr. DeGroot of North Kildonan is to be hired as the Poundkeeper of East Kildonan at \$200.00 per month.

February 1960 – The Parks Board budget is set at \$24,215.00 for 1960.

February 1960 – H. Perkalaba of 692 Linden is told to get rid of his 2 horses.

February 1960 – A sand spreader is to be purchased for \$2750.00.

February 1960 – The Radio Oil Refinery is ordered to tear down a building it started construction on, before it obtained a building permit.

February 1960 – Property is set aside for senior citizens housing projects at, Melrose (Kimberly) and Golspie, south side of McLeod at Rothesay, south side of Oakview at Golspie and Consul at Grey. Special attention is given to the Melrose and Golspie site for negotiations with the East Kildonan Kiwanis Club.

February 1960 – The false alarm at Melrose Junior High on December 31 1959 is put down to frost in the bunker oil tanks. The East Kildonan School District is told not to allow the tanks to run down so low to prevent the problem in the future.

February 1960 – Police Patrol Sergeant C. A. Broughton is severely reprimanded, loses pay and is put on probation for one year “for conduct unbecoming of a police officer”.

February 1960 – The establishment of the Millionaires Drive-In is turned down for Henderson and Melbourne.

February 1960 – The resident at 692 Linden is told to get rid of his 2 horses, neighbors complain that the horses are sometimes allowed to roam the area unattended.

March 1960 – The Greater Winnipeg Transit Commission reports a surplus of \$248,348.00 and an increase in ridership of 1,100,000 in 1959 the first increase since 1953.

March 1960 – The River East School Division tells Council that it doesn't have to provide a financial statement to East Kildonan. It claims it is not accountable to East Kildonan or any other municipality. Council tells River East in reply that its lack of cooperation has cost East Kildonan \$12,000.00 in interest.

March 1960 – Council is given notice of Provincial Government legislation to establish a Metro Council.

March 1960 – The traffic lights on Henderson at Munroe, Melrose and Leighton are to be in operation all day Saturday and Sunday.

March 1960 – The YMCA asks East Kildonan for a contribution to its building project. It reports that \$44,000.00 of the \$80,000.00 has already been raised.

March 1960 – The Greater Winnipeg Water District levy for 1960 is \$16,574.78 for 1960.

March 1960 – East Kildonan tells North Kildonan that it has no objections to it extending its watermains beyond the Bergen Cutoff (Springfield Road), once East Kildonan itself is assured of receiving a greater supply.

March 1960 – Permission is given to build row housing on Gateway in the Morse Place District.

March 1960 – Two Police Officers Constables MacKay and Vander Graaf are charged with “conduct unbecoming a police officer” and lose one month’s pay. They were involved on their off hours with 4 others in a fight in the Curtis Hotel Beer Parlor. Constable MacKay threw the first punch after comments were made to him. The manager of the hotel called the police and all 6 men involved in the free for all brawl and they were all taken to the Police Station. All 6 were to be charged with “being disorderly in a licensed premise” but later the charge was dropped. One of the 2 officers Vander Graaf was considered to be too drunk to give a proper statement at the time.

March 1960 – Mafeking Hall is removed from the St. Stephen’s Church grounds and relocated to the rear of Kildonan Hardware at 759 Henderson.

March 1960 – There are complaints of rats in the 600 block of Greene.

March 1960 – A dressmaking business is approved for a home occupation at 603 Fleming.

March 1960 – Some Council Expenditures for 1960

March 1960 – Don Nightingale of 471 Linden is appointed as East Kildonan’s Citizen Member on the newly established Regional Library Board.

April 1960 – East Kildonan is to levy \$187,705.69 for the River East School Division and \$478,845.37 for the East Kildonan School District.

April 1960 – East Kildonan is to increase its contribution to the East Kildonan Kiwanis Club Dental Clinic for children to \$700.00. The East Kildonan School District and the East Kildonan Kiwanis Club are to contribute \$400.00 each.

April 1960 – East Kildonan is to contribute \$5,300.00 to the community clubs.

April 1960 – Mill rates for 1960

General Municipal Rate – 7.2 Mills

Debentures – 6.0 Mills

Parks Board - .75 Mills

Sewer Districts 1 and 2 – 1.6 Mills

Sewer Districts 3 and 4 – 5.5 Mills

April 1960 – T. Meyer is keeping a coyote as a pet at 361 Oakview. Twenty-one residents complain about the constant howling and the smell from the back yard. There is no back fence but some people come into the backyard to take pictures of the coyote. One woman complains her daughter was bitten by the coyote. The coyote sometimes escapes from the back yard and roams the area. There are reports of it been seen as far away as Watt and Stadacona in Elmwood. Area residents fear the animal might bite their children.

April 1960 – The East Kildonan Kiwanis Club is given permission to erect a sign on Henderson near the northern boundary similar to the sign at the southern boundary welcoming drivers to East Kildonan.

April 1960 – Council is told that the feature race at Assiniboia Downs on August 3 1960 will be called the City of East Kildonan Handicap.

April 1960 – Residents complain that the yard at 584 Oakland is full of old cars, lumber and other junk.

April 1960 – Robert Gray a Public Safety Clerk resigns to join the RCMP.

April 1960 – Public Works employee L. Perehinchuk passes away.

April 1960 – Council contributes \$25.00 to the Morse Place Playground “B” Hockey Team for a banquet. The team in the first year of existence won the Divisional Championship, Suburban Championship and the Greater Winnipeg Championship.

May 1960 – Kiwanis Club of East Kildonan brings forward a proposal to build a senior citizens housing project at Melrose (Kimberly) and Golspie.

May 1960 – James P. Beekenkamp is hired as a Police Clerk at a salary of \$150.00 per month.

May 1960 – J. Wenzoski is appointed as the Acting Foreman during the illness of F. Cockriell at an extra 10 cents per hour.

May 1960 – East Kildonan is to spend \$200,000.00 on lane paving and \$50,000.00 on street paving in 1960.

May 1960 – Constable Gilmore is suspended as he is convicted under the Highway Traffic Act. Constable W. S. Chimilar is promoted to the rank of Patrol Sergeant.

May 1960 – Council attempts to buy 614 and 656 Oakview.

May 1960 – The rental payment for a Peacetime Home at 472 Sydney is \$47.50 per month.

May 1960 – Two engineering students are to be employed for summer survey work at \$240.00 per month.

May 1960 – Council describes 692 Linden as a “rat cafeteria”.

May 1960 – St. Alphonsus Church is to place swing and other children’s play structures on City property at the northwest corner of Roch and Munroe.

May 1960 – Mrs. M. Ruta of 344 Hazeldell claims the coyote at 361 Oakview mauled her 3-year-old boy. Mrs. Gatland of 356 Hazeldell tells Council the coyote bit a child in Elmwood as the animal is frequently running at large dragging a rope with a stick attached to it from its frequent escapes.

May 1960 – Council is told of plans to shut down the Roxy Theatre and turn it into a bowling alley.

May 1960 – Public Works Foreman Frank Cockriell passes away.

May 1960 – East Kildonan is to spend a total of \$440,385.31 on its capital works budget.

May 1960 – East Kildonan's population is now 25,937 up from 23,607 in 1959.

May 1960 – The lane north of Simpson is paved between Gateway and Grey.

May 1960 – Some residents in the area of Larchdale have their basements flooded by sewer back up caused by high water levels on the Red River. The sewers in this area are drained through North Kildonan's sewer on Hawthorne Avenue and the residents and East Kildonan Council blames North Kildonan for not using their pumps. North Kildonan refuses to take any responsibility for the water damage.

May 1960 – Water standpipes are removed from the 800 block of Nottingham and from the corner of Moncton and Besant.

May 1960 – A petition is received for a boat launching dock at the north end of Fraser's Grove Park.

May 1960 – Rat traps are set up in the 600 block of Greene.

May 1960 – Paving plans include

1. Brazier from Colvin to McLeod
2. Raleigh from Munroe to Melrose
3. Dundoon from McLeod to Oakland
4. Besant from Munroe to Simpson
5. Maxwell Place

May 1960 – No parking signs are placed on the east side of Watt from Trent to Helmsdale.

June 1960 – A crosswalk is established at Montrose and Watt

June 1960 – A proposal is brought forward for 2 apartment blocks on the east side of Watt St. between Dunrobin and Helmsdale.

June 1960 – Permission is granted for a large property for sale sign on the west side of Watt between Dunrobin and Helmsdale.

June 1960 – Sprinkler regulations are again in effect for the summer of 1960.

June 1960 – Population of East Kildonan by ward

June 1960 – There are complaints about weeds growing behind the Loblaw's store on Henderson Highway.

June 1960 – A Laundromat is to be built on the east side of Henderson at Roberta.

June 1960 – Constable Chranowski resigns to move to California.

June 1960 – The cost of street or lane paving is \$4.84 per square yard.

June 1960 – Residents of 693, 695 and 697 Linden complain about the manure and stench at the Perkolaba residence at 692 Linden. His 2 horses are not tied up and they wander at large throughout the area, often on the grounds of Neil Campbell School.

June 1960 – The Radio Oil Company is again constructing a building on its property without a building permit enraging Council.

June 1960 – The garbage disposal contract to East Kildonan Cartage is raised to \$175,500 for the final 4 years of the contract. The original contract was \$156,000.00 for 5 years but East Kildonan Cartage has lost \$9,120.89 on the first year of the contract.

June 1960 – Grants to Community Clubs

Bronx Community Club - \$1,060.00

East End Community Club - \$690.00

Melrose Community Club - \$1,660.00

Morse Place Community Club – \$1,660.00

Roc-Lin Community Club - \$230.00

Total - \$5,300.00.

June 1960 – L. V. Cann is hired as a Constable.

June 1960 – Plans are submitted for the Rossmere Shopping Centre.

June 1960 – The estimated cost of building the Incinerator building (Terry Sawchuk Arena) is \$106,000.00.

June 1960 – T. Samila of 656 Oakview and J. Korolyk of 614 Oakview are invited to take lots on the north side of Dunrobin in the 600 block as East Kildonan does not intend to construct sewer and water on the 600 block of Oakview.

June 1960 – The City Solicitor Fraser Campbell is to receive a retaining fee of \$3,000.00.

June 1960 – St Stephen's Church receives permission to build a new church building.

June 1960 – The lack of on site parking at Rossmere Golf and Country Club has cars parked on local streets, back lanes and even on private driveways. One local resident complains that strangers park on his driveway on a regular basis when they are golfing at Rossmere. Rossmere announces plans to build a much bigger parking lot.

June 1960 – Council is told that they must enact a by-law to prohibit wild animals such as coyotes from being kept as pets. There are more complaints from residents about the coyote at 361 Oakview.

June 1960 – Lanes are paved between Montrose (Larsen) and Bowman in the 500 block and between Moncton and Government in the 900 block.

June 1960 – Rossmere Golf and Country Club considers developing its property between Roch and Brazier north of Colvin (Pleasant Bay) and along the 500 and 600 block of Roberta.

June 1960 – Plans are submitted to council for the development of Rossmere Shopping Centre.

June 1960 – A hair dressing license as a home occupation is approved for 349 Dunrobin.

June 1960 – Old Polson School closes for the last time on the south side of Munroe.

June 1960 – The Salvation Army is given a grant of \$250.00 for 1960.

July 1960 – Stop signs are placed on McLeod at both Roch and Golspie.

July 1960 – The resident at 361 Oakview tells Council he intends to move out of East Kildonan taking his coyote with him.

July 1960 – A grant of \$100.00 is given to the Canada Centennial Committee.

July 1960 – The southeast corner of Dunrobin and Watt is considered as a commercial site.

July 1960 – East Kildonan is to provide a grant of \$550.00 per unit to the East Kildonan Kiwanis Club in order for the Club to build senior citizen housing at the southeast corner of Melrose (Kimberly) and Golspie.

July 1960 – The estimated cost of paving Gateway from the City of Winnipeg boundary to the northern boundary is \$118,000.00.

July 1960 – A resident at 315 Greene has a clothesline in their front yard instead of the backyard as required by law.

July 1960 – A proposal to build a Husky Service Station at Munroe and London is made.

July 1960 – East Kildonan takes 1000 postcards from the Metropolitan Civil Defense Board re Your Basement as a Bomb Shelter.

August 1960 – East Kildonan proceeds with the buying up of all property on the north side of Oakview between Golspie and Raleigh.

August 1960 – E. Snow is fired from the Public Works Department for not doing his job as required and for his disturbing influence on other employees and telling the Chief Constable to go to hell.

August 1960 – Mr. E. J. Smith resigns from the Office Staff.

August 1960 – Litter cans are placed on the southeast corner of Moncton and London, the north east corner of Munroe and Grey, the west side of Watt at Bowman and the west side of Watt at Jamison.

August 1960 – The east lane of Watt is to be asphalted from the southern limits to Washington.

August 1960 – There are complaints that the St Alphonsus Parish Grounds are too small to be playing baseball on.

August 1960 – East Kildonan passes 1000 days without a fatal traffic accident.

August 1960 – Radio Oil Company plans to build a service station at Munroe and Golspie.

August 1960 – A dressmaking business is approved for a home occupation at 217 Trent.

September 1960 – Melrose (Kimberly) is to be paved from C.P.R. tracks to Birds Hill Road (Molson)

September 1960 – Gateway, Melrose, McLeod along with Henderson Highway are to be placed under the Metro Winnipeg Street system. East Kildonan's Assessment Services are taken over by Metropolitan Corporation.

September 1960 – Council is to buy 614 Oakview for \$5,000.00 and 656 Oakview for \$6,000.00.

September 1960 – East Kildonan's equalized assessment is now \$34,596,000.00.

September 1960 – Two apartment blocks are proposed for Watt and Helmsdale.

September 1960 – Residents complain about a sidewalk just built across the playing field of Bronx Park. Council orders it to be removed.

September 1960 – Traffic lights are to be installed on Munroe at Roch, Brazier and Gateway at a cost of \$2035.00 at each site.

October 1960 – Council approves the construction of a new building for Wesley United Church at Golspie and Melrose (Kimberly).

October 1960 – The rental fee for use of the Council Chambers by outside groups is set \$17.50 per meeting.

October 1960 – A vicious dog at 609 McLeod bits 6 children and children attending the kindergarten at 613 McLeod are terrified to go to and from the house by themselves.

October 1960 – A Laundromat is approved for 451 Watt.

October 1960 - The new Metro Council designates a new bridge over the Red River near Douglas Avenue in North Kildonan as # 4 on the list of priorities for new bridges. (The Peguis Bridge is not built until the late 1980's)

October 1960 – The official opening of Disraeli Freeway is held on October 19

October 1960 – J. Wenzoski is appointed Assistant Foreman of the Public Works Department.

October 1960 – Engineer J. W. Battershill backs into a cruiser car parked at the rear of the City Hall causing \$400.00 in damage. The Police are told not to park behind other parked cars but park in one of the vacant stalls.

October 1960 – Miss Carole Kolbeck is hired as the Switchboard Operator at \$160.00 per month.

October 1960 – Mrs. H. J. House of 497 Oakview complains that the house immediately opposite her house has a 4-room suite in the basement.

October 1960 – J. Tomkin is hired as a Truck Driver and P. Seniuk is hired as a Machine Operator in the Public Works Department.

October 1960 – R. Wall is given a home occupation license for an accounting business.

October 1960 – Council is told that indeed there is a 4-room suite in the basement of 490 Oakview, which is contrary to the zoning regulations.

October 1960 – A television repair business is approved for a home occupation at 900 Moncton.

October 1960 – The trolley bus poles are being removed from Henderson Highway, as the East Kildonan bus service is now entirely a diesel bus service running over the Disraeli Freeway as of October 23.

October 1960 – The Post Office announces plans for an East Kildonan Post office at Henderson and McLeod.

October 1960 – The Royal Bank of Canada opens its first branch in East Kildonan on Henderson Highway.

November 1960 – A dairy farm near Hampstead School is approached to cease operations.

November 1960 – The contract for the incinerator building is given out for \$102,596.00 and the plumbing and heating contract is given out for \$8,771.00.

November 28 1960 – The official opening of Miles MacDonell Collegiate new addition takes place at 8 PM.

November 1960 – The area east of Neil Campbell School is considered for a new recreational area for spectator sports. The 600 blocks of Hazeldell and Oakview are to be officially closed east of Golspie.

November 1960 – The total cost of the East Kildonan Kiwanis Club senior citizen housing project at Melrose (Kimberly) and Golspie is \$89,000.00 with the Province paying \$53,000.00 of the cost.

November 1960 – Thomas Fenn retires after being employed by East Kildonan since 1932. W. H. Piper retires after being employed since 1920. Both men are being retired, as they are both now 71 years old.

November 1960 – N. Sednyk is fired then reinstated on appeal.

November 1960 – The plans for the Rossmere Shopping Centre are approved.

November 1960 – The owner of the dairy farm near Hampstead School agrees to close it down and sell his cattle.

November 1960 – City Council requests that the Watt St. bus service to be improved.

November 1960 – Council considers buying the site of the old Polson School on the south side of Munroe for a new police/fire station.

November 1960 – A watermain is to be constructed on Roch from Colvin to Leighton.

December 1960 – The budget for the Henderson Regional Library is set at \$33,485.00, East Kildonan's share is \$18,892.50.

December 1960 – Business ceasing operation in 1960 include
IGA Store at 477 Henderson
Kildonan Decorating at 841 Henderson
Gordy's Cycle and Sporting Goods at 855 Henderson
Sherwood Paint at 917 Henderson
Arrow Transit Lines at Watt and Ottawa

December 1960 – River East School Division tells council it wants to take over Melrose Junior High as space for an expanded Miles MacDonell Collegiate. A new site being looked at for a new junior high, is at Brazier and Leighton on land owned by Loblaw's

December 1960 – The East Kildonan Public Safety Division (Police/Fire) sets height and weight standards. All men must be at least 5 feet 9 inches and weigh at least 165 pound. The maximum weight allowed is 195 pounds.

December 1960 – Pay scale for the Municipal Auditor and his staff

December 1960 – An 18-suite apartment block is to be built at the northeast corner of Watt and Dunrobin.

April 1961 – The lane between Consol and Simpson from London to Besant is paved.

April 1961 – The caretaker at City Hall is fired for being under the influence of alcohol. Mr. J. P. June 1961 – The lane between Sydney and Neil is paved from Roch to Watt.

June 1961 – The wage rate for welders working on the incinerator under construction is \$2.80 per hour.

June 1961 – The Kildonan-St. Paul Health Unit announces its plans to move into the second floor of the East Kildonan City Hall.

June 1961 – Council ups its offer to Mr. Samila of 656 Oakview to \$8,000.00 for his property.

June 1961 – Mrs. E. G. Coutts is hired as the Switchboard Operator and person responsible for the Manitoba Hospital Service Plan premium collections at \$200.00 per month replacing Mrs. Micklash. Miss Carol Kolbeck is promoted to the position of Cashier.

June 1961 – The exterior of City Hall and the main floor of City Hall is to be painted at a cost of \$895.00.

July 1961 – There are more complaints about Mr. Hunt at 360 Hazel Dell again using his backyard as a loading and unloading area for his business.

July 1961 – East Kildonan decides to build a 16 inch watermain on Raleigh from the southern limits to Melrose (Kimberly).

August 1961 – West Kildonan asks council for the possibility of using the incinerator for its garbage. It is to open officially on September 13 1961 at 7:30 PM.

August 1961 – One hundred and thirty street signs are purchased for new streets at a cost of \$11.35 each.

August 1961 – Council decides to buy some new fire hydrants at a cost of \$215.00 each.

August 1961 – The sewer and water project on Gateway Road from Simpson to Melrose is to cost \$2336.00.

August 1961 – There are traffic problems with parking at Watt and Melrose (Kimberly) with cars backing into traffic on Watt.

August 1961 – Council is told that 18 storm sashes at City Hall will have to be replaced, as the wood is rotten.

August 1961 – East Kildonan is to charge North Kildonan \$200.00 for fighting the fire at the A. A. DeFehr Furniture Manufacturing Limited at 400 Edison, East Kildonan crews were at the fire for over 5 hours.

September 1961 – A day nursery is approved for the basement of 349 Chelsea.

September 1961 – The home at 916 Connery is placarded as being unsanitary and is to be torn down.

September 1961 – No parking signs are to be placed between Leighton and Greene along side Angus McKay.

September 1961 – The Canadian census records East Kildonan's population as 27,174.

September 1961 – Red River Co-Operative Supply announces the formal opening of its store on September 13 1961. It organizes a parade starting from Munroe and Roch at 7:30 PM running along Henderson to its new store on Henderson Highway.

September 1961 – There are complaints that the ice cream truck is ringing its bell too frequently especially when it is parked.

September 1961 – William Trowell is hired as a Mechanic for the Public Works Department at a salary of \$325.00 per month. Lyle McNairn is hired as a Helper at the City Incinerator at a salary of \$250.00 per month.

September 1961 – A front-end loader is bought for the Incinerator at a cost of \$8,765.00.

September 1961 – J. W. Battershill is to be placed on full retirement as of December 31 1961 as he is relieved of his consulting duties.

September 1961 – East Kildonan contemplates the construction of pavement on Melrose (Kimberly) from Gateway to Birds Hill Road (Molson).

September 1961 – There are complaints about the pollution arising from the burning of garbage at the incinerators of the Lady Dale Apartments at 760 Watt and the Lady Robin Apartments at 770 Watt.

September 1961 – Three Public Safety Department Officers were ordered to lose weight
Patrol Sergeant C. A. Broughton was 275 pounds he is now 235 pounds
Constable R. C. Bowman was 253 pounds he is now 239 pounds
Constable A. A. Sorokowski was 238 pounds he is now 225 pounds

September 1961 – East Kildonan's equalized assessment is now \$36,771,000.00.

September 1961 – The lane between Oakview and Dunrobin is paved from Golspie to Raleigh.

September 1961 – There are complaints about the hours of operation of the Husky Service Station at Munroe and London. Residents want the hours of operations curtailed.

September 1961 – An application is made by East Kildonan to the Federal Winter Works program to build a watermain on Raleigh from the southern boundary to Melrose (Kimberly) at an estimated cost of \$88,000.00.

October 1961 – The 2 cruiser cars purchased in April 1961 already have 57,000 miles and 46,000 miles on them. The chief constable asks for them to be replaced.

October 1961 – Council is to buy 1,000 cubic yards of crushed gravel at \$1.60 per cubic yard.

October 1961 – Dr. E. J. Rutledge the Medical Officer of Health for the Kildonan-St. Paul Health Unit is to retire at the end of the year.

October 1961 – Mr. John F. Roche is hired as an Engineering Department employee at a salary of \$275.00 per month.

November 1961 – The YMCA hold a meeting in the Melrose Auditorium (Miles Mac's Gym B) showing its plan for the new swimming pool and building.

November 1961 – Local residents ask for a 4-way stop at Leighton and Watt but council turns down the placing of stop signs on Watt.

November 1961 – James G. Smith representing Wesley United Church at Golspie and Melrose (Kimberly) asks that it only be assessed for the sidewalk on Golspie not the one on Melrose but Council says no.

November 1961 – Birds Hill Road is now called Molson or Panet Road in East Kildonan.

November 1961 – Mr. and Mrs. B. Kirkhope of 208 Roberta complain that their fence has being broken numerous times from cars backing up from the Laundromat at 897 Henderson.

November 1961 – The cost of running the Metro Sewage Disposal system is expected to cost \$752,000.00 in 1962, East Kildonan's share of the cost will be \$30,531.20 in 1962 up from \$19,240.50 in 1961.

November 1961 – The Red River Co-Operative Drug Department in the Rossmere Shopping Centre is appointed a water collection agency for East Kildonan.

November 1961 – Patrol Sergeant C. A. Broughton is now down to 232 pounds, Constable Bowman weighs 235 pounds and Constable Sorokowski weighs 224 pounds still well above the official limit of 195 pounds. Council decides that these men should be allowed to keep their weight at the present level because of their physical build.

November 1961 – Metro Winnipeg is to charge area municipalities 17 cents per 1,000 gallons under pressure.

November 1961 – The East School District is given permission to dispose of the old Polson School and the property.

November 1961 – The Post Office announces that it is making plans to build a letter carrier depot at Henderson Highway and Rowandale.

November 1961 – The Parks Board clearing the land east of Neil Campbell School report vandalism occurring at the site as well as refuse being dumped on the grounds.

November 1961 – East Kildonan, West Kildonan, Old Kildonan, East St. Paul and West St. Paul act jointly to ask the provincial government to build the north perimeter bridge over the Red River as soon as possible.

November 1961 – Staff transfers

Mrs. M. E. Walker transferred from Engineering Department to position of Cashier and Justice of the Peace

Miss A. Labchuk transferred from Accounting Department as Stenographer and as Justice of the Peace to Engineering Department as Mr. McRae's Stenographer and responsible for clerical work

Miss C. Kolbeck transferred from position as Cashier to Tax Department as Clerk/Typist.

Mr. D. J. Munson will assume the title of Accountant.

November 1961 – East Kildonan asks Metro to acquire property for a river crossing at Douglas Avenue in North Kildonan.

November 1961 – The National Union of Public Employees Local 736 represents East Kildonan employees.

November 1961 – Poll Clerks receive \$10.00 and Deputy Returning Officers make \$15.00 for Election Day

December 1961 – The Federal Winter Works Project funds the 16-inch watermain on Raleigh being built.

December 1961 – Vandals at Fraser's Grove Park do \$200.00 worth of damages.

December 1961 – East Kildonan School Board announces it is planning to sell the old Polson School on the south side of Munroe and use the money to build a school board office and maintenance building beside Munroe Junior High. The new school board office is expected to cost between \$75,000 and \$100,000.

December 3 1961 - The official opening of the Henderson Regional Library in the Rossmere Shopping Centre. The 1962 budget is \$37,129.20; East Kildonan's share of the cost is \$25,000.08.

December 1961 – Those families on welfare in East Kildonan receive a Christmas bonus of \$1.50 per person.

December 1961 – There are only 8 homes in East Kildonan not connected to the municipal sewer system.

December 1961 – The cost to run the incinerator is set at \$5.00 per ton of garbage burned.

December 1961 – East Kildonan’s water use rises to 650,358,012 gallons from October 1 1960 to September 30 1961 from 413,644,187 gallons the previous year.

July 1962 – Council hears complaints that the bells are ringing on the ice cream truck as late at 10:30 PM.

July 1962 – Council is told that 454 Sydney is sold for \$11,500.00.

July 1962 – The Public Works Department is to be divided into two shifts, one working from Monday to Friday and the other Tuesday to Saturday. The shifts are to alternate so each employee will have some Saturdays off.

July 1962 – Metro employees East Kildonan that all paved Metro streets are to be swept once a week except for portions of Portage Avenue and Main Street in Downtown Winnipeg which will be swept twice a week.

July 1962 – The East Kildonan Water Utility budget is set at \$196,154.54 with a projected deficit of \$4,390.18.

August 1962 – The normal retirement age for City of East Kildonan employees is now 65 instead of 70. Extensions can be granted up to the age of 70 if Council approves it.

August 1962 – East Kildonan asks the Provincial Government to allow municipalities the right to assess up to 1 mill in each of the years 1963-1967 to create a reserve fund to provide adequate recognition to Canada's Centennial in 1967.

August 1962 – Mrs. G. A. Linklater is to be hired on a temporary basis to be the Switchboard Operator at a salary of \$170.00 per month.

August 1962 – John G. Hamilton and Anthony Toonstra are hired as Constables.

August 1962 – The North Star Oil Company Service Station at Henderson and Roberta asks permission to install 3 – 5000 gallon storage tanks instead of the 3 – 3000 gallon tanks allowed.

September 1962 – East Kildonan’s equalized assessment is now \$38,706,000.00.

September 1962 – Council is told that the home at 536 Linden is renting for \$130.00 per month.

September 1962 – Mrs. Bell of 486 Roberta reports her daughter was hurt when she fell into a large uncovered hole made by the Greater Winnipeg Gas Company.

September 1962 – No parking anytime signs are posted on the west side of Gateway along its entire length in East Kildonan.

November 1962 – Canada Safeway outlines its plans to demolish their store on Henderson between Melrose (Kimberly) and Bronx and build a larger store. They intend to buy 2 – 30 foot lots on Melrose and 1 – 45 foot lot on Bronx to expand their property.

November 1962 – Complaints reach council about the smell coming from private incinerators in apartment blocks and supermarkets.

November 1962 – East Kildonan introduces new emergency planning procedures; a new director of emergency measures is appointed (the deputy chief constable). New emergency equipment is purchased and bunks are installed in the police station.

November 1962 – The Kiwanis Club of East Kildonan receives back its donated ambulance for sale, as East Kildonan has no further use for it.

November 1962 – Free transit is discontinued to all fire and police personnel in Metro Winnipeg.

November 1962 – The Citizens Health Association Winnipeg Branch tells council in a letter that it should not allow the stockpile of fluorides at Indian Bay to accumulate. This is to prevent “communist sympathizers” from sabotaging the water supply.

November 1962 – A sidewalk is constructed on the west side of Henderson from Rowandale to the northern limits.

November 1962 – The East Kildonan School Board tells council that the proposed residential subdivision south of McLeod and west of McLeod will require McLeod School to be expanded by 6 rooms at an estimated cost of \$90,000.00.

November 1962 – Constable A. Braybrook is appointed as the Fire Inspector for East Kildonan.

November 1962 – Hampstead School is to be paved from Besant to the east end of the Hampstead Avenue sewer.

December 1962 – East Kildonan's share of the cost for running the Henderson Regional Library is \$27,174.00 for 1963. North Kildonan is to pay \$8,836.00 and East St. Paul \$1,982.00.

December 1962 – Members of the Public Safety Department are asked whether they wish to be Police Constables or Firemen. Council is to hire 6 additional men as Firemen.

December 1962 – Mr. E. Rudolph is appointed as a citizen member of the Parks Board.

January 1963 – Mayor G. N. Suttie, Aldermen T. Armstrong, J. S. Botterill, S. C. McLeod, D. Nightingale, W. T. Armstrong and W. H. Irvine

February 1963 – The educational qualification needed to join the Police and Fire Departments is Grade 11 or Grade 10 plus course and training equal to Grade 11.

February 1963 – Some East Kildonan budget estimates

March 1963 – The Parks Board Budget is \$21,000.00 for 1963 and the Community Centre Board Budget is \$31,520.00.

March 1963 – Grants given out

March 1963 – Council is told that the estimated cost of holding the Pan Am Games in 1967 in Winnipeg is \$1,380,000.00 with the cost divided up 3 ways between the City of Winnipeg, the Provincial Government and the Federal Government. (The actual cost the 3 levels of Government will have to pay in 1967 is \$ 6,080,618.00, total revenue for the 1967 Pan Am Games is \$1,058,363.00 and total expenses \$7,138,981.00).

March 1963 – Land located on Raleigh between Oakland and McLeod is sold to the Springfield Mennonite Brethren Church for \$21,000.00.

March 1963 – Council pays the \$65.00 per month rent on 258 Larsen for a social welfare family.

April 1963 – Civil Defense cards are sent to all taxpayers, describing civil defense warning signals and giving indication of what information is available in the booklet '11 Steps to Survival'.

April 1963 – Watt St. is to be resurfaced from Ottawa to Hazel Dell at a cost of \$32,600.00. Trees are to be planted on the Center Boulevard of Henderson from the southern limits to Leighton at a cost of \$580.00.

April 1963 – Street sweeping of all streets in East Kildonan is only to be done every two weeks instead of weekly.

April 1963 – The 20-foot lane between Morse Place Community Club and Sherwood School is to be closed; the property is transferred to the Sherwood School site.

April 1963 – Council endorses the City of Winnipeg plans to bring the Pan Am Games to Winnipeg in 1967.

April 1963 – The Public Works Budget is \$230,116.00 for 1963 plus \$32,908.00 for new equipment.

April 1963 – W. S. Corbett of 240 Larsen and William Popham of 282 Larsen representing residents of the 200, 300 and 400 block of Larsen complain about the changing of Montrose to Larsen. They argue Montrose in East Kildonan existed before Montrose in River Heights. They use the following argument

In 1907 Montrose was known as Montrose Place

In 1911 Montrose Place was changed to Montrose Avenue

In 1913 Montrose Avenue in East Kildonan had 68 houses while Montrose Street in River Heights had 4 houses.

In 1914 Montrose Avenue in East Kildonan had 106 houses compared to 18 on Montrose Street in River Heights.

In 1915 Montrose Avenue in East Kildonan had 126 houses compared to 40 on Montrose Street in River Heights.

Today 1963, Montrose Avenue in East Kildonan has 203 houses while Montrose Street in River Heights has 290 houses but Nottingham Avenue in Morse Place had only recently been changed from Montrose Avenue and with these houses Montrose Avenue/Nottingham Avenue had as many houses as Montrose Street in River Heights.

April 1963 – The chain of command in the East Kildonan Fire Department after the fire chief is Lieutenant Mallovs, Lieutenant Surch and Lieutenant Braybrook.

April 1963 – Council decides to tender out the ambulance service.

April 1963 – T. Kostynyk of 656 Dunrobin is given permission to install 2 driveways to his proposed service station at Kimberly and Gateway.

April 1963 – No parking signs are placed in front of Salisbury School # 2 and 2-hour parking signs are placed on the north side of Prince Rupert from London to Besant.

April 1963 – Police cruiser cars are now to be outfitted with seatbelts.

April 1963 – Police Salaries

May 1963 – There is a money by-law to take place June 19 to expand Sherwood School by 6 rooms at a cost of \$93,000.00.

May 1963 – The creek at Kimberly and Gateway is to be pumped out.

May 1963 – Neil Avenue is to be opened east of Watt across the power lines.

May 1963 – Mr. Hunt at 360 Hazel Dell is again breaking city by-laws by storing gravel and other building supplies behind his home.

May 1963 – Complaints from residents near St. Clements School at Hazel Dell and Watt about the crushed rock of the playground, the uncut weeds on the boulevard. Local children are using the grounds to play baseball and throw stones from the playground surface. Residents complaints that a number of windows have been broken by the baseballs and stones.

May 1963 – A summer survey crew is hired at \$220.00 and \$240.00 per month to survey streets in East Kildonan.

May 1963 – A sanitary sewer is approved to service River East Collegiate from Henderson Highway with the River East School Division paying the entire cost. Council is upset that East Kildonan taxes paid to the River East School Division are being used to benefit an area of North Kildonan but the Municipality of North Kildonan is not contributing anything but its residences will be able to connect to this sewer as well.

May 1963 – The incinerator at the Munroe Shopping Centre is shut down for good.

June 1963 – Council complains that the Radio Oil properties along Munroe are untidy in appearance.

June 1963 – Leighton and Roch becomes a four way stop.

June 1963 – Mrs. Helen Hunt at 360 Hazel Dell asks for public aid for herself and her 3 children. She has been living common law with Mr. Hunt for 10 years and has had all 3 children with him. He has a daughter from a first marriage and has been married to another woman for 3 years unknown to the Mrs. Hunt seeking welfare. Mr. Hunt wants his common law wife to move out with their 3 children so his legally married wife can move in and she is expecting a child. The common law wife doesn't want to move out and asks council for help. Mr. Hunt says he is not able to support his common law wife and their children and is in fact being supported by his pregnant legally married wife. Council tells the common law wife to stay put at 360 Hazel Dell and call the police if Mr. Hunt tries to throw her out.

June 1963 – A six-storey apartment block is to be built on Maxwell Place.

June 1963 – Mr. George Morrow of 419 Leighton and Mr. G. A. V. Hart of 157 Oakview complain about the large tax increases.

June 1963 – Concrete Finishers are to be paid \$1.95 per hour.

June 1963 – The total taxes on the property of Mr. G. A. V. Hart of 157 Oakview are \$260.15 for 1963 but Mr. Hart only sends a cheque for \$233.60 because he refuses to pay the Metro Levy portion of his tax bill. East Kildonan refuses to accept the cheque until he agrees to pay the full amount.

June 1963 – The East Kildonan Knights of Columbus are given permission to develop the land bounded by Donald, Munroe, Roch and the St. Alphonsus property as a playground area with a fence around it.

July 1963 – Jim Smith President of the East Kildonan Kiwanis Club speaks on the proposal to build a senior's project on Oakview at Golspie next to Neil Campbell School.

July 1963 – McLeod Avenue residents ask for permission to use the property on the south side of McLeod east of Roch for a community centre under the name McLeod Community Club. They wish to have swings, a summer pool, badminton and shuffleboard.

July 1963 – Oakview Baptist Church at Oakview and Watt tells Council they have drainage problems at the rear of their property. Their building was built too low and water from the lane runs into the basement windows.

July 1963 – Council is to discontinue the practice of paying for the driver licenses of those employees driving City equipment.

July 1963 – George Jacques of 536 Dunrobin complains that the East Kildonan Engineering Department began using a jackhammer in front of his house at 5:30 AM. Council orders that jackhammers may not be used before 7 AM.

July 1963 – Mr. A. B. Kuzyk of 394 Leighton complains that his area is overrun by dogs running at large and by dogs dirtying his lawn.

July 1963 – The Fiberboard Manufacturing Plant proposes to build a warehouse on their Munroe Avenue property to contain all the timber stored in their yard. Council is very concerned about the state of property as the property is untidy and an extreme fire hazard. This 500 block of Munroe is considered the most fire prone area in East Kildonan, as directly across Munroe is the Radio Oil Refinery.

July 1963 – A 29-suite apartment block is proposed for 1069 Henderson.

July 1963 – Police Constable A. Gilmore is fined 10 days pay "for conduct unbecoming a police constable".

July 1963 - A sidewalk is to be built on the footpath between 662 and 666 Roberta.

July 1963 – Automatic crossing signals are now being installed at Munroe and Molson.

July 1963 – East Kildonan estimates the selling price of 313 Greene would be \$5,000.00 and 428 Trent at \$12,000.00.

July 1963 – Council is to sell the 1953 Cadillac Ambulance for \$600.00.

July 1963 – Long time former East Kildonan Municipal Engineer J. W. Battershill dies.

July 1963 – A 2 storey 4 suite apartment block is rejected for 613 Munroe.

August 1963 – Lane Paving is approved for
Lane between Roberta and Leighton from Roch to Watt
Lane between Linden and Greene from Golspie to Raleigh
Lane between Melbourne and Chelsea from Roch to Watt

August 1963 – Council is told that the old age pension (old age security) will rise to \$75.00 per month.

August 1963 – The Rotary Club of North Winnipeg is given permission to put up a sign at Henderson Highway and Leighton advising that the club meets at the Rossmere Country Club.

August 1963 – James Norman Hanson is hired as a Clerk at the Police Department at \$165.00 per month.

August 1963 – A \$250,000.00 recreational money by-law is to be held at fall elections to improve the facilities of Bronx Park, Melrose, Morse Place and East End Community Clubs.

August 1963 – Mrs. A. D. Fingler resigns from the office staff.

September 1963 – The East Kildonan School Board announces plans for a 10 room expansion to Morse Place Junior High.

September 1963 – Mrs. T. F. Morgan of 667 Kildonan Drive complains about some of her neighbors burning rubbish, which is now against the law.

September 1963 – A 41-suite apartment block is to be built on Brazier at the rear of the Curtis Hotel.

September 1963 – Police Constable C. A. Broughton is suspended without pay for 60 days for disorderly conduct in the coffee shop of the Curtis Hotel. He is told to seek help for his drinking problem.

September 1963 – Patrol Sergeant G. V. Wohlschlager is promoted to Sergeant.

September 1963 – Mrs. House of 497 Oakview is ordered to obtain a dog license or else she will be summoned to court. In reply she complains that tomcats are disturbing her rest and upsetting her dog. She blames the woman at 499 Oakview for this problem because she has a female cat. She claims the tomcats are coming into her yard and smelling up her plants. She tells Council she can't take it anymore and has phoned Chief Constable Einfeld to bring in cat licenses. The License Inspector calls her a "psycho case". The License Inspector tells Council there are currently 1,133 dog licenses in East Kildonan but likely at least that number including Mrs. House don't have dog licenses.

September 1963 – A resident living near Columbus Park adjacent to St. Alphonsus asks that soccer goal posts be moved as soccer balls often fly into his yard and on two occasions his windows have been broken.

September 26 1963 – The corner stone ceremony for the new YMCA building on Kimberly takes place.

October 1963 – Zone fares are to be abolished on the transit system through out Metro Winnipeg.

October 1963 – Officials of C. M. H. C. indicate that the site at Golspie and Oakview is a suitable location for Kiwanis senior citizens housing.

October 1963 – Mr. Hunt of 360 Hazeldell is again ordered to appear before Council to explain why he is not supporting the 3 children of his long time common law wife. He explains that he has a child from his first wife, a newborn child with his legally married second wife and his new girl friend may be expecting a child too.

October 1963 – East Kildonan's equalized assessment is now \$39,873,000.00.

October 1963 – East Kildonan has now gone 1,000 days without a fatal traffic accident.

October 1963 – Police Constable C. A. Broughton is fired for continuing to drink on duty.

October 1963 – Champs Restaurants receives permission to build a drive-in on the south east corner of Henderson and Melbourne.

October 1963 – The East Kildonan Police Department receives a third cruiser car.

October 1963 – A special planning committee is set up to plan for Canada's Centennial in 1967.

October 1963 – A new position of Inspector is created for the police department. H. R. Moreau is appointed to the number two position in the Police Department at a salary of \$500.00 per month.

October 1963 – Bicycle licenses are raised to \$1.00 per year from 75 cents.

October 1963 – Voters in East Kildonan reject a \$250,000.00 money by-law to upgrade the community club, for 1668, against 3584.

November 1963 – Traffic signals on Munroe at Roch and Brazier are in operation from 7 AM to 8 PM.

November 1963 – Mr. Leonard Reginald Robinson and Gerard William Granville are hired as Police Constables.

November 1963 – Council is told there is still a considerable fire hazard at the Radio Oil Refinery on Munroe.

December 1963 – The Parks Board suggests that the old disposal ground on Kimberly be turned into a recreational site as a Centennial project for Canada's 100th Birthday in 1967.

January 1964 – Patrol Sergeant Carson is promoted to Sergeant.

January 1964 – The Perfanick Bros Trucking Company Ltd is given the garbage contract for a 5-year period for a total of \$231,412.50.

January 1964 – The Metro Levy for East Kildonan is set at \$162,286.00 for 1964.

February 1964 – Council turns down a nursing home license for 414 Winterton. This house had been the former Bredin home at 425 Henderson Highway where it later served at the East Kildonan Municipal Hall before it was moved to 414 Winterton.

February 1964 – Some residents of the 600 block of Dunrobin protest the rezoning of property at Oakview and Golspie for a senior citizens project claiming it will lower the value of their properties.

February 1964 – Donald George Malcolm Wither is appointed a Police Clerk.

February 1964 – Representatives of the Kiwanis Club of East Kildonan, the Lions Club of East Kildonan, the Prince Edward Legion and the East Kildonan Chamber of Commerce want to come together with out interested parties to form an East Kildonan Centenary Committee. These groups want to plan for an East Kildonan Centennial Project. This group thinks the development of a sports area on Kimberly east of the incinerator could be that project.

February 1964 – The YMCA asks council to appoint council to appoint a council representative to its board of directors. It will be holding its first annual meeting since the new building opened February 18 1964 in Miles Mac's Annex Gym (Gym B).

February 1964 – Council asks the East Kildonan Chamber of Commerce and East Kildonan's service clubs for proposals to erect new welcoming signs at East Kildonan's northern and southern borders on Henderson Highway.

February 1964 – A Stop sign is to be placed on Raleigh at McLeod for northbound traffic on Raleigh.

February 1964 – Council members are invited to view the new addition to River East Collegiate on February 26 1964.

February 1964 – The City Solicitor is to be a retainer fee of \$3,600.00 for the year.

March 1964 – One Alderman reported to Council of the petty thievery occurring in East Kildonan besides the house break-ins; radio antennae being torn off parked cars, garbage cans lids being stolen etc. There are reports of teenagers fighting at Munroe Junior High and even some girls fighting in a Munroe Avenue back lane.

March 1964 – There are complaints about the burning of raw garbage and paper in an open container behind John Black Church. Some residents have been dumping their own garbage into the container. The church is told to remove the container.

March 1964 – Stop signs are placed onto all avenues entering Kildonan Drive from Canterbury to Mossdale except for Helmsdale.

March 1964 – East Kildonan and North Kildonan disagree on East Kildonan's moves to block water from entering the East Kildonan sewer system. McLeod Creek south of McLeod between Gateway and Molson had been flowing into the sewer system overwhelming the sewers causing them to back up into East Kildonan basements. The water now as a result is backing up onto farmland in North Kildonan. This dispute goes back to 1960 when East Kildonan first blocked the creek.

March 1964 – Council goes on record as being opposed to any financial contribution by East Kildonan towards any centennial project outside its borders. It is also unhappy about the manner to which the Arts Centennial (Concert Hall) project was chosen.

March 1964 – The Parks Board budget is set at \$22,760.00 for 1964 and the Community Centre Board Budget is set at \$31,900.00.

March 1964 – The River East School Division Special Levy is set at \$280,411.38.

March 1964 – The East Kildonan budget except capital works is \$3,157,221.02 including all money due to Metro Council, school boards and all other boards.

April 1964 – Council receives a complaint from a resident objecting to the use of salt on sidewalks and roads; he believes the salt damages the concrete surface.

April 1964 – East Kildonan is to buy a self propelled street sweeper for \$11,972.00.

April 1964 – R. P. Mart resigns from the Fire Department.

April 1964 – East Kildonan purchases bulk gasoline for its vehicles at a cost of 32.5 cents per gallon.

April 1964 – The East Kildonan School District Levy is \$606,391.15 for 1964 and the East Kildonan General School Levy is \$418,342.00.

April 1964 – The River East School Division tells Council that grade 10-12 students living on both sides of Roberta and area north will have to go to River East Collegiate in September 1964, instead of Miles MacDonell Collegiate because of overcrowding at Miles MacDonell. Two special transit buses will carry students to River East by travelling along Roberta Avenue and McLeod Avenue.

April 1964 – G. W. Glanvill resigns from the Police Department.

April 1964 – Mr. Scott Stewart is to be hired for surveying work during the summer at \$240.00 per month

May 1964 – Mr. J. Bradley of 352 Bronx complains that area residents are unable to park in front of their homes because of students parking there all day from Miles MacDonell Collegiate. Two hour parking restrictions are placed on Bronx, Kimberly, Helmsdale and Chelsea between Roch and Bronx. The two-hour parking limit on Roch is extended to Melbourne and Dunrobin.

May 1964 – Norman Nicholas Rogoski is appointed to the Fire Department.

June 1964 – East Kildonan's population is now 28,112 up from 28,092 in 1963.

June 1964 – An incinerator is approved for the new apartment block under construction on Rowandale.

June 1964 – North Kildonan asks East Kildonan for the price it would charge to dispose of some of North Kildonan's garbage in East Kildonan's incinerator.

June 1964 – Constable A. Toonstra is fined 3 days pay for not reporting for duty as required.

June 1964 – East Kildonan turns down the request of the St. Boniface Hospital's Surgical Laboratory for dogs from the East Kildonan Pound for cardiac surgery research.

June 1964 – No parking signs are placed on the east side of Grey north of Munroe.

June 1964 – East Kildonan begins the testing of plastic garbage bags for residents as an alternative to garbage cans.

June 1964 – Lane paving is approved for
Lane between Dunrobin and Helmsdale from Golspie to Raleigh
Lane between Oakview and Hazel Dell from Roch to Watt
Lane between Chelsea and Bronx from Brazier to Roch
Lane south of Hoskin between Grey and Robin Hood Crescent

July 1964 – The owner of the apartment block at Dunrobin and Watt is told not burn garbage in their incinerator in the future. This is in response to complaints from local residents.

July 1964 – Dairy Queen is given permission to open a retail ice cream store in the Rossmere Shopping Centre.

July 1964 – Miss Carol Kolbeck resigns from the office staff.

July 1964 – Some residents of Oakview and Hazel Dell near St. Clements School want the grounds improved, they want the grounds asphalted, the fence raised 4 feet higher, a school gate installed and the boulevard weeds cut.

July 1964 – The father of a 3-year-old tells Mr. Carl G. Purpur of 399 Linden tells Council that his son received a fractured skull when one side of the swing at the Roc-Lin Tot at Linden and Roch came off. Parks Board staff immediately removes the swing after the accident.

July 1964 – Mr. Glenn Ernest Waldie is to be hired as a Clerk in the Police Department at \$165.00 per month.

July 1964 – The newly opened Champs Drive-in asks for more garbage collection services.

July 1964 – The lane between Larsen and Bowman from Roch to Watt is to be paved in 1965.

July 1964 – Train Whistling along the CPR mainline on Munroe near Molson brings many complaints from residents.

July 1964 – There are many complaints about vehicles speeding on McLeod Avenue.

July 1964 – A woman with 6 children on welfare will receive \$110.00 per month for food. The maximum clothing allowance for an adult on welfare is \$60.00 per year.

July 1964 – Council spends \$4500.00 to refurbish the City Hall offices.

August 1964 – Mr. Joseph Barry of 511 Hazeldell again asks Council to do something about the grounds of St. Clements School. Mr. Robert R. Roy of the St. Alphonsus School Board asks residents in the vicinity of St. Clements to bring their concerns to the school board.

August 1964 – East Kildonan is to buy a backhoe/front end loader for \$24,252.00.

September 1964 – Open flares are discontinued at construction excavation sites, flashing amber lights are to be used instead.

September 1964 – A fracas occurs between teenagers and the police at the drive-in at Bowman and Henderson.

September 1964 – There are complaints about the smoke coming from the incinerator at the Rossmere Shopping Centre.

September 1964 – A new pumping station is to be installed at the Munroe Ave outflow.

September 1964 – Residents in the vicinity of Donalda complain of a man looking into women's bedroom windows.

September 1964 – East Kildonan receives a plaque from the Provincial Government Safety Division for having no fatal accidents in 1963.

September 1964 – Mr. D. P. Martell is Chairman of the East Kildonan Centennial Committee.

September 1964 – Businesses ceasing operations in 1964 include

October 1964 – Champs Fine Foods report that they hired a commissionaire for a 2 week period to deter the kind of disturbance that occurred on another drive-in on Henderson Highway.

October 1964 – Council asks the Henderson Regional Library to consider open Sunday on a one month trial period.

October 1964 – Mr. G. W. Taylor President of the Morse Place Community Club and Mr. McLaughlin Vice President ask for Council's approval to reconstruct 2 of the skating rinks at a cost of \$3,000.00.

October 1964 – A minimum charge of \$1.00 is to be charged for residents disposing of materials at the City Incinerator.

November 1964 – The Baptist Church is given permission to build a church on the south side of Rowandale between Henderson and Larchdale.

November 1964 – Metro Council calls a meeting to propose the relocation of Highway 59 from Molson to a point further east.

November 1964 – The total taxable Assessment for East Kildonan is set at \$45,662,410.00 for 1965 up from \$31,467,970.00 in 1964.

November 1964 – An incinerator is approved for the Champs Drive-in to take care of their garbage problems.

November 16 1964 – A special bus service for students attending Miles MacDonell Collegiate starts with 2 buses from Metro Transit. The 2 buses at 8:37 AM leave Lyall and Molson travelling along Munroe to Watt, then up Watt to Kimberly, then to Roch. The 2 buses leave Kimberly and Roch at 4:10 PM for the return trip to Morse Place.

November 1964 – The development to create the Northdale Shopping Centre is approved. The development include a 70,000 square foot store and 22,500 square feet of smaller stores.

November 1964 – Plans are approved for a 15-suite apartment block at Nottingham and Gateway.

November 1964 – Council is told that Mr. Hunt of 360 Hazel Dell is using property at 739 Kimberly, east of the CPR tracks for storing old cars contrary to zoning regulations.

November 1964 – Two-hour parking signs are erected in the 400 and 500 block of Ottawa for Monday to Friday from 9 AM to 6 PM.

November 1964 – Council is told of an interest by the Concordia Hospital Board to build a new 400 bed hospital next to Molson near the East Kildonan / Winnipeg boundary.

December 1964 – Traffic lights are considered for McLeod and Henderson.

December 1964 – The Henderson Regional Library Board turns down the request to open on Sunday. The Library Board is to open a new library branch in the Munroe Shopping Centre. East Kildonan's share of Library costs is to increase to \$39,945.78 for 1965 up from \$31,250.10 in 1964 largely due to the opening of the Munroe branch.

December 1964 – Council is told that the total Metro requirements from East Kildonan will be \$290,861.00 in 1965 an increase of \$81,844.00 from 1964.

December 1964 – Council is told that the house at 692 Linden still uses coal for heating their home.

January 1965 – Mayor G. N. Suttie, Aldermen T. Armstrong, C. J. Garvie, A. J. Reid, M. Ruta, W. T. Snowdon and M. Spack.

January 1965 – Citizen members elected to the Parks Board
Mr. L. A. McMahon – 223 Neil Avenue
Mr. W. Kormylo – 629 Greene
Mr. D. Harvey – 663 Munroe

January 9 1965 – The Kiwanis Home for Seniors at Oakview and Golspie is officially opened at 2 PM.

January 1965 – Council is told that the Manitoba Centennial Corporation intends to build a concert hall that seats 2,300, a 5-storey museum, a planetarium and an underground parking lot for 450-475 cars at a total cost of \$11,000,000.00.

January 1965 – City Council passes a motion that responsibility for social services should be taken over by the provincial government.

January 1965 – Estimates for a new police and fire station come in for \$169,400.00. A new public works building is estimated to cost \$152,000.00.

February 1965 – A proposal comes to council for an ice cream drive-in at 745 Gateway at the corner of Gateway and Kimberly.

February 1965 – Mr. A. Tawns of 820 Kildonan Drive complains that his garbage is not being picked up on a regular basis from his home. Mr. Tawns and 3 other homeowners on Kildonan Drive with no backlane refuse to bring their garbage to the curb. It is East Kildonan policy for all residents with no backlanes to bring their garbage to the curb. The garbage truck does not drive up private driveways because in the past when this was done the truck used to often get stuck on these private driveways during the winter.

February 1965 – Metro tells Council that its share of the cost of maintaining the Metro Sewage Disposal System is \$78,895.50 in 1965 an increase of 69% over 1964.

February 1965 – A group of vandals kick in the side of a cruiser car while it is parked outside the Salisbury House.

February 1965 – A 5-storey apartment block is approved for the corner of London and Munroe on the Munroe Shopping Centre property.

February 1965 – A voluntary home inspection program run by the Fire Department is approved and is to start in May 1965.

February 1965 – Constable A. Toonstra resigns as Constable. Mr. W. Oeste is hired as a Clerk in the Police Department at \$165.00 per month.

February 1965 – The officer in charge of a platoon in the Fire Department is now a captain instead of a lieutenant. The 1965 estimates for the East Kildonan Fire Department are \$177,102.90.

February 1965 – A fire occurs at the FibreBoard Plant on Munroe.

February 1965 – East Kildonan is to contribute a \$2.00 per capita grant from the Provincial Government totaling \$54,610.00 to the Manitoba Centennial Corporation for the construction of the concert hall, museum and planetarium. Council then makes a further \$45,390.00 contribution making in total a \$100,000.00 gift.

February 1965 – Approval is given to construct a commercial building on Henderson at Larsen.

February 1965 – Council is told that it would cost an additional \$16,925.52 per year to provide garbage pick up from the house rather than from the curb for homes that do not have back lanes. Council decides to keep the policy of requiring homeowners to bring their garbage to the curb, as this is the policy of every other municipality in Metro Winnipeg.

February 1965 – Mr. G. A. V. Hart of 157 Oakview is told his property will be going into tax sale if the outstanding taxes are not paid by March 3. Mr. Hart refuses to pay the Metro portion of the property tax bill.

February 1965 – The water rate charge is 30 cents per 100 cubic feet. The sewer rate is 13 cents per 100 cubic feet. The minimum charge for water and sewer is \$4.30 per quarter and the average homeowner will pay about \$12.90 every 3 months for water and sewer charges.

February 1965 – The rate of pay for the new rank of Captain in the Fire Department is set at \$485.00 per month.

February 1965 – The 1965 estimates for the East Kildonan Police Department are \$204,587.20.

March 1965 – The traffic lights at Watt and Washington are now to operate from 7:00 AM to 9:15 AM, 11:15 AM to 1:45 PM and 3:15 PM to 6:00 PM.

March 1965 – Mr. A. Tawns of 820 Kildonan Drive tells Council he represents 8-10 homeowners on Kildonan Drive who are not happy with Council's decision not to pick up garbage from beside their homes, he says he will go to court to resolve the problem in his favour.

March 1965 – The Public Works estimates are \$272,154.00 for 1965.

March 1965 – Watt St., Gateway Road and part of Munroe close to Highway 59 are to be deleted from the Metro Winnipeg street system as of April 1 1965. East Kildonan will again be responsible for these streets.

March 1965 – East Kildonan’s share of the 1965 General School Levy is \$427,610.00 compared to \$418,342.00 in 1964.

March 1965 – Mr. D. P. Martell of 24 Linden resigns as Chairman of the East Kildonan Centennial Committee and from any active part in the work of the committee.

March 1965 – The Junior Police Clerks D. G. Love, J. N. Hanson and D. Wither are to see their pay rise to \$220.00 per month after 4 years of service.

March 1965 – Council continues the policy of giving East Kildonan Souvenir Spoons to couple reaching their 50th and 60th wedding anniversaries.

March 1965 – A stop sign is to be erected at the northwest corner of Kimberly and Raleigh.

March 1965 – Car allowances

April 1965 – East Kildonan gives a grant of \$4,000.00 to the YMCA to cover 50% of its tax bill for 1965.

April 1965 – Mr. G. W. Taylor President of the Morse Place Community Club asks Council to remove Mr. Bill Polonuk as Chairman of the Parks Board and as a member of the Parks Board. Mr. Taylor claims Mr. Polonuk used his position to threaten Morse Place Community Club; he tells Mr. Taylor that he will see to it that Morse Place Community Club will be cut off from any further funding. Mr. Polonuk was coaching a visiting team at Morse Place when music was turned on at the next rink for a figure skating rehearsal. Mr. Polonuk demanded that the music be turned off and a shouting match resulted.

April 1965 – The Metro Street system has now been enlarged from 164.66 miles to 218.81 but Metro streets in East Kildonan have dropped to 3.89 miles from 6.4 miles.

April 1965 – Mr. Doug Brewer is the new Chairman of the East Kildonan Centennial Committee. A Centennial Projects subcommittee is formed.

April 1965 – Council considers closing the City Incinerator and revert back to land disposal, as this would save \$28,368.00 per year.

April 1965 – East Kildonan is now forced by a court decision to pick up the garbage from 2 residents Mr. Archibald Tawns and Mr. Peter Lazarenko on Kildonan Drive by the house instead of at the curb.

April 1965 – The East Kildonan Chamber of Commerce is to receive a grant of \$500.00.

April 1965 – Mr. G. Swift of 691 Roberta complains about the dust problem to his home from the traffic on the gravel road of Raleigh 3 houses away.

April 1965 – Constable M. Chilborak resigns.

April 1965 – Lanes to be paved

1. Lane between Melbourne and Chelsea from Brazier to Roch
2. Lane north of Simpson from Grey to London
3. Lane between Jamison and Washington from Brazier to Watt
4. Lane between Larsen and Bowman from Roch to Watt
5. Lane between Neil and Sydney from Henderson to Brazier

May 1965 – Council is told that a survey done in 1964 had shown that the public sidewalk at Kimberly and Kildonan Drive was built on private property. The sidewalk was built on land belonging to 735 Kildonan Drive. Council is told it will cost about \$350.00 to move the sidewalk so council makes a proposal to buy the 9 foot strip of property.

May 1965 – The speed limit along Fraser's Grove Park is made 15 mph.

May 1965 – The partially burned building at 841 Henderson is deemed to be a fire and safety hazard.

May 1965 – Council goes on record in favour of a new Concordia Hospital being built in East Kildonan north of Munroe near Molson.

May 1965 – An 11-suite apartment block is approved for the south side of Molson and Norwich.

May 1965 – Raleigh is to be graded and gravelled from Kimberly south to permit the construction of a furniture factory at the southwest corner of Raleigh and Kimberly.

May 1965 – An ice cream stand and coffee shop is approved for 745 Gateway at the southeast corner of Kimberly and Gateway.

May 1965 – The East Kildonan incinerator is to be closed for a period at least to the end of 1965. The incinerator has broken down requiring major repairs and as a result the incinerator staff is transferred to the Public Works Department.

June 1965 – A meeting is held between representatives of East Kildonan, North Kildonan, Transcona, St. Boniface and St. Vital to discuss the feasibility of the amalgamation of these communities into one city east of the Red.

June 1965 – The East Kildonan School District announces it plans to build a 6-room addition to Sherwood School.

June 1965 – Wages for Public Works employees

Operators of bull dozers, front-end loaders and street sweepers - \$2.26 per hour

June 1965 – Lanes to be paved include lane between Kimberly and Bronx from Brazier to Roch and the lane north of Munroe east of Watt.

June 1965 – Mr. DeGroot the City Poundkeeper is to receive an additional \$25.00 per month to \$225.00 per month up from \$200.00 per month.

June 1965 – Public Works employees N. Sokoloski and J. Sokoloski are given medical examinations, which determine that they are physically fit. Council tells the workers that there is no reason for their poor attendance record over the last few years and they are told their work record must improve or they will be dismissed.

June 1965 – The water bill for the north wing of Miles MacDonell Collegiate is \$512.14 for the period January 1 to April 1 1965 almost 8 times the previous 3-month consumption. The River East School Division claims the water meter must be in error but City Council says it is working fine. The city says a plumbing problem must be the reason for the large bill.

June 1965 – City Council decides to purchase a rescue wagon because of complaints of the time it is taking for ambulances to pick up patients at a cost of \$6,060.00.

July 1965 – Four way stops are created at Woodvale and Greene and at Woodvale and Leighton.

July 1965 – Robert Nazer is hired for the summer to do survey work for the lane-paving program at \$260.00 per month.

July 1965 – Canker worms are a big problem west of Henderson, as a result all trees west of Henderson are sprayed to combat the problem at a cost of \$1500.00.

July 1965 – Due to resident's protests, Trent Avenue is not opened and not paved across the power lines to Golspie.

July 1965 – The lane between Harbison and Larsen is to be paved between Roch and Watt.

July 1965 – Metro Council turns down East Kildonan's request to make McLeod and Kimberly Metro routes.

August 1965 – The large oil spill inside the Radio Oil Refinery grounds is deemed to be a fire hazard.

August 1965 – Constable J. Hamilton resigns to enter the insurance business.

August 1965 – The Harbison Pharmacy at Watt and Harbison is appointed as a collection agent for City water accounts.

August 1965 – A recreational Centre including an indoor arena is designated a 1970 project commemorating the Manitoba Centennial.

August 1965 – A book on the history of East Kildonan is approved in principle for 1967.

August 1965 – The lane between Donalda and Trent from Henderson to is to be paved.

September 1965 – The Concordia Hospital Board makes a proposal for a 17-18 acre site for a new hospital in the vicinity of Kimberly and Molson.

September 1965 – Miss Donna Richlew of 147 Larchdale Crescent is named Miss Blue Bomber for 1965.

September 1965 – Mr. Norman W. Evans and Mr. J. Gauvin are hired as Police Clerks.

September 1965 – Council considers establishing a fund of \$60,000.00 to fund 3 tot lots in each of the 3 City Wards.

September 20 1965 – Zellers Country Fair officially opens in the Northdale Shopping Centre at 10 AM.

September 1965 – Lanes to be paved include

1. Lane between Washington and Ottawa from Henderson to Brazier
2. Lane between Neil and Sydney from Watt to the transmission lines
3. Lane between Roberta and Greene from Henderson to Brazier
4. Lane between Oakview and Hazel Dell from Watt to Golspie

September 1965 – Constable A. Gilmore is fired after being arrested by the R.C.M.P. after an accident in front of the Selkirk Manitoba Police Station

September 1965 – Council agrees to give the Concordia General Hospital a grant of \$200,000.00 to build a new hospital in East Kildonan. The money is to be given out in amounts of \$20,000.00 per year for 10 years.

September 1965 – East Kildonan equalized assessment is now \$45,767,000.00.

September 1965 – A fire occurs at the Bronx Park Community Club.

September 1965 – Council rescinds a previous decision to tear down the Hazel Dell pillars at Hazel Dell and Henderson.

September 1965 – A Salvation Army Church is approved for the north east corner of Bowman and Henderson.

September 1965 – More development is approved for the Morse Place District in the area of Kimberly Avenue.

October 1965 – The incinerator at John Henderson Junior High is to be moved to midway between the school and the west side of the property.

October 1965 – The lane between Chelsea Place and Canterbury Place is to be paved.

October 1965 – Ronald E. Stromberg is hired as the Assistant Engineer at a salary of \$500.00 per month.

October 1965 – Stop signs are to be placed on McLeod at Roch creating a 4-way stop.

November 1965 – M. Chilborak is rehired as a Police Constable after he returns to East Kildonan from British Columbia.

November 1965 – Ronald Glen Ryland and Richard Delaliaux are hired as Police Clerks.

December 1965 – There are reports of shoplifting and vandalism at the Northdale Shopping Centre.

December 1965 – No Truck Route signs are to be placed on McLeod and Kimberly.

January 1966 - East Kildonan provides a grant of \$700.00 for the dental clinic of the Kildonan-St. Paul Health Unit.

January 1966 – The cost of the sanitary landfill operations work out \$1.95 per gross ton in 1965.

January 1966 – East Kildonan Public Utility for water had a deficit of \$24,697.44 for 1965 while the sewer utility had a deficit of \$5,908.22.

January 1966 – Irene’s Grocery and Lunch is appointed as a collection agency for water utility accounts.

Storekeeper – R. Pearce - \$295.00 per month
Rodman – J. Medzam - \$240.00 per month

February 1966 – East Kildonan has now gone 5 years without a fatal accident.

February 1966 – The Parks Board budget is set at \$40,000.00 for 1966. The Community Centre budget is set at \$47,026.50 for 1966.

February 1966 – East Kildonan has already spent \$21,700.00 hauling snow from 40 streets.

February 1966 – Mrs. J. House of 497 Oakview asks that senior citizens be relieved of all school taxes. Council is told this would cost East Kildonan \$165,000.00 which would have to be made up by other taxpayers.

February 1966 – The Henderson Regional Library exchanges library services with the City of Winnipeg Library beginning on a 1-year trial period.

February 1966 – The Metro levy for East Kildonan is to rise by \$85,633.00 in 1966 over 1965.

February 1966 – The East Kildonan School District special levy is to be \$833,065.52 in 1966 an increase of \$182,769.01 over 1965. The general levy for the River East School Division is \$783,187.00 for 1966 an increase of \$103,113.00 over 1965. East Kildonan's share of the levy is \$504,419.00.

February 1966 – The Salvation Army receives a grant of \$250.00 while the Victorian Order of Nurses receive a total of \$1,018.00 based on the 2,371 visits made to East Kildonan residents in 1965.

March 4 1966 – A major blizzard shuts down Southern Manitoba and causes large snowdrifts completely blocking many streets.

March 1966 – Public Works employee W. Coleman is suspended for reporting to work under the influence of alcohol.

March 1966 – There is a partial list of parking restrictions on Prince Rupert due to the construction of the addition to Morse Place Junior High.

March 1966 – Council turns down the request from the Miles MacDonell Boys Volleyball Team for a \$50-\$100 grant to go to a volleyball championship tournament in Calgary Alberta.

March 1966 – East Kildonan agrees to pay 50% of the hospital and medical premiums for all East Kildonan employees.

March 1966 – The YMCA is given a grant of \$4,000.00.

March 1966 – Mr. G. A. V. Hart of 157 Oakview refuses to pay the full amount of his water bill.

March 1966 – The River East School Division responsible for Miles MacDonell Collegiate and River East Collegiate budget is \$1,286,401.00 for 1966 up from \$1,135,606.50 in 1965, an increase of 13.28%. The budget for the East Kildonan School District is \$1,825,077.29 for 1966, up from \$1,625,604.96 for 1965 and increase of 12.27%. Council is unhappy with these large increases, as they are tired of taking the blame for high property tax increases.

March 20 1966 – Sandbags are being placed in the Bredin Drive area and along Kildonan Drive from Helmsdale to Mossdale, as the Red River is expected to be at levels approaching 1950 levels. Forty thousand sandbags are put down the first day. These dikes are to protect homes outside the primary dike system. There are 15 permanent employees and 60 temporary employees at work from on shifts from 7 AM to 7 PM. Provincial Government employees are responsible for sandbagging at Fraser's Grove Park.

One homeowner at 444 Bredin Drive refuses permission for workers to go on to her land until East Kildonan promises to fix the watermain which runs under her property and frequently freezes. This is agreed to.

In all 100,000 sandbags are used containing 5000 cubic yards to hold the floodwaters back. East Kildonan estimates its costs at \$100,00, which the province pays back to East Kildonan.

March 1966 – Mayor Spack announces he will be resigning to take a professorship at Brandon College, he has only served as mayor since January 1966.

March 1966 – Work is to start in the summer of 1966 to develop as a residential area the land between Munroe and Simpson east of Louelda to Highway 59.

March 1966 – Council proposes to Metro Council a new metro route immediately north of Simpson (Concordia Avenue). A new Chelsea Avenue trunk sewer will have to be built to service the new area.

March 1966 – Captain Mallows is appointed to a new position of Deputy Fire Chief.

April 1966 – Council is told that the total cost of snow removal for the March 4 1966 blizzard came to \$14,039.99.

April 1966 – Metro Council approves the construction of an 11 storey- 97-suite apartment block on the west side of Henderson at 1076/1104 Henderson Highway.

April 1966 – A flood committee of city council is formed and is charged with the following duties

Emergency Headquarters

Dikes

Metro Liaison

Publicity

Evacuation and Registration

April 1966 – It is reported that a technical-vocation school might be set up on the east side of the Red River. East Kildonan asks the provincial government to consider East Kildonan as the site.

April 1966 – A proposal to expand Morse Place Community Club reaches City Council.

April 1966 – The reports of a small child being badly burned by firecrackers has council thinking of banning the sale of firecrackers.

April 1966 – Mr. J. D. Whitney is appointed to the Fire Department.

April 1966 – A presentation is made to Rossmere Lanes YBC Bantam Double Team of Derek Edgar and Bruce Morrow along with coach Allen Rouse who won the Canadian Championship.

April 1966 – H. G. Mallows is appointed as Deputy Fire Chief and W. Huyda is promoted to Captain in the Fire Department.

April 1966 – The rent on the C. H. M. C. house at 269 Dunrobin is \$110.00 per month.

April 1966 – A photocopier is to be bought for \$995.00.

April 1966 – Police Clerk N. W. Evans resigns to join the Transcona Police Department.

May 1966 – During the flood conditions on the Red River, East Kildonan employees operate the Hawthorne Pumping Station in North Kildonan. East Kildonan has felt that North Kildonan has been slow to operate the pumps that prevent sewers backing up in East Kildonan.

May 1966 – The East Kildonan ceremony for raising the new Manitoba flag is held at Miles MacDonell Collegiate on May 12 1966 with another small ceremony at City Hall

May 1966 – Miss Terumi Kuwada of 319 Linden is hired for summer work in the office at \$175.00 per month.

May 1966 – A new IBM typewriter is to be purchased for the Engineering Department for \$517.50.

May 1966 – East Kildonan continues to use its sanitary landfill site to dispose of its garbage rather than its incinerator.

June 1966 – Members of City Council are invited to the official opening of the Gateway Drive-in and coffee shop at Gateway and Kimberly which takes place on June 4 1966 at 12 Noon.

June 1966 – W. Coleman a Public Works employee is sent home for being under the influence of alcohol. He had been trying to see how much gasoline was left in a compressor by using a lighted match. He had been warned about doing this before and is later fired.

June 1966 – There are a total of 7,378 residences with water meters and 125 residences with no water meters.

June 1966 – Robert James Aplin is hired as a Police Clerk.

June 1966 – Storekeeper R. W. Pearce resigns.

June 1966 – The car allowance for the Deputy Fire Chief Mallows is set at \$50.00 per month.

June 1966 – There are complaints about the condition of the boulevard on the north side of Chelsea next to Miles MacDonell Collegiate. The River East School Division is ordered to properly maintain it.

June 1966 – A new personnel policy is instituted for those East Kildonan employees under the influence of alcohol.

First Offense – Employee is sent home for the balance of the day.

Second Offense – Employee receives a one- week suspension

Third Offense – Employee is dismissed.

June 1966 – Two extra flagpoles are erected at City Hall at a cost of \$200.00.

June 1966 – Water rates that are charged to East Kildonan rise to 21 cents per 1000 gallons from 17 cents per 1000 gallons, this increase is a decision of the Metro Council.

July 1966 – Some businesses ceasing operations in the first part of 1966 include
East Kildonan Tailors – 873 Henderson
Polet Applicators – 919 Henderson
Grocery Store at – 765 Moncton

July 1966 – Honourary appointments as Fire Chief and Captain are to be given to those who made a significant contribution to the objectives of the Fire Department. Those appointed can have or currently hold elective or appointed office. A Honourary Fire Chief is to be given a white fire helmet with a shield. A Honourary Fire Chief is to be given a gold plated pocket badge.

July 1966 – Morse Place Community Club's building is to be expanded by an addition 60 feet by 30 feet.

July 1966 – The proposed new Public Safety building is to be built on Kimberly between Golspie and Raleigh, the cost is now estimated to be \$228,450 but council holds off making a decision.

August 1966 – The owner of Champs Fine Foods expresses his dissatisfaction with police handling of troublemakers at Champs. There have been fights, beer bottles have been thrown, incidents of young people being intoxicated. In the last incident one of the young people involved was a son of East Kildonan Police Officer Constable Sallee. Constable Sallee told the manager of Champs not to reveal his son's name to Council. The owner wanted to have him and the others charged but he claims nothing was done. The police reply that 5 individuals 19 and 20 years old had been charged.

August 1966 – East Kildonan considers buying radar equipment for the Police Department for detection of speeders.

August 1966 – An East Kildonan by-law restricts householders to 2 cats only.

August 1966 – W. Kormylo resigns from the Parks Board.

August 1966 – Aldermen T. Armstrong, A. J. Reid and Alderman M. Ruta are appointed Honourary Fire Captains. Mayor Spack, George Suttie and L. Hutcheon are appointed Honourary Fire Chief's.

August 1966 – Council receives a letter from Lynda Sotham (Jones) of 248 Donalds Honoured Queen of the International Order of Job's Daughters who ask for permission to hold a tag day on September 24 to raise money for scholarships. She is told to make an application on a letterhead of an executive of the International Order of Job's Daughters.

August 1966 – Chelsea is to be legally closed between Golspie and Raleigh.

August 1966 – A woman living on welfare at 337 Bronx is told she will be cut off welfare if she has any more drinking parties. Neighbors have complained of the parties keeping them awake at night.

August 1966 – Constables S. Sewell and D. Pickup resign to move to British Columbia.

August 1966 – Lane pavings approved for 1967 include
Lane between Greene and Linden from Henderson to Brazier
Lane between Sydney and Melbourne from Watt to the power lines

August 1966 – East Kildonan City Council asks the Metro Council for a crosswalk on Henderson opposite the Northdale Shopping Centre. Metro Council does a traffic count and does not feel one is necessary.

August 1966 – Flashing lights and bells are to be established at the C.P.R. crossings at Kimberly and McLeod.

September 1966 – Mayor Spack resigns as of September 15 to accept a position at the University of Brandon. A. J. Reid becomes the Acting Mayor.

September 1966 – Keith McCaul is hired as a Rodman for the City survey crew at \$300.00 per month.

September 1966 – A. Braaten resigns from the Fire Department; M. M. J. Seepish is hired as his replacement.

September 1966 – Douglas Horton is hired as Storekeeper at \$300.00 per month.

September 1966 – The land east of Neil Campbell School is to be developed as a park for East Kildonan's Centennial project for 1967. The cost is then estimated to be \$45,000.00.

September 1966 – East Kildonan approves of the plans for the construction of the Chelsea Avenue Trunk Sewer. This will allow the area east of Louelda to be developed.

September 1966 – Two-hour parking signs are placed on Prince Rupert in front of Morse Place Junior High and Salisbury School.

September 1966 – A sidewalk is to be constructed on Gateway from Simpson north to the city limits.

September 1966 – There are concerns about the increase in teenage vandalism and fights in East Kildonan. There have been more incidents of fights at the Salisbury House and Dairy Queen.

September 1966 – A new by-law is passed to prohibit construction of any new houses with the downspouts draining roofs. This is seen as a contributing factor to overloading the sewer system and causing sewer backups. Council tells residents that they should disconnect existing downspouts and the new by-law gives council the power to order that it be done.

September 1966 – Council gives Barbara Burron a scroll and city spoon she completed 12 years of schooling with perfect attendance never missing a day of school and never being late. A special presentation is given for her on October 14 1966 at Miles MacDonell Collegiate.

October 1966 – Council is told that Zellers on Henderson Highway pays \$26,000.00 in property taxes and \$9,000.00 in business taxes. The store employs 112 people, 94 of them live in East Kildonan.

October 1966 – Mrs. J. House of 497 Oakview asks Council to pass a bylaw to force her neighbour to cut down a tree, which is overhanging her yard by 25 feet. Council tells her it has no authority to do so as the tree is on private property and it overhangs private property.

November 1966 – The City is told that 33-34% of all water coming into East Kildonan is lost through leaks in the watermains, 15-20% is considered the average for most cities.

November 1966 – G. N. Suttie returns to Council as Mayor of East Kildonan.

November 1966 – The Knight of Columbus ask Council to enact a curfew for juveniles under 18 to combat vandalism and other youth related problems.

November 1966 – New water and sewer rates to take place as of January 1967

November 1966 – The lane between Jamison and Bowman from Roch to Watt is to be paved in 1967.

November 1966 – The 15-mph speed limit is abolished in school and playground areas by the province under the terms of the new Highway Traffic Act.

November 1966 – Council gives \$200.00 to cover expenses for a home Christmas decorating contest on the Centennial theme.

December 1966 – Council considers taking a stand in the upcoming referendum to create one school division for all grades.

December 1966 – Mr. D. Harvey is reappointed a citizen member of the Parks Board.

December 1966 – East Kildonan now has a radar unit to catch speeders.

December 1966 - Council rejects a call by some groups to create a curfew for those under 18. Council agrees with those who say it is impracticable and it would require a much larger police force.

December 1966 – Constable R. S. M. MacKay is promoted to Patrol Sergeant.

December 1966 – Mrs. E. E. Benoit of 220 Donalda is hired at \$275.00 per month.

December 1966 – Mr. John Potter of 662 Dunrobin is appointed a citizen member of the Parks Board.

December 1966 – The name of the park behind Neil Campbell School is to be changed from Neil Campbell Park to East Kildonan Centennial Park.

December 1966 – Council is upset by comments made by Chief Constable Einfeld in the Winnipeg Free Press. There is a feeling he has is overstepping his authority. He is told City Council makes policy not him.

December 1966 – Three large water leaks are found in the 300 block of McLeod, one leak is losing 15 gallons per minute which adds up to 8 million gallons in a year.

December 1966 – Watt St. is to be closed for all traffic except buses for 2 month beginning in January 1967 from Kimberly to Melbourne. This is to allow for the construction of the Chelsea Avenue Trunk Sewer.

December 31 1966 – A gas torchlight is lighted on the grounds of City Hall at 5 PM and is to remain on throughout the night hours for the entire Centennial Year of 1967. The installation costs are \$150.00 and the natural gas bill will be \$125.00 for the year. After the lighting ceremony a 100 gun-salute is fired and the grounds are lit with torches and sprinklers. Mayor Suttie tours the streets of East Kildonan in an old fashioned cutter drawn by a horse. The entire evening costs \$465.00. The original plan had been to hold a giant bonfire of Christmas trees on the grounds of Miles MacDonell Collegiate. This plan would have been more expensive at \$1000.00 and would have involved a lot of cleanup by City employees.

January 1967 – Mr. C. J. Garvie is elected a citizen member of the Henderson Regional Library Board.

January 1967 – Council is told of complaints of fluffy dust emanating from the Fibreboard Building products at 515 Munroe.

January 1967 – The construction of the Chelsea Avenue sewer work on Watt St. is delayed to January 23 because in the delay in delivery of construction material.

January 1967 – Metro Videon Limited a cable television company asks Council if a license would be needed to operate cable television in East Kildonan. This same company has plans to begin service on the west side of the river in the near future. Council tells them a license is not required but feels a 3% tax on cable premiums is a fair payment in lieu of property and business taxes.

January 1967 – The landscaping costs for the proposed park east of Neil Campbell School have risen to \$69,837.13 more than \$19,000.00 over the original estimates. The work is tendered out for \$62,721.31 the price is reduced by \$7,105.82 by having inmates at Stoney Mountain Penitentiary construct the furniture.

January 1967 – East Kildonan has now gone 6 years without a fatal traffic accident.

January 1967 – East Kildonan's share of the 1967 Henderson Regional Library is \$43,200.00.

January 1967 – James Stalker and Howard Coxe are hired as Police Clerks at \$200.00 per month.

January 1967 – A 4-way stop is created at Linden and Roch.

February 1967 – Mr. R. J. Adkins representing the East Kildonan Youth Council tells Council that this organization was recently formed. It has 3 aims

1. To obtain the use of the gym facilities in the schools during the evening.
2. To obtain the use of two schoolrooms after school hours as study areas with university students supervising.
3. To provide a place for teenagers to go in evening, their present project is a coffeehouse at Bronx Park Community Club. This will be closed during the summer so they ask for some way to keep it open all year round or something similar to it.

February 1967 – Council is told that 300 East Kildonan children applied for dental care at the Kildonan-St. Paul Health Unit in 1966 and 233 were seen by the dentist due to lack of funds to pay for their own dentist. Two Hygienists have been added to the Dental Clinic Staff. A program of coating teeth is underway locally which has lead to East Kildonan children having fewer cavities than children in other areas.

February 1967 – Mrs. House of 497 Oakview shovels out her backyard into the lane, completely blocking the back lane to protest the city not clearing the ridge left by the snowplow on her garage approach. The lane is cleared at a cost of \$13.62 and Mrs. House is given a subpoena to appear in court March 9 1967. Mrs. House is a regular caller to the Mayor, Aldermen and City staff as well to the media. Council rejects her demand that only her garage needs to be done after the snowplow passes. Council tells her that special service can not be done for her only. If they did it for her, they would have to do it for everyone else and that would cost an estimated \$126,000.00 per year. The cost of clearing all front drives would be an additional \$19,500.00.

February 1967 – East Kildonan Police are to wear blue and white cap bands as a Centennial idea. Police in Scotland still wear this and this is to honour the Town and Parish of Kildonan in the Isle of Arran, which lies in the Firth of Clyde.

May 1967 – The Arbor Day planting of trees at all local schools is moved to May 24 from May 8 because of bad weather.

May 19 1967 – There is a serious accident at a fireworks display held at the Munroe Shopping Centre.

May 1967 – Four Public Works employees are fired for unsatisfactory service, H. Payment, H. Proulx, F. Moskwa and W. Coleman

May 1967 – Raleigh Park (Anderson Park) is to be leveled so it may be used as a recreational area.

May 1967 – The Reception and Reunion Committee of Miles MacDonell Collegiate asks Council's permission to go door to door on May 16 1967 for money for the J. E. Scarrow Scholarship Fund.

May 1967 – Council is told that the East Kildonan Centennial Ball lost \$584.41, \$1000.00 had been set aside for the loss in the Centennial Budget.

May 1967 – The Province of Manitoba gives East Kildonan a cheque for \$500.00 to help cover the cost of a full time recreational director hired in late 1966.

May 1967 – Clarence Wayne Eliuk is hired as a Police Clerk at \$200.00 per month.

June 1967 – The River East School Division Budget is set at \$5,350,111.10 for 1967. It is to receive \$4,354,214.10 from the Province and \$954,771.54 from the special levy.

June 1967 – John Forsyth Whyte is hired as a Police Constable.

June 1967 – A fireworks display is approved for the East Kildonan Centennial Day on July 3 1967.

June 1967 – Some businesses ceasing operations in East Kildonan in the first part of 1967 include

Donut House Ltd – 835.5 Henderson Highway

Sydney Beauty Parlor – 299 Sydney

East Kildonan Cycle Shop – 855 Henderson

June 1967 – Residents have the opportunity to purchase Centennial Trees for their property for \$2.00 each.

June 1967 – The sanitary landfill hours for the site on Kimberly are 8:00 AM to 5:00 PM weekdays and 8:00 AM to 12:00 Noon on Saturdays.

June 1967 – Lanes to be paved are

Lane between Helmsdale and Dunrobin from Kildonan Drive to Woodvale

Lane between Trent and Donalda from Brazier to Roch.

June 1967 – A ½ ton pickup truck is to be purchased for \$2,300.00.

June 1967 – The exterior of city hall is decorated for the Centennial Celebrations.

June 1967 – Ronald William Kolbauer is hired as a Police Constable.

July 1967 – Rossmere Golf and Country Club is \$6,000.00 behind in its mortgage payments. Rossmere had 350 members in 1966 but this number has fallen to 280 members in 1967. The City of East Kildonan is asked for financial help. One of the conditions East Kildonan insists on is that green fees for public play be lowered to \$2.00.

July 1967 – Citizen's Day on July 3 begins with a boat ride on the Paddle Wheel Queen for senior citizens. The seniors are given the ride free of charge, all others pay 25 cents, for the 1:30 to 3:00 ride. At 3:00 the Paddle Wheel Queen is met at by a flotilla of canoes and a barge with a person portraying Lord Selkirk arriving at Red River. The official ceremony begins with a program of family sports and games including a treasure hunt for Pan Am Games tickets at 7 PM. This is followed by a stage show and fireworks display.

November 1967 – The Centennial Committee is not entirely satisfied with the manuscript for the Centennial History of East Kildonan and as a result the decision is made not to publish it. (The manuscript contains almost no information on the history of East Kildonan in the 20th Century.) All people who have preordered the book receive a refund.

November 1967 – Council makes an offer of \$12,000 to purchase the former Poundkeeper’s property at 2062 Plessis in North Kildonan for a dog pound.

December 1967 – C. J. Garvie is sworn in as a new Alderman to fill the unexpired term of former Alderman S. C. McLeod.

December 1967 – The name Weedon is to be used in the new Braeside Subdivision.

December 1967 – A dinner is to be arranged for members of the Centennial Committee for their contribution during 1967.

January 1968 – Mayor M. Ruta, Aldermen W. H. Irvine, S. Dowhan, C. J. Garvie, J. Huyda, N. P. Stapon and A. J. Reid

January 1968 – Council is told that longtime East Kildonan Public Works Foreman died on January 1.

January 1968 – Jim Smith Secretary of the Kiwanis Club of East Kildonan tells Council of a East Kildonan Kiwanis Club proposal to build a further 12-24 senior homes at Oakview and Golspie.

January 1968 – A special Committee of Council is formed to meet with North Kildonan and Transcona on the amalgamation of services between the 3 areas.

Mr. Hart has been consistently opposed to government money being spent on anything. He has opposed all money by-laws regardless of the subject or the need.

February 1968 – East Kildonan and North Kildonan decide to have a common dog pound in North Kildonan. East Kildonan is to pay 70% of the costs in 1968.

April 1968 – There are complaints about the resident at 332 Hazeldell who has 5 cars in his backyard of which 3 are wrecks.

April 1968 – The YMCA receives a grant of \$4,000.00.

April 1968 – Council purchases 42,000 gallons of # 2 gasoline for 33.9 cents per gallon and 15,000 gallons of # 2 diesel for 20.5 cents per gallon.

April 1968 – A stop sign is placed on the southwest corner of Brazier at Donalds.

May 1968 – The Lane between Washington and Ottawa is to be paved from Watt to Trueman.

May 1968 – Metro Councillors raise their indemnity from \$3600.00 per year to \$4800.00 per year. East Kildonan opposes this increase.

May 1968 – Constables S. Sallee and J. Whyte are commended for apprehending the criminals breaking into the Shop-Easy Store on Watt St. on February 3 1968. The store was a victim of a previous break in on December 1 1967.

May 1968 – A 4 storey 62 suite apartment block is to be built on the west side of Brazier between the Northdale Shopping Centre and Maxwell Place.

May 1968 – William Marks is hired as a Police Clerk. Mrs. E. Hinds is hired as the Police Stenographer at \$250.00 per month replacing Mrs. E. Benoit who has resigned.

May 1968 – Public Works Employees to be placed on standby once every 11 weeks for which they will receive an extra \$25.00 for that week.

May 1968 – East Kildonan is to buy land immediately west of the present landfill site for a new landfill site.

May 1968 – The National Fire Code (1963) is adopted as the fire code for East Kildonan.

May 1968 – Stop signs are placed at Roberta and Golspie.

May 1968 – Addition to Neil Campbell School, Hampstead School and Salisbury School are approved.

June 1968 – The Chelsea Grocery at 299 Chelsea closes.

June 1968 – The Dental Clinic at the Kildonan-St. Paul Health Unit is to receive a grant of \$1,000.00.

June 1968 – The lane between Washington and Ottawa is to be paved from Brazier to Roch.

June 1968 – The parking by-law is to be enforced again; no parking of more than one hour between 3 AM and 6 AM.

July 1968 – A sewer is to be constructed on London from Prince Rupert to Munroe to service the addition to Salisbury School. The sewer will cost an estimated \$40,000.00.

July 1968 – Council is told that the School Board has already spent \$5,000.00 in repairing windows of local schools in 1968 due to vandalism.

July 1968 – A new Mennonite Church opens at Munroe and Louelda.

July 1968 – The East Kildonan Horticultural Society is given a grant of \$25.00 to assist in their garden contests.

July 1968 – Assistant Engineer R. Stromberg resigns.

July 1968 – Raleigh is to be paved from Kimberly to Oakland.

August 1968 – The house at 421 Bowman is being rented for \$55.00 per month while the house at 595 McLeod is being rented for \$160.00 per month.

August 1968 – Residents of the 500 and 600 blocks of Roberta are opposed to the Rossmere Golf and Country Club building a chain link fence around its property on Roberta. The residents feel it will damage their property values. The club feels the fence is needed to keep out unauthorized individuals off the golf course

August 1968 – Council approves the building of a personal care home on Kimberly next to the proposed new Concordia Hospital site near Highway 59.

August 1968 – Many local residents complain of the odor and noise coming from the National Products Plant at Watt and Ottawa.

August 1968 – The Margaret Hood Memorial Gazebo is to be built in Centennial Park at a cost of \$3229.50.

August 1968 – Asphalt paving is approved for

1. Besant from Munroe to the Southern City Limits
2. Bronx from Watt to Golspie
3. Kimberly from Watt to Golspie
4. Helmsdale from Watt to Golspie

August 1968 – Weedon Street is to be widened but it will require an expropriation of property to do it.

August 1968 – No parking signs are placed near the intersection of Munroe and Louelda.

August 1968 – A money bylaw is to be sent to the voters for \$350,000.00 to construct a new \$310,000.00 Public Safety Building and a new \$40,000.00 pumper truck. The proposed building is to have a floor space of 14,521 square feet including the basement

August 1968 – Council is told that the Public Works Department has completed 25,306 feet of repairs to sidewalks in 1968 to August 1968.

September 1968 – Council is told that the Rossmere Golf and Country Club consists of 120 acres of land, the City of East Kildonan owns 50%. The City owned property is leased to the club for 50 years at \$1.00 per year.

September 1968 – Council is told that vandalism is becoming a big concern at local schools. In the last 5 years almost \$75,000.00 in vandalism has been done to East Kildonan schools.

September 1968 – The Parks Board recommends that Council dissolve it along with the Community Centre Board.

September 1968 – J. Hilderman of 630 Helmsdale asks for lighting in the back lane to combat petty vandalism. He tells Council his home was broken into as a result of the darkness at night.

September 1968 – Chief Constable Chris Einfeld is elected President of the Canadian Association of Chiefs of Police.

September 1968 – Members of the East Kildonan Police Department receive a 16% increase. Their long time service pay is also increased to 15 cents per day after 10 years service from 10 cents per day. Their long time service pay is increased to 35 cents per day from 20 cents per day for 20 years of service.

September 1968 – A preliminary study of the effect of a total amalgamation of East Kildonan and North Kildonan would see a 1.77 Mill Rate decrease for East Kildonan residents and a 3.67 Mill Rate increase for North Kildonan residents.

October 1968 – Mr. F. Gall of 174 Greene complains that the new sidewalk laid down on Greene that summer was not necessary as the old sidewalk was in good condition and the money could have been spent on fixing the backlane.

October 1968 – Inspector Moreau of the Police Department receives a 20 year long service medal.

October 1968 – The Centennial Gas Torch at City Hall is converted to a gaslight and remained 'The Lamp of Life'; the cost of natural gas is estimated at \$1.50 per month.

October 1968 – A meeting is held with the province for acquiring land for the proposed Technical-Vocational school. The province is interested in building it on the south side of Munroe with frontage on both Munroe and Highway 59. The school board wants to build it on Kimberly.

October 1968 – Mr. Robert Whitlaw speaking for 6 other residents near the William Payjack family at 464 Jamison have many complaints about the family. There are 2 adults and 14 children living in the 3-bedroom house. There are 17 children in all but 3 live elsewhere. Residents complain that the children relieve themselves outside. They go through neighbour's garbage cans sometimes eating some of the contents, then throw the rest of the garbage all over the area. They are always going through the garbage cans at the hall at Jamison and Watt after banquets and eating the leftovers, They are accused of ruining gardens by stealing the vegetables and ripping out the flowers. There is constant loud swearing at all hours by the adults as well as the children. The residents in the houses next to them say that bricks have been used to pound the sides of their homes. There are outside parties lasting to 3 in the morning. They rifle through unlocked cars. People are sometimes unable to pass the house because of the almost constant throwing of stones at people. The ice cream bicycle refuses to come down their street because of the threat of being forced to hand over free ice cream. Paperboys are afraid of having their collection money stolen. Local residents are afraid to call the police because of the fear of retaliation The family due to its large size regularly receives financial help from the City. Residents feel the family is totally out of control. The family feels their neighbours want to drive families like them out of East Kildonan because they are a large family. Council orders the police to investigate the family and the Children's Aid Society of Winnipeg is called in.

October 1968 – East Kildonan passes a motion in support of the complete amalgamation of Metro Winnipeg, as it would be the most equitable solution.

October 1968 – The money by-law to fund the Public Safety Building is defeated in the referendum

October 1968 – Leonard Wayne Blanco is hired as a Police Clerk.

November 1968 – An agreement is reached with North Kildonan to develop a joint garbage disposal area. All the garbage from both East and North Kildonan is to be hauled to the East Kildonan Disposal Grounds until June 1 1969. After this date all the garbage is to be hauled to the new disposal grounds being constructed in North Kildonan.

November 1968 – A boy drowns in the YMCA Pool on Kimberly.

November 1968 – East Kildonan's equalized assessment is now \$47,953,000.00.

November 1968 – Miss Barbara Edmunds resigns from the Office Staff.

November 1968 – East Kildonan considers buying a Breathalyzer.

November 1968 – A feasibility study is done to develop a ski hill at the landfill site.

November 1968 – The Meter Reader Leonard Kosowan is dismissed for unsatisfactory work.

November 1968 – The expansion of 25 separate units is approved for the Kiwanis Seniors Home at Oakview and Golspie.

December 1968 – Lane paving is approved for the lane west of and parallel to Henderson from Bredin Drive south.

December 1968 – Library Board employees receive a 9% increase.

December 1968 – Council states that it does not always agree with the public statements of Chief Constable Einfeld. Recently the Chief Constable made a public statement that he was strongly in favour of corporal punishment.

December 1968 – A 2-storey addition is approved for the East Kildonan Baptist Church at 700 Watt.

December 1968 – Businesses ceasing operations in 1968 include

January 1969 – Mr. Arthur Wayne Lloyd is to be hired as a Police Clerk.

January 1969 – East Kildonan is to begin the construction of the ski hill along Kimberley with an estimated 75 tons of industrial garbage per day.

October 1969 – Prince Edward Legion must now pay property taxes as a result of a change in the Municipal Act. The new act states licensed premises can not be exempted from property taxes.

April 1970 – Council expresses concern about a ‘Love In’ to be held at Assiniboine Park. The organizer say it will include ‘way out music’, 5000 sticks of incense sticks will be used and possibly ‘grass’.

April 1970 – the Province tells Council that there will be no municipal elections in Metro Winnipeg in 1970 as the Province is considering changing the municipal boundaries.

April 1970 – The old Highway 59 may be closed according to some provincial officials.

April 1970 – The ski hill on Kimberly has now reached its maximum height.

April 21 1970 – A meeting is held at Miles MacDonell Collegiate to discuss youth problems.

April 1970 – The total East Kildonan Foundation Levy is \$632,700.00 for 1970.

April 1970 – The East End Barons Hockey Club win the Provincial Juvenile Championship.

April 1970 – Constable D. Smith resigns from the Police Department.

April 1970 – Three 2-½-storey 27-suite apartment blocks are to be constructed on Munroe near Molson.

May 1970 – The new author of the History of East Kildonan Margaret Kennedy is given \$100.00 to cover expenses of research.

May 1970 – Council is told that the Centennial Committee will host a variety show at the Concert Hall on October 12 1970. A pet cat show is also authorized with a grant of \$150.00. Filming of the River East Festival of the Arts involving local school children is also authorized with a grant of \$400.00.

May 1970 – It is determined that the average cost of disposal at the sanitary landfill site is \$1.62 per ton. Council sets the commercial disposal rate at \$1.75 per ton.

May 1970 – The Chairman of the River East School Division J. G. Smith makes a presentation to Council on the School Board's attempts to improve the facilities at Lord Wolseley School. This is in response to Mayor Dowhan's comments to the news media that parents of children at Lord Wolseley "were getting the runaround by the School board".

May 1970 – Reports reach council that East Kildonan's taxes are the second highest in the Metro Winnipeg area.

June 1970 - More than 300 resident sign a petition for a traffic light or a 4-way stop at Kimberly and Watt.

June 1970 – Ten East Kildonan Police Officers are to provide assistance for the Royal Visit of June 14-15 1970.

June 1970 – Council is opposed to a proposal for low cost housing in Braeside Village as it would cause serious overcrowding problems in the local school and it is a departure from the plans for the area and it would reduce the revenue of East Kildonan.

June 1970 – The final costs for the Centennial Ball are \$5,636.16 with revenues of \$4,456.00.

July 1970 – Alderman W. H. Irvine passes away suddenly.

July 1970 – Council is told that the Water and Sewer Utility had a deficit of \$19,109.00 in 1969.

July 1970 – Council appeals the Metro decision to remove the four ways stop at Gateway and Munroe.

July 1970 – A sidewalk is constructed from Golspie and Oakview to the western boundary of Centennial Park a distance of 700 feet at a cost of \$2,000.00.

July 1970 – The charge for a family of 4 staying at the Curtis Hotel is \$11.00 per night.

July 1970 – A fireworks display is approved for August 3 1970 at Fraser's Grove Park; the cost is \$525.00.

July 1970 – An apartment block is approved for a site immediately west of the fire station on Kimberly.

July 1970 – There are complaints about the noise created by young people at the Salisbury House at Henderson Highway at Bowman at all hours of the night. There are also complaints about young people congregating at the Shell Service Station at Roberta and Henderson Highway especially the noise of motorcycles early in the morning.

August 1970 – The East Kildonan Centennial Parade is held on August 3.

August 1970 – A 4-way stop is approved for Kimberly and Watt on a 3-month trial period.

August 1970 – Asphalt paving is approved for

September 1970 – Former Mayor M. Ruta returns to Council as the newly elected Alderman.

September 1970 – Fleming is to be closed from Gateway to London on September 25 to allow residents on the street to stage Centennial Celebrations. Events to be staged include a barbecue, novelty contests, street dancing and fireworks.

September 1970 – The River East School Division announces its intention to withdraw from participation in the Kildonan-St. Paul Health Unit Dental Clinic for pre-schoolers.

September 1970 – The cost of East Kildonan rental of the Paddlewheel Riverboats on August 3 East Kildonan Citizenship is \$475.00.

September 1970 – A 100 unit low rental housing rental townhouses are to be built south of Keenleyside.

September 1970 – There is more basement flooding in the Larchdale Crescent area during heavy rainfalls.

September 1970 – Mr. Ron Kostiniuk is hired for temporary work for the Survey Department for \$390.00 per month to replace Mr. K. McCaul who has resigned.

October 1970 – The total audit fees for East Kildonan are \$8,850.00 for 1970.

November 1970 – A letter of condolence is sent to Mrs. Laporte and a letter wishing a safe return of Mr. Cross is sent to Mrs. Cross after a discussion of the War Measures Act.

November 1970 – Miss Kennedy tells Council that she will finish her history of East Kildonan by the end of 1970.

November 1970 – The staff of the Henderson Regional Library number 7.

November 1970 – Council is told that the cost of a new fire pumper for East Kildonan would cost between \$35,000.00 and \$36,000.00.

November 1970 – The East Kildonan Centennial Committee tells Council that it will participate in one final project collecting clothing toys etc. for needy children in Red Sucker Lake, Shamattawa and Wasagamack in Northern Manitoba. The committee works with the Share Christmas group.

November 1970 – The house at 470 Jamison is placarded as being unfit for human habitation.

November 1970 – The assessment roll for Realty and personal property is valued at \$53,425,410 for 1971.

November 1970 – Council is told that children at 262 Washington are playing with rats inside the house. The school age children are not attending school. There are 3 unlicensed dogs inside the house. Beer and garbage is scattered throughout the house and yard.

November 1970 – Some members of council are irritated with the mayor's comments to the media regarding the new police station. They feel the mayor is not a team player and shoots from the hip too often.

November 1970 – Some aldermen feel that long sideburns on some firefighters distract from their appearance.

November 1970 – The Walter Payjack family with 17 children with 14 children still at home receive \$443.30 per month in aid from the city on top of Mr. Payjack's salary of \$624.95 per month.

Huyda will both run for the same seat in the new Winnipeg City Council but both will lose to James G. Smith Chairman of the River East School Division. N. P. Stapon and R. B. Matheson will run against each other for a new Council seat but N. P. Stapon will be elected to the new Council remaining a member until he retires in 1977. Alderman Ruta, who is also a former Mayor of East Kildonan will be defeated by Mayor Dowhan in 1971, but defeats him in 1974 before losing his Council seat in 1977.

August 1971 – Bill 36 creating Unicity receives Royal Assent it is to come into effect January 1 1972.

August 1971 – Alderman Ruta and Mayor Dowhan announce they will be seeking election in the new Unicity Ward of Miles MacDonell. Aldermen Stapon and Matheson announce they will seek election in the new Unicity Ward of Springfield Heights.

August 1971 – The corner stone for the new senior citizen apartment on the west side of Henderson Highway just north of the building at McLeod is laid.

August 1971 – A home near Fraser's Grove Park is broken into when it started to rain. The vandals cause considerable damage to the home.

August 1971 – Council is told that Concordia Hospital will only have 132 beds instead of the 200 first planned.

August 1971 – Council is told that children are riding their bicycles down the ski hill a dangerous practice.

August 1971 – J. Leclair resigns from the Survey Department. Mrs. E. A. Hinds is hired as a Clerk Stenographer in the Police Department.

August 1971 – A beer garden is to be held on the Melrose Community Club grounds by the Afro-Caribbean Association of Manitoba.

August 1971 – The low rental housing area at Keenleyside and Kent Road is the scene of willful damage to the boulevards and yards.

September 1971 – The treehouses are removed from the grounds of Angus McKay School.

September 1971 – Stop signs are placed on all east/west streets intersecting Kildonan Drive.

September 1971 – Sergeant E. A. Carson receives a 20 year long service medal from the Police Department.

September 1971 – The allowance for children of parents on welfare for school supplies is raised to \$3.00 from \$2.00.

September 1971 – Council is told that Miss Kennedy will have her history of East Kildonan completed by November.

September 1971 – Council is told that the cost of Automatic Protection Signals on McLeod Avenue will cost \$15,900.00 with annual maintenance charges of \$700.00.

September 1971 – Salaries for Survey Crew

September 1971 – Perfanick Bros Trucking and Supply Ltd announce they are selling out to Kleen-Pak Disposal Ltd.

November 1971 – Mr. W. Wasinta of 941 Connery is hired a Crossing Guard at the Bennest Railway Crossing at \$2.00 per hour.

November 1971 – A crosswalk is to be installed at Roch and Neil after a fatal traffic accident occurs there on October 23 1971.

November 1971 – Realty and Personal Property Assessments Rolls are set at \$54,552,160.00 for 1972 up from \$52,551,840.00 in 1971.

November 1971 – Salaries

January 1 1972 Midnight –The City of East Kildonan ceases to exist.
