

## East Kildonan Council History 1940 – 1949

January 1940 – Reeve W. P. Larsen, Councillors T. Sorley, G. Suttie, H. Payne and S.D. Brown

January 1940 – There are complaints about a mink farm at 351 Leighton Avenue.

January 1940 – Total Tax Collections for  
1939 - \$228,615.42  
1938 - \$219,521.06

January 1940 – Council offers 660 Linden for sale for \$250.00 and the adjoining lot for \$25.00.

January 1940 – East Kildonan asks the Imperial Bank for \$20,000.00 of temporary credit.

January 1940 – The Municipal Commissioner's levy is set at \$4,856.03 for 1940.

January 1940 – East Kildonan is paying quarterly payments of \$266.36 to the Greater Winnipeg Sanitary District.

January 1940 – The total school board budget is \$97,720.00 for 1940 with \$84,800 of that required to come from property taxes.

January 1940 – Complaints continue about the overcrowded streetcars at rush hour. The scheduled time between streetcars on Henderson Highway during rush hour is every 10 minutes.

February 1940 – There are reports of trees illegally being cut down along the riverbank in the vicinity of 592 Henderson Highway. The trees are being cut down by people using the site for a toboggan site. Council warns those cutting down the trees not to do so or else the site will be removed as a place for tobogganing.

February 1940 – Council is to rent 4 Neil Place to Mr. Neil M. Campbell for \$15.00 per month and is to also rent 451 Trent for \$12.00 per month as well as 501 Bowman for \$10.00 per month.

February 1940 – Council passes East Kildonan By-Law 1008 which is the sale of 619 Munroe to Dan and Pearl Melnyk (parents of future teacher and River East Superintendent Walter Melnyk) for \$250.00, \$100.00 of that in cash and the rest at \$7.50 per month at 6% interest. They had made a previous offer of \$175.00, which had been turned down.

March 1940 – The school board asks East Kildonan to turn over to it, the vacant municipal land surrounding the 4 schools so it can expand the school grounds of each school. One parcel of land across from Polson School on the north side of Munroe between Roch and Brazier will eventually become the school grounds of the present Polson School. This piece of property is being used as a football field. Prince Edward School, which presently only has a small piece of school ground, will see its property expand to the entire area between Roch and Brazier between Neil and the lane north of Trent. A vacant piece of land east of the present Lord Wolseley School will become the present site of John Henderson Junior High. Salisbury School will gain the area from the lane west of the school to Wallace (London) between Prince Rupert and Fleming.

March 1940 – Council is informed that a son of Mr. M. Zonneveld at 258 Dunrobin, is taking water from the water tap and carrying it to other residents who are not paying for it because they can not afford to do so.

March 1940 – The Greater Winnipeg Water District levy for 1940 is \$10,927.40.

April 1940 – The Elks Club, the group running the rink on Chelsea, ask council to leave the shack on the site so it can be used by those playing baseball and volleyball during the summer months.

April 1940 – The food allowance for those on relief is increased by 5 cents per person every 2 weeks. The number of people on relief is falling, as men begun to enlist for the war and war goods are needed.

April 1940 – Council is told that of 28 kegs of beer stored at Kisil's store 2 kegs went to 757 Government for a beer party and some to a house on Consol. The residents of both of these houses are on relief. In order to buy beer or any other alcoholic beverage one must obtain a license first and those on relief can not receive such a license, as liquor is not allowed to be given to relief recipients.

April 1940 – Tenders are called for a new police cruiser car.

April 1940 – Unauthorized individuals are taking water from the water tap on Leighton Avenue.

April 1940 – Council is to purchase a 6 cubic yard capacity garbage dump truck for \$1,985.60.

April 1940 – Council is to rent 674 Government for \$5.00 per month.

April 1940 – There are reports of a large number of dogs running loose in the municipality.

April 1940 – Council is told that a cow is illegally being kept behind 246 Munroe.

May 1940 – Mr. F. Lange of the East Kildonan Lawn Bowling Club asks for special consideration in the providing of water for the clubhouse and greens. Council grants them water at 15 cents per 1,000 gallons.

May 1940 – Land adjacent to Mrs. Crewe's property at 465 Oakview is sold to her for \$50.00 cash.

May 1940 – Council is to rent 516 Trent for \$18.00 per month and 141 Rossmere Avenue for \$20.00 per month.

May 1940 – The Imperial Bank is to give East Kildonan credit worth \$75,000.00.

May 1940 – Under pressure from the Provincial Government East Kildonan is now to inspect and regulate dairies in East Kildonan and license all milk and cream vendors.

May 1940 – East Kildonan is now to license and regulate bicycles.

May 1940 – There are reports that some people on Henderson Highway are parking in the 30 minute parking zone and then staying for more than 2 hours. A barber in the area complains the police are turning a blind eye to the problem.

May 1940 – East Kildonan Police now have access to a patrol boat on the Red River, belonging to the Winnipeg - St. Boniface Harbour Commission. East Kildonan had recently joined the organization.

May 1940 – The Police are told to enforce the early closing hours of all barbershops and hairdressing shops in East Kildonan.

May 1940 – The new Police Cruiser car is bought from Dominion Motors.

May 1940 – East Kildonan contributes money to the Winnipeg Anti-Mosquito campaign.

May 1940 – One block of Bowman, one block of Munroe one block of Helmsdale and 1000 feet of Watt St. are treated with calcium chloride to hold down the dust.

May 1940 – The Catholic Youth Organization is given permission to use the grounds of the old ward 1 community club for tennis courts.

May 1940 – A water tap is approved for the 300 block of Winterton.

June 1940 – It is reported to council that garbage is being illegally buried and burned on the site of the Roxy Grounds.

June 1940 – The East Kildonan Police Budget for 1940 is \$8,430.00.

June 1940 – The new police car is damaged in an accident.

June 1940 – The grounds of Lord Wolseley are enlarged and the site is to be used for athletic purposes for field days and other events.

June 1940 – Lots with river frontage with sewer and water are to be offered for sale at \$15.00 per foot frontage.

June 1940 – D. Christie is to be employed as a full time Police Constable at \$100.00 per month.

July 1940 – The lane immediately east of Lord Wolseley School is to be closed and added to the school grounds.

July 1940 – Brazier is gravelled between Linden and Greene and Greene Avenue is graded between Henderson and Watt.

July 1940 – Cows are illegally being watered at the Linden and Hoskin wells.

August 1940 – East Kildonan employees are encouraged to buy war saving stamps.

August 1940 – A large hole is reported in the street in front of Pelletiers's store at Brazier and Jamison.

August 1940 – Council is to rent 704 Fleming for \$15.00 per month with an option to purchase for \$700.00.

September 1940 – The police cruiser is damaged once again in an accident, Chief of Police Coley is injured and is off work.

October 1940 – Council is to turn 425 Henderson Highway into a Municipal Hall at an estimated cost of \$2,000.00.

October 1940 – Council is to sell 171 Bronx for \$1,850.00, \$250.00 of that is in cash and the rest is to be paid at the rate of \$25.00 per month at 6% interest.

October 1940 – Council offers for sale  
180 Leighton for \$3,500.00  
190 Greene for \$3,500.00

October 1940 – The rent on 126 Roberta is \$5.00 per month.

October 1940 – The East Kildonan School Board asks for space in the new Municipal Offices at 425 Henderson Highway, the School Board is presently located in Lord Wolseley School.

October 1940 – A new Underwood typewriter is purchased for \$171.00.

October 1940 – Council is to sell 6 Hughson for \$415.00.

October 1940 – The Ukrainian Labour Farmers Temple property on Watt is removed from the list of properties on the tax sales list. It had been shut down and seized by the Federal Government at the beginning of World War Two.

November 1940 – Watt St. is reported to be in poor condition around the streetcar tracks.

November 1940 – Council is to rent 135 Rossmere Avenue for \$15.00 per month in the winter months and \$25.00 per month in the summer months.

November 1940 – A small rink is approved for Helmsdale Avenue.

November 1940 – The shack is moved from the St. Alphonsus rink to the site of the community rink.

November 1940 – A rink is approved for a site north of 543 Trent.

November 1940 – The sewer outlets are fenced in.

December 2 1940 – The first meeting at the new Municipal Hall at 425 Henderson at Washington is held. The hall is insured for loss and damage for the amount of \$2,700.00. The school board wanted to move there from their offices at Lord Wolseley School but are told there is no room for them.

December 1940 – A rink is to be flooded adjacent to 264 Bowman.

December 1940 – The cost of an average pair of eyeglasses for someone on relief is \$4.00.

December 1940 – The special relief vouchers are given out with the same rates as 1939.

January 1941 – Reeve W. P. Larsen, Councillors T. Sorley, G. Suttie, S. D. Brown and H. Payne

January 1941 – M. K. Morgan at 833 Henderson Highway is added to the list of agents for the collection of agents for the collection of water bills and sewer rental charges.

January 1941 – East Kildonan asks for a line of credit of \$20,000.00 from the Imperial Bank.

January 1941 – The Municipal Commissioner's levy is \$4,687.27 for 1941.

January 1941 – The burglary insurance on the Municipal Hall is raised to \$2,000.00.

January 1941 – The relief rate is increased 5 cents per person every 2 weeks.

January 1941 – The price of cordwood for relief purposes rises

Tamarac - \$7.00 per cord

Pine - \$6.50 per cord

Poplar - \$5.25 per cord

January 1941 – Tax collections for

January 1941 – The police car is damaged in an accident.

January 1941 – The fire hall gets a shaft for drying the fire hose, previously the drying of fire hoses had been done at Polson School.

February 1941 – The people of Morse Place ask again for better mail service. Morse Place only gets one mail delivery and pick up per day. The rest of East Kildonan has 2 mail deliveries and pickups per day.

February 1941 – A grant of \$50.00 is given to the Winnipeg and St. Boniface Harbour Commission.

February 1941 – Council is to rent 118 Linden for \$30.00 per month.

February 1941 – The 1941 Mill Rate

General Municipal Rate – 30.0 Mills

Municipal Commissioner's Levy – 1.6 Mills

General Debenture Rate – 2.9 Mills

Greater Winnipeg Water District – 16.4 Mills

Sewer District 1 – 2.5 Mills

February 1941 – Thieves break into the Municipal Offices and the Prince Edward Legion on the same day.

March 1941 – The Morse Place streetcar shelter's window is broken again and the shelter is reported to be in a filthy condition.

March 1941 – The summer cottage at 862 Kildonan Drive is to be rented for \$80.00 for the season while 864 Kildonan Drive is to be rented for \$100.00 for the season.

March 1941 - The police cruiser car is damaged again.

March 1941 – George Ronnander’s mink farm at 351 Leighton is to be shut down on or before September 1 1941, as there have been numerous complaints about the minks.

March 1941 – A reward of \$25.00 is offered leading to the conviction of any person guilty of committing a nuisance or damaging or defacing the Morse Place streetcar shelter.

March 1941 – Council rents 226 Leighton for \$25.00 per month

March 1941 – Selkirk McPhail resigns as Poundkeeper.

March 1941 – Council is told that under the Dominion Housing Scheme a house built for \$3,000.00 would require a down payment of \$600.00 cash and the payments would be \$26.50 per month.

March 1941 – Frank Weedon is appointed as the Caretaker of the Municipal Hall at \$75.00 per month.

March 1941 – Council grants Messrs. Pace, Ferguson and Miller the right to list all lots for sale that are owned by East Kildonan on lots served by sewer and water.

March 1941 – The fire truck is damaged in an accident.

March 1941 – East Kildonan’s Police Department now consists of 5 officers.

April 1941 – Police Chief Coley and Constables J. Walker, T. Fenn, D. Christie and G. J. Russell are called into Council regarding the burglary of the Municipal Office on February 19 1941 and other matters relating to the Police Department.

April 1941 – B. Koper at 377 Henderson Highway complains about drunken boys hanging out at the fish and chip store and snack bars. He complains the boys are using the back of his store as a lavatory especially after 12 midnight on Saturday nights.

April 1941 – The police car is put back into working condition after a \$150.00 repair bill. The 2 officers involved in the accident Fenn and Walker lose a week’s pay.

April 1941 – The Radio Oil and Refinery Company asks for some of the municipal business as it has paid \$18,000.00 in taxes in the last 6 years.

April 1941 – The Bridge over the McLeod Creek on Henderson Highway is replaced.

April 1941 – Police Constable J. I. Walker is given a leave of absence for war service for the duration of the war.

April 1941 – Council puts 401 Winterton for sale for \$1,320.00.00 the assessed value of the property.

April 1941 – Council rents  
214 Connery for \$10.00 per month  
584 Melbourne for \$12.00 per month  
1025 Henderson Highway for \$20.00 per month  
164 Helmsdale for \$27.00 per month  
660 Linden for \$6.00 per month

May 1941 – Black top is used to repair the concrete sidewalk on Ottawa east of Watt St.

May 1941 – Mr. E. King at 473 Henderson Highway is appointed as an agent for the collection of water bills and sewer rentals.

May 1941 – The East Kildonan School Board complains that rigs are driving over the grounds of Lord Wolseley because of the poor condition of Leighton Avenue.

May 1941 – The food allowance for those on relief is increased another 5 cents per person every 2 weeks.

May 1941 – Council offers 305 Leighton Avenue for sale for \$1,000.00.

June 1941 – William Brown is appointed as a special constable.

June 1941 – Council is to rent 401 Winterton Avenue to Constable G. J. Russell for \$25.00 per month with an option to purchase for \$1,325.00.

June 1941 – Rita Dartnell resigns as Stenographer and Sylvia Deering is appointed in her place at \$65.00 per month

June 1941 – The wooden platform is moved from Bronx Park to the Lord Wolseley grounds for use on June 6 1941.

June 1941 – Mr. Rudd of 418 Hazeldell asks that Brazier, Roch and Watt be gravelled and every third or fourth street in the vicinity of Hazeldell so residents can get in and out of the district.

July 1941 – A culvert is placed on Munroe Avenue at the north entrance of Polson School.

July 1941 – Hazel dell is gravelled from Henderson to Brazier.

July 1941 – Fruit peddlers pay a license fee of \$10.00 per year and all other peddlers pay \$2.00 per year.

July 1941 – Lots served by sewer and water are offered for sale; lots along Henderson Highway sell for \$3.00 a foot, those west of Henderson except for those on the riverbank sell for \$2.00 a foot. Those on the 200 block of Munroe, Donald and Neil, also sell for \$2.00 a foot, all other lots sell for \$1.00 a foot.

July 1941 – Mr. P. Smith of 358 Leighton asks for permission to keep 25 minks on his property to November 1941. Council agrees but makes the decision to remove all fur farms from East Kildonan.

July 1941 – Mr. F. Simmons offers to sell the East Kildonan Lawn Bowling Club property to East Kildonan for \$1,200.00 or be given relief on the taxes. He says the club has expenses of \$500.00 per year not including taxes and he has only received \$125.00 from the club in the last 3 years. If he doesn't receive any consideration from Council he will plow up the greens and allow it to return to East Kildonan for taxes.

July 1941 – East Kildonan offers 76 Leighton for sale for \$2,681.69.

August 1941 – All employees of East Kildonan earning less than \$2000.00 a year are placed under the Unemployment Insurance Plan.

August 1941 – Council sells 231 Munroe for \$3,735.45.

August 1941 – An epidemic of infantile paralysis (polio) occurs in East Kildonan, 15 cases are identified over 50% of the cases are in the Bowman Avenue area. Two cases of sleeping sickness have also been reported.

August 1941 – A boxing school is set up in the shack on the Roxy Grounds.

August 1941 – A riding school wants to set up east of 1025 Henderson near McLeod but council turns it down.

September 1941 – The Olympian Athletic Club tells council that it is winding up its operations on the Roxy Grounds.

October 1941 – Mr. Sotham complains about the poor condition of the lane behind 405 Greene.

October 1941 – The Elk's ice rink on Chelsea is 180 feet by 80 feet.

November 1941 – Mrs. Prossak and her son Stephen of 412 Washington ask for a letter of character reference for Mr. John Prossak who was interned by the Federal Government for being a member of the Communist Party.

November 1941 – Council offers for sale 250 Leighton for \$500.00, 226 Leighton for \$2,500.00, 584 Melbourne for \$400.00 and 810 Consol for \$400.00.

November 1941 – Council is to rent 11 Linden for \$20.00 per month

December 1941 – The special Christmas vouchers are distributed to those on relief with the same rates as previous years.

December 1941 – The caretakers of the rinks are to be paid \$40.00 per month.

December 1941 – A small ice rink is approved for a lot immediately west of 240 Melbourne.

December 1941 – The reeve makes \$75.00 per month and councillors make \$32.50 per month.

December 1941 – There are now 45 employees of East Kildonan.

January 1942 – Reeve W. P. Larsen, Councillors H. Payne, G. Suttie, F. W. Dryden and T. Sorley

January 1942 – Total Tax Collections

1941 - \$226,027.57

1940 - \$217,443.60

January 1942 – East Kildonan applies for a temporary credit of \$20,000.00 from the Imperial Bank. East Kildonan is to pay 3% interest on all outstanding debentures.

January 1942 – The Municipal Commissioner's levy is set at \$4,739.20 for 1942.

January 1942 – Reeve Larsen is to receive an indemnity of \$900.00 for 1942 while Councillors are to receive \$390.00 for 1942.

January 1942 – The heating system is deemed insufficient for the needs of the fire hall.

January 1942 – The police cruiser car is again damaged in yet another accident.

January 1942 – Council purchases 250 feet of hose to flood the ward 3 rink and 150 feet for the ward 2 rink.

January 1942 – It is announced that all the ice rinks must close at 9 PM.

February 1942 – East Kildonan gives a grant of \$50.00 to the Winnipeg and St. Boniface Harbour Commission.

February 1942 – East Kildonan is to purchase \$5,000.00 in the Second Victory Loan Campaign.

February 1942 – The school board is asked to cut its budget to a lower level than 1941 so the school levy is set at \$82,800.00 for 1942.

March 1942 – Garden lots are offered to residents, the permit fee is \$1.00 but there is no charge for those on relief or those on old age pension. No person is allowed to have more than 2 lots and lots must border on your own property. These garden lots are called “Victory Gardens”.

March 1942 – Council sells 584 Melbourne for \$300.00.

March 1942 – The Engineer is told to move the house formally known as 477 Roberta to the northwest corner of Linden and Brazier. The house is now to be called 269 Linden and is to be advertised for sale for \$500.00 cash.

April 1942 – The water tap on Leighton Avenue is moved to the east side of the highway.

April 1942 – Mr. P. Devisscher of Oak Dairy asks that Sydney be gravelled from Watt Street east to the power lines. It is estimated that the work will require 80 cubic yards of gravel at an estimated cost of \$96.00.

April 1942 – The bridge on Munroe Avenue between Grey and Wallace (London) is to be replaced.

April 1942 – The business at 473 Henderson Highway is removed from the list of businesses able to collect water accounts.

April 1942 – The summer cottage at 860 Kildonan Drive is to be rented for \$100.00 for the season.

April 1942 – The police cruiser is stolen but when it is found, it requires repairs.

May 1942 – Sydney Avenue is gravelled from Watt, east to the power lines.

May 1942 – Total property taxes on selected properties  
272 Dunrobin - \$61.37  
222 Munroe - \$109.61  
412 Washington - \$98.63

May 1942 – There are complaints to Council that the resident of 626 Munroe has made 2 cuts through the sidewalk to run off water. He has also set up a large chicken house and has attached hog wire across the lane to a telephone pole and has extended a chicken run across the lane onto vacant lots immediately south of his own property.

May 1942 – Council is told that ice is being illegally delivered on Sundays.

June 1942 – Trent is gravelled from Watt to the power lines.

June 1942 – Mr. J. H. Rudd of 418 Hazeldell and Mr. F. A. Maurer of 412 Hazeldell ask about exchanging their property and moving their homes to a street where there is sewer and water.

June 1942 – Council announces that it is willing to settle the tax arrears on the St. Alphonsus Church property for \$3,500.00.

June 1942 – Two men who volunteered to assist the men putting out the fire at the Kildonan Canning Factory are to be paid \$5.00 each.

June 1942 – Streetlights are put on Montrose Avenue East, Helmsdale and Brazier and Canterbury Place and Kildonan Drive.

June 1942 – Hazel dell and Oakview are gravelled from Brazier to Watt.

July 1942 – Council offers for sale 305 Leighton for the assessed value of the property \$1,260.00.

July 1942 – The dog license for a regular (male) dog is set at \$2.00 per year.

July 1942 – Council offers 214 Connery for sale for \$350.00, \$100.00 of that is to be in cash, the balance at \$10.00 per month at 6% interest. Council also offers 451 Trent for sale for \$600.00 and 178 Canterbury for \$500.00.

August 1942 – The St. Alphonsus Credit Union asks for permission to move a building to the southeast corner of Munroe and Brazier or at the corner of Winterton and Brazier for their business.

August 1942 – Relief firemen in East Kildonan now receive \$3.60 a day.

August 1942 – The East Kildonan Rangers Baseball Club use the St. Alphonsus Grounds

August 1942 – Concrete sidewalks are approved for the following streets.

1. North Side of Moncton from Gateway to Grey
2. North Side of Oakview from Henderson to Brazier

A cinder sidewalk is built on the West Side of Watt from Munroe to Bronx

September 1942 – Council rejects the re-establishment of a cowbarn at 484 Oakview owned by Frank Witwicki as East Kildonan wants to phase out people keeping cattle.

September 1942 – A large amount of lumber is stolen from 543 Montrose. Lumber is in short supply during the war years.

September 1942 - Concrete Sidewalks are approved for the following streets.

1. North Side of Bowman from Roch to Watt
2. North Side of Ottawa from Henderson to Watt
3. South Side of Winterton from Henderson to Brazier
4. North Side of Trent from Watt to the power lines

September 1942 – Mr. A. Moss resigns as East Kildonan's Poundkeeper.

September 1942 – Council rents  
302 Linden for \$9.00 per month  
11 Linden for \$20.00 per month  
180 Leighton for \$25.00 per month

October 1942 – Council is told that oak trees on municipal owned land north of Linden are being cut down without permission, likely for firewood.

October 1942 – Mr. V. Snow representing the East Kildonan School Athletic Association asks for Council to decide on the policy for the skating rinks. East Kildonan Collegiate has agreed on putting two P. T. periods together on Tuesdays and Fridays from 10:30 to Noon so the boys from East Kildonan Collegiate can have hockey practice.

November 1942 – The store portion of 501 Bowman is to be rented for \$16.00 per month.

November 1942 – East Kildonan purchases \$55,000.00 worth of bonds in the Third Victory Loan Campaign.

November 1942 – It is reported that there are only 2 fuel dealers left in East Kildonan, wood is now \$8.00 per cord for black poplar, \$9.25 for white poplar and \$11.00 for tamarac.

December 1942 – A sign is placed in all shacks at East Kildonan's skating rinks. The rules prohibit loitering, swearing and smoking.

December 1942 – The Chelsea Rink Committee says it can not afford to pay for the lights at the rink and ask for a grant to pay for the lights. The committee runs a bantam hockey team and Prince Edward School uses the rink for hockey and speed skating.

December 1942 – Mr. W. E. Daneleyko and Mr. J. F. Blanchard announce that an East Kildonan Dental Clinic has been formed. It has collected \$300.00 so far but it will require \$1,000.00 to \$1,200.00 per year to operate. It plans to help 500 school children in East Kildonan but it will only do extractions and periodic checkups. It asks East Kildonan to take over the clinic or contribute to the funding.

December 1942 – Christmas vouchers are given again to all people on relief at the same rate as previous years. The number of people on relief is rapidly declining.

December 1942 – Dead end barriers are placed at the end of Linden and Helmsdale Avenues.

January 1943 – Reeve W. P. Larsen, Councillors T. Sorley, G. Suttie, F. W. Dryden and E. Boyd

January 1943 – The Imperial Bank approves an interim credit of \$20,000.00.

January 1943 – The Morse Place streetcar shelter is vandalized once more.

February 1943 – A house at 495 Oakview burns down completely because the fire department and police couldn't be reached because they were at another fire.

February 1943 – A resident asks if he could do some work on the Air Raid Precaution work in East Kildonan.

February 1943 – Council gives a grant of \$50.00 to the Winnipeg - St. Boniface Harbour Commission.

February 1943 – The total relief budget for 1943 is set at \$26,000.00.

February 1943 – East Kildonan now provides a monthly bonus to all the Municipal Employees except for the Engineer and the Secretary-Treasurer. Council is to give married employees \$12.00 per month and single employees \$8.00 per month.

February 1943 – A radio is purchased for the police cruiser car so the police can receive calls through the City of Winnipeg's radio system. The radio cost \$69.00 and the City of Winnipeg charges 20 cents per call.

March 1943 – East Kildonan pays North Kildonan to clear the snow on its portion of Bird's Hill Road (Molson / Molson).

March 1943 – East Kildonan's Justice of the Peace A. E. Dickson asks East Kildonan Council for the use of the council chambers. The fire hall where sessions have been held, is too crowded and is an unsuitable location. Sessions are held on Friday nights so council approves the request. The Justice of the Peace also asks for a by-law to control the setting of fires in East Kildonan. There have been a number of set fires that have gotten out of control causing property damage. Five young people have been charged with setting fires in the fall of 1942. The maximum fine under the Fire Prevention Act is \$20.00.

March 1943 – Council orders all the boards of all the ice rinks to be taken down March 15.

April 1943 – East Kildonan agrees to pay North Kildonan to maintain the East Kildonan portion of Bird's Hill Road.

April 1943 – Complaints reach council that boys are breaking trees on Leighton Avenue.

April 1943 – Council is to rent the summer cottage at 864 Kildonan for \$100.00 for the season.

April 1943 – Council offers 692 Linden for sale for \$300.00.

April 1943 – Miss Dell the stenographer is to be paid \$75.00 per month.

April 1943 – The Municipal and Public Utility Board reduces the bonus to be paid to all the East Kildonan Employees to \$8.00 per month for married employees and \$4.00 per month for single employees.

April 1943 – Council is to purchase \$3,000.00 in the latest Victory Loan.

April 1943 – The Washington Fuel Company on Bowman complains to council that its premises have been broken into 6 times in the previous 2 months. Wood and coal had been stolen and a fire had been sent.

May 1943 – Council is informed of problems arising with garden plots. Some residents are planting without receiving permission and not paying for a permit. Others are planting on the wrong plot and on plots reserved by their neighbours.

May 1943 – Council is to donate \$18.00 for the purchase of a trumpet for the Air Cadets Band.

May 1943 – East Kildonan says it will settle for \$500.00 for the tax arrears of St. Alphonsus Church for the years 1935-1942.

May 1943 – Part of the Salisbury # 1 School Grounds is set aside for a “Victory Garden”.

May 1943 – There are a number of Prairie fires being that are being set by youths that cause property damage. Children in all grades are reminded not to set fires.

June 1943 – Vacant land in the 300 block of Hazel dell on the north side is used for a volleyball court.

June 1943 – Dunrobin is gravelled from Henderson to Brazier.

July 1943 – Stray horses roaming East Kildonan is a problem in some areas. The problem is compounded by the fact that there is no poundkeeper to deal with horses.

July 1943 – A concrete sidewalk is approved for in front of the fire hall on Watt St.

July 1943 – A fire breaks out in the Public Works Office in the fire hall causing some damage.

July 1943 – Mr. Mike Wozniak of 491 Washington asks for a subsidy for the wood he supplies for relief recipients for the winter. He has a contract for 8000 cords of firewood but he is unable to find men to cut and load the wood in the country.

July 1943 – It is reported that some cows are being illegally grazed on Melbourne Avenue.

July 1943 – Council offers 126 Roberta for sale for \$1,400.00.

August 1943 – There is a report of a squatter living on an empty lot west of 495 Oakview.

August 1943 – There is a complaint of children breaking windows breaking windows at Kilpatrick's store.

August 1943 – A transient moves into a vacant shack at 210 Linden. He is ordered out immediately and told to leave East Kildonan immediately.

August 1943 – Complaints reach Council of the 100 cattle of Oak Dairy owned by Mr. Devisscher grazing north of the 600 block of Linden. One resident of the area has no fence around his property and he complains that the cattle are damaging his property. Council tells Mr. Devisscher that he can not allow his cattle to roam all over East Kildonan and he needs to have more than one man to herd his cattle from one section of pasture land to another.

August 1943 – Salaries are raised for all municipal employees, those at the lowest level see their wages rise from 40 to 45 cents per hour. The Chief of Police sees his salary rise to \$155.00 per month. Firemen get \$5.00 for the 14 hour long night shift and \$4.00 for the 10 - hour day shift. All employees now receive 12 days of sick days per year. Municipal employees are represented by the East Kildonan Municipal Employees Association.

August 1943 – A cow at 365 Chelsea Avenue is ordered to be removed.

September 1943 – Council sells 656 Linden is sold for \$300.00 with monthly payments of \$20.00 per month at 6% interest.

September 1943 – Miss Selma Klassen is appointed a stenographer at \$65.00 per month.

September 1943 – Linden House is to be rented for \$25.00 per month and the house is offered for sale for \$5,000.00.

September 1943 – A bonus of 35 cents is added to 14 hour long night shift of the firemen.

September 1943 – Mr. V. Trueman asks Council to re-establish the Chelsea Avenue Rink this year. There are 2 bantam and 2 midget hockey teams entered in the City League. They ask for more boards this year and a new shack. The cost to take each team around the league is \$1.50 to \$2.00 per evening. The Detroit Red Wings are to assist by providing hockey equipment

Mr. Trueman also asks Council to provide a grant towards prizes for the East Kildonan Rangers Baseball Club, which has the baseball championship 3 years in a row.

September 1943 - Council rents 118 Linden for \$30.00 per month.

September 1943 – Mr. J. Barnett of 282 Ottawa is caretaker of St. Stephen's Church at \$25.00 per month; he is 68 years old.

September 1943 – The large window of the Morse Place streetcar shelter is broken by a group of girls.

September 1943 – The area of Munroe east of the gravelled area is graded.

September 1943 – The price for cutting a cord of wood rises to \$1.25 from 75 cents.

October 1943 – The Chelsea rink is used for 4 different hockey teams on the 200-foot by 85-foot ice surface. The East Kildonan Collegiate Hockey Team uses the Ward 2 ice rink.

October 1943 – The number of people in East Kildonan on relief is down to 63 individuals.

October 1943 – East Kildonan is to purchase \$3,500.00 in the Fifth Victory Loan.

October 1943 – Council offers for sale 451 Trent for \$700.00 and 11 Linden for \$2,500.00.

October 1943 – The extra men who worked at the Radio Oil fire are to be paid \$5.00 each.

October 1943 – The deep well pump at 1025 Henderson Highway is to be repaired.

October 1943 – Garbage is now picked up on a weekly basis, an improvement on the bi-weekly service.

October 1943 – The caretakers at the 4 East Kildonan schools are sworn in as special constables for Halloween evening. This is done to prevent the kind of vandalism that has occurred on previous Halloweens.

November 1943 – The repairs to the grader come to \$200.00, council looks to find a used grader to replace it.

November 1943 – Council sets a minimum price of \$4,000.00 on the sale of 140 Helmsdale.

December 1943 – Fireman are now paid a flat monthly salary of \$130.00 a month the same as the police constables. The office staff now makes \$70.00 to \$165.00 monthly. The Chief of Police salary rises to \$160.00 per month.

December 1943 – The Municipal Commissioner's levy is set at \$5,839.89 for 1943 and the Greater Winnipeg Water District levy is set at \$9,002.57.

December 1943 – East Kildonan pays the Winnipeg Fire Department \$250.00 for coming to East Kildonan's aid at the Radio Oil fire.

December 1943 – Council agrees to pay men working on the tractor 70 cents per hour as demanded by the East Kildonan Municipal Employees Association.

January 1944 – Reeve W. P. Larsen, Councillors T. Sorley, G. Suttie, F. W. Dryden and E. Boyd

January 1944 – East Kildonan seeks a temporary credit of \$20,000.00 from the Imperial Bank.

January 1944 – F. Weedon Caretaker at the Municipal Hall sees his salary rise to \$90.00 per month. Other salary increases  
Stenographer Miss Dell to \$85.00 per month  
Secretary Treasurer H. A. Leigh to \$225.00 per month without the bonus

January 1944 – East Kildonan agrees to new working conditions for its employees. The office staff is granted 7 paid days of sick days per year. The Police and Firemen are granted 2 weeks of holidays per year with pay. Police and firemen are paid according to years of service.

\$110.00 per month for the first year of service  
\$120.00 per month for the second year of service  
\$130.00 per month for the third year of service  
\$135.00 per month for four and more years of service.

January 1944 – The Washington Fuel Company handles all relief orders for fuel.

February 1944 – A small rink is approved for the lot next to 469 Melbourne Avenue.

February 1944 – East Kildonan is to spend \$2,500.00 on snow removal for 1944 and \$15,500.00 on road and lane maintenance.

February 1944 – Linden House located at the foot of Linden and the Red River is sold for \$1,200.00 the taxes for 1944 on the property are \$385.21.

February 1944 – The summer cottage at 860 Kildonan Drive is rented for \$100.00 for the season.

February 1944 – Council gives a grant of \$50.00 to the Winnipeg St. Boniface Harbour Commission.

March 1944 – The East Kildonan Collegiate Boy's Hockey Team wins the championship. East Kildonan Municipal Council along with the East Kildonan School Board holds a dinner for them in the domestic science room in the Polson School Annex.

March 1944 – The Greater Winnipeg Water District Levy is set at \$8,447.15 for 1944.

March 1944 – The pumps are removed from the wells on Ottawa and Hoskin.

March 1944 – Local yearly improvement charges for sidewalk replacements are set at 10 cents per foot frontage.

March 1944 – The East Kildonan School Board complains that schools are being broken into on a regular basis.

March 1944 – Residents of the first block of Munroe east of Gateway petition for sewer and water.

March 1944 – Council is told that the Morse Place Labor Hall is in a bad state of repair and is in danger of being sold for taxes.

March 1944 – A man and his team are to receive \$1.00 per hour for municipal work.

April 1944 – Council offer lots for sale at a \$1.00 per lot on streets served by sewer and water on the condition the buyer builds a house on it within one year.

April 1944 – Council tells the Labour Council that it has not asked past relief recipients from the depression years to repay those benefits.

April 1944 – Council offers 180 Leighton for sale for \$2,870.00.

April 1944 – The Director of Public Health Nurses tells Council East Kildonan is too large to be served by only 1 Public Health Nurse, as the ideal number is 1 per 3,500 population. The population of East Kildonan is a little over 8,000.

April 1944 – The Greater Winnipeg Sanitary District levy for 1944 is \$1,829.88.

April 1944 – East Kildonan is to invest \$8,000.00 in the Sixth Victory Loan Campaign.

April 1944 – There are complaints about the quality of the well water in the 400 block of Greene.

April 1944 – Mr. Riley is hired to deal with the sale of property at a salary of \$25.00 per week.

May 1944 – The summer cottage at 864 Kildonan Drive is rented at \$100.00 for the season.

May 1944 – The new homes to be built on the Roxy Grounds (Roosevelt Place) are expected to cost around \$6,000.00 each.

May 1944 – Estimated value of homes at  
76 Leighton - \$2,500.00  
118 Linden - \$3,000.00  
190 Greene - \$3,000.00

May 1944 – Council offers 501 Bowman for sale for \$1,400.00.

May 1944 – All owners of homes on streets served by sewer and water are given 180 days to connect to them.

May 1944 – Streets advertised for concrete sidewalks as a local improvement.

1. Ottawa on the north side from Henderson to Brazier
2. Montrose on the south side from Roch to Watt
3. Helmsdale on the north side from Henderson to Kildonan Drive
4. Moncton on the north side from Wallace to Besant

May 1944 – The Public Works maintenance men are granted a week's holiday with pay and are now paid for statutory holidays.

May 1944 – A developer proposes development of the Roxy Grounds for a housing development. This area becomes Roosevelt Place.

June 1944 – The taxes on 590 Helmsdale are \$80.84 for 1944.

June 1944 – The Fair held on the Roxy Grounds by St. Alphonsus Church is shut down by the Police early because gambling is found to be going on.

June 1944 – Council offers 216 Ottawa for sale for \$3,000.00.

June 1944 – The house at 521 Greene is to be moved to a street served by sewer and water.

June 1944 – Council is told that the Ukrainian Labor Farmer Temple Association Hall which was seized by the Federal Government on June 6 1940 has suffered a total of \$1,500.00 to \$2,000.00 in damages since June 1940 due to vandalism. (The organization was banned along with all other Communist organizations in 1940 when the Communist Party was declared illegal.)

June 1944 – Mr. H. Perkolaba of 692 Linden tells Council that there is 4 feet of water in the creek in his block and this makes it impossible for area residents to get in and out with their horse and rig.

June 1944 – St. Stephens Church is given an 8-month extension to connect their Washington Avenue Mission to the sewer and water system.

June 1944 – Council sells 76 Leighton for \$2,500.00, 118 Linden for \$2,500.00, 190 Greene for \$2,800.00, 226 Leighton for \$2,500.00 and 231 Munroe for \$3,000.00. It also sells 579 Melbourne for \$250.00 on the condition that the house is moved.

July 1944 – A bridge is built over the creek on the 600 block of Linden Avenue.

July 1944 – Bronx Avenue is gravelled from Brazier to Roch and Roberta Avenue is gravelled from Roch to Watt.

July 1944 – There are 13 properties in tax arrears in East Kildonan.

August 1944 – There are a number of complaints about Jehovah Witnesses going door to door in East Kildonan.

August 1944 – Donald Cummings is placed on salary in the Municipal Office at \$110.00 per month.

August 1944 – Council sells 195 Linden for \$2,700.00.

August 1944 – The upper plate of teeth for a relief recipient costs \$30.00.

August 1944 – Council rents 541 Henderson Highway for \$30.00 per month.

August 1944 – Council offers for sale  
115 Greene for \$3,000.00  
140 Helmsdale for \$3,000.00  
141 Rossmere Avenue for \$2,500.00  
338 Leighton for \$2,100.00

August 1944 – St. Alphonsus Church asks for permission to establish a cemetery next to the church north of Munroe.

September 1944 – A new engine is approved for the police cruiser.

September 1944 – A cinder sidewalk is approved for Moncton east of Harold.

October 1944 – People taking water from the water tap on Oakview Avenue between Brazier and Roch are spilling water on the sidewalk. In the cold weather this water is turning into ice causing people to slip and fall on the sidewalk. Residents of the 200 and 300 Blocks of Oakview are told not to carry water on the sidewalk during the winter months.

October 1944 – A 4 year old boy in the 200 Block of Oakview suffers severe facial injuries when he is hit by a 9 year old boy riding a bicycle on the sidewalk. The fine for a first offence for a juvenile riding a bicycle on the sidewalk is \$1.00. The second offence involves confiscation of the bicycle.

October 1944 – Council sells 487 Ottawa for \$550.00 and 126 Roberta is offered for sale for \$1,400.00.

October 1944 – Council rents 1025 Henderson Highway for \$15.00 per month.

October 1944 – The minimum monthly charge for electricity for a private home is 54 cents per month.

October 1944 – A large number of residents in the vicinity of Munroe petition against establishing a cemetery on Munroe.

October 1944 – A watermain is laid on Brazier from Melrose to Dunrobin.

October 1944 – Streetlights are established at Hazel dell and Brazier and at the corner of Greene and Kildonan Drive.

October 1944 – The barricade over the bridge on Moncton is torn down on Halloween, several accidents occur as a result. A youth damages construction equipment on the same night.

November 1944 – The Melrose Community Hall on Melrose (Kimberly near Henderson Highway) is damaged by fire.

November 1944 – Council sells 140 Helmsdale for \$2,000.00.

November 1944 – East Kildonan is to invest \$15,000.00 in the Seventh Victory Loan Campaign.

November 1944 – Mr. J. C. Stacey is hired at \$110.00 per month for the Municipal Offices.

November 1944 – A rent of \$15.00 per month is set on the summer cottage at 860 Kildonan Drive for the winter months.

November 1944 – The Morse Place streetcar shelter has its inside boarding torn off and the largest window is broken. Several women complain they are unable to use the shelter in the evening because of threatening young people inside the shelter.

December 1944 – The 3 community rinks are to be flooded as well as one on Neil Place and a small one at the corner of Helmsdale and Woodlawn (Woodvale).

December 1944 – Council offers 4 Neil Place for sale for \$650.00.

December 1944 – A water tap is built at the corner of Dunrobin and Brazier and a fire hydrant is built at the corner of Munroe and Watt.

January 1945 – Reeve W. P. Larsen, Councillors T. Sorley, E. Boyd, G. Suttie and F. W. Dryden

January 1945 – Messrs. H. Haines, W. S. Douglas, Watt, R. Wheelans, Jonasson. A. M. Brown, Weir, E. Copeland, J. L. Bodie, Johnson and Dale ask for the use of Melrose Hall for the teens and youths of East Kildonan.

January 1945 – Council tells the renter of 860 Kildonan Drive in not favourable to the idea of turning 860 Kildonan Drive into a permanent home.

January 1945 – There are 9 property owners whose property is in tax arrears.

January 1945 – A used car is purchased for the police department as a replacement for the old police cruiser.

January 1945 – Council passes a motion condemning the service on both the East Kildonan and Morse Place streetcar runs. There are many complaints about the overcrowded streetcar service. The Winnipeg Electric Company replies that nothing can be done as the whole service is overloaded in Greater Winnipeg and because of the war no new cars can be obtained.

February 1945 – The East Kildonan Community Hall on Melrose is rented for a \$1.00 a year to the East Kildonan Community Club.

February 1945 – Council sets a price of \$1,500.00 for 418 Washington.

February 1945 – East Kildonan co-operates with the City of Winnipeg to have Greater Winnipeg designated as a congested area under emergency shelter regulations.

February 1945 – East Kildonan’s Secretary-Treasurer H. A. Leigh is told unless there is an improvement with relations between himself and the public and staff, council will appoint a new Secretary-Treasurer at the end of the year.

March 1945 – East Kildonan Collegiate ask for wood to extend the stage by 20 feet by 4 feet at the East Community Hall, so their school play can be staged.

March 1945 – The sewer collapses leading to the St. Stephens Rectory at 225 Trent.

March 1945 – Two residents on relief are cut off because they have “outsiders” living with them in an immoral relationship (living together without being married)

March 1945 – The Secretary-Treasurer H. A. Leigh resigns but Council does not accept his resignation.

March 1945 – J. Morrow’s salary is increased to \$155.00 per month.

March 1945 – The Greater Winnipeg Water District levy is set at \$7,667.41 for 1945.

March 1945 – Council is told that Frank Dowhan is dumping ashes into the ditch on Jamison.

March 1945 – East Kildonan’s population is estimated to be 8000.

March 1945 – East Kildonan provides 3 cents per resident or \$240.00 to the Greater Winnipeg Mosquito Campaign.

April 1945 – Streetlights are established on Greene between Woodlawn and Kildonan Drive and on Kildonan Drive at the intersections of Greene and Linden.

April 1945 – The hourly rate for some East Kildonan employees  
H. Goodchild – 60 cents per hour  
M. Moniuk – 50 cents per hour  
P. McPhail – 50 cents per hour  
D. Turkoyz – 62.5 cents per hour

April 1945 – The salary of the meter reader is set at 55 cents per hour.

April 1945 – Council rents 331 Roberta for \$12.00 per month.

April 1945 – Reeve Larsen is appointed the East Kildonan delegate to attend the 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Riel Rebellion Diamond Jubilee.

April 1945 – East Kildonan Stenographers taking Council Minutes are to be paid \$2.00 per meeting.

April 1945 – Mr. B. Koper complains that the Police Department is showing favoritism by allowing some businesses to remain open after hour while strictly enforcing the regulations against his business.

April 1945 – The monthly indemnity for the Reeve is \$75.00 per month while the Councillors receive \$32.50 per month.

May 1945 – Council purchases a 2 ½ yard Union Jack flag for \$9.50.

May 1945 – Mr. Horsfall is appointed Assistant to the Secretary Treasurer as well as the Accountant at \$175.00 per month.

May 1945 – Two special diggers are hired at 65 cents per hour for watermain construction while labourers are hired at 50 cents per hour.

May 1945 – The workday for the caretaker at the Municipal Hall is cut to 10 hours per day but his salary remains at \$100.00 per month.

May 1945 – Sergeant J. Walker of the Air Force is discharged to resume his police duties.

May 1945 – Council is to contribute \$15.00 towards a banquet for the East Kildonan Collegiate Senior Basketball Champions.

May 1945 – Council sells 226 Leighton for \$2,500.00.

May 1945 – Police Officers in East Kildonan work 26 days per month on 10-hour shifts at 52 cents per hour.

May 1945 – A dead mouse is taken out of the well at Brazier and Roberta.

May 1945 – North Kildonan asks East Kildonan for permission to connect to the East Kildonan watermain on Henderson Highway, so it can provide water service to some residents of North Kildonan.

May 1945 – Morse Place streetcar shelter damaged by vandals once again.

May 1945 – Stucco is approved for buildings on Henderson Highway.

May 1945 – It is reported that East Kildonan's police and firefighters are the lowest paid in the Greater Winnipeg area.

June 1945 – Men with small trucks are paid \$1.25 per hour for hauling ashes while men with large trucks are paid \$1.45 per hour.

June 1945 – Council considers selling building lots on the north side of Ottawa between Brazier and Roch east of 321 Ottawa. This area has been used as a skating rink in previous year as the Ward One Community Rink.

June 1945 – Mr. Hugh Harrison of 484 Oakview is given permission to keep chickens as long as there are no complaints from his neighbours.

June 1945 – Council sells 141 Rossmere Avenue for \$2,650.00.

June 1945 – Sewer and water services are extended on Winterton Avenue.

June 1945 – A water tap is approved for in front of 343 Winterton Avenue.

July 1945 – Mr. Tyler of Leighton Avenue asks for a street light for Leighton as his wife and daughters are afraid to walk down the street at night.

July 1945 – Council sells 302 Linden for \$400.00.

August 1945 – A woman comes to council complaining that her daughter-in-law beat her up and stole some food from her.

August 1945 – All employees working on V-J. Day are to be paid at the equivalent of 2 days of holidays or else they are given 2 days of holidays

August 1945 – Council is informed that someone on Besant has planted a garden in the middle of the roadway.

August 1945 – Mr. F. Simmonds complains that after he asked the Police Department to check his home on weekends but his house was broken into and \$15.00 was stolen. The ladder left by the thief to break into the upstairs window was left lying up against the house and no fingerprints were taken. The ladder belonged to the Fire Department but had been stolen from the Police Department to whom it had been lent for checking into vacant homes.

August 1945 – Council is forced to investigate the circumstance of a fistfight that broke out between members of the Police Department and members of the Fire Department at the Fire Hall.

September 1945 – Mr. A. J. Reid of 561 Trent complains there is no where to turn out at the end of Trent and people are using his crossing to turn around. His crossing was being torn up requiring him to spend his own money on repairs and gravel.

September 1945 – There are reports of people in Morse Place suffering from contact with poison ivy. The sidewalk on Moncton Avenue is overgrown with poison ivy and council orders that it be removed.

September 1945 – Concrete sidewalks are advertised for

1. The north side of Jamison from Watt to Grey
2. The north side of Bowman from Watt to the east end of the street
3. The north side of Washington from Watt to the end of the 600 block

October 1945 – A watermain is approved for Oakview Avenue west of Henderson Highway to Kildonan Drive and on Greene Avenue east of Roch to a point 600 feet east, to the site of the well.

October 1945 – Two residents of Bowman ask for a streetlight for Bowman, as it is not safe for their children to walk down the street at night. The Police Cruiser Car travels down the street at 30 mph and the Police Officers do not see what is going on.

October 1945 – Eight special constables are appointed for the night of Halloween, they receive \$3.00 - \$4.00 for their work.

November 1945 – Mr. L. G. Barnes of 217 Neil tells Council that because new homes are being constructed on the site of the former ice rink on Trent he asks for a new site for an ice rink. He asks for a vacant piece of land just south of Sydney, which can be used for an ice rink and a playground in summer.

November 1945 – Mr. Harper of 539 Greene asks if East Kildonan's Engineer J. W. Battershill can survey a straight line because the ditch behind his house is in the middle of the lane.

November 1945 – East Kildonan is to invest \$8,000.00 in the 9<sup>th</sup> Victory Loan Campaign.

November 1945 – The East Kildonan Community Club ask for a streetlight near the Melrose Hall on Melrose (Kimberly). Council is also told that the club has collected \$1,000.00 from residents but it has already spent \$800.00 leaving \$200.00 in cash. It requires a minimum of \$80.00 per month for caretaking, heating and lighting. It has a membership of 149 boys and 125 girls.

December 1945 – The watermain on Greene Avenue for the water standpipe is to be built from Roch to a point 600 feet east at a cost of \$1.19 per foot.

December 1945 – Council sells 338 Leighton Avenue for \$2,100.00 and 408 Bowman for \$2,150.00.

December 1945 – Water standpipes are now installed at the corner of Roberta and Brazier and 600 feet east of Roch on Greene.

January 1946 – Reeve W. P. Larsen, Councillors T. Sorley, G. Suttie, F. W. Dryden and E. Boyd.

January 1946 – It is reported that trees and rubbish have been dumped on Munroe Avenue.

January 1946 – Council sells  
180 Leighton for \$3,200.00  
164 Helmsdale for \$2,800.00  
331 Roberta for \$1,200.00

January 1946 – There are reports of a prowler stalking the streets of East Kildonan for the past 6 weeks.

February 1946 – Several residents of the 200 block of Chelsea complain that a woman in their block is having men visit her home and paying her for immoral activities. Council orders that this woman's activities be stopped immediately.

February 1946 – Father K. J. Kennedy of St. Alphonsus Church asks for the use of the Roxy Grounds for the Casey Shows but he is told to seek an alternative site as this land is being sold and construction of new homes will begin this Spring.

February 1946 – The East Kildonan Community Club tells Council that they have launched a membership drive and now they have members from the whole Community.

February 1946 – Council sells 126 Roberta for \$1,000.00.

February 1946 – Bicycle licenses remain at 50 cents per year.

February 1946 – East Kildonan begins the process of taking over title to the Morse Place Labour Hall for tax arrears.

March 1946 – Council is informed that the house of prostitution on Chelsea Avenue has been closed and the woman living in the house has left East Kildonan.

March 1946 – Council sells 531 Melbourne for \$2,000.00.

March 1946 – Melting snow has flooded parts of Morse Place; this is almost an annual problem in the low-lying area of Morse Place.

April 1946 – Water taps are established on Prince Rupert opposite Salisbury School and at the corner of Prince Rupert and Wallace (London).

April 1946 – A water tap is to be built on Montrose (Nottingham) east of Gateway.

April 1946 – The cost of building a concrete sidewalk on the north side of Munroe from Watt to Gateway is estimated to cost \$2,530.00. The Public Utility Board turns down East Kildonan's desire to build this sidewalk.

April 1946 – The first block of Munroe east of Gateway has 4 hours on the south side and 7 houses on the north side.

April 1946 – The cost of a pair of eye glasses for someone on relief is \$6.50.

April 1946 – The Greater Winnipeg Sanitary District levy for 1946 is \$1998.16.

April 1946 – East Kildonan employees working on tax matters are to be paid \$1.00 per hour for overtime.

April 1946 – There are complaints about the large amount of firewood piled between Washington and Ottawa along Watt Street. There is so much wood that it is piled on the roadway of Washington Avenue.

April 1946 – Concrete sidewalks are advertised for local improvements for the following streets;

1. The north side of Oakview from Henderson to Brazier
2. The north side of Jamison from Brazier to Roch
3. The north side of Melbourne from Henderson to Brazier
4. The south side of Winterton to Roch
5. The north and south sides of Jamison from Roch to Watt
6. The south side of Bowman from Roch to Watt
7. The south side of Washington from Henderson to Brazier
8. The north side of Linden from Henderson west to the end of the 100 block
9. The south side of Government from Grey to Wallace (London)
10. The south side of Moncton from Gateway to Grey
11. The south side of Canterbury Place from Henderson to Kildonan Drive

April 1946 – Council asks the Municipal and Public Utility Board for permission to construct a concrete sidewalk on the north side of Munroe from Watt Street to Gateway. This request is turned down. Council also asks for cinder sidewalks on

1. Montrose from Gateway to a point 800 feet east.
2. Consol from Wallace to Besant
3. The north side of Oakview from Watt to the first 6 lots in the 600 block

These requests are approved.

May 1946 – Council decides that the telephone in the Fire Hall can only be used for emergency calls.

May 1946 – Mr. F. Lange representing the Prince Edward Legion asks for the use of the grounds behind the Legion, to operate volleyball, horseshoe pitches and a softball ground on the east side of the grounds.

May 1946 – Mr. Mike Wozniak of 491 Washington complains of materials being stolen from his woodyard on Washington east of Watt. His garage at home has been broken into and an electric drill stolen.

May 1946 – Daylight Saving Time begins on May 12.

May 1946 – Tenders are called for the installation of sewer and water on Donald Avenue.

May 1946 – The crossing of the C.P.R. tracks on Munroe at Gateway is reported to be in a very poor condition. The police report that 2 cars have gone off the roadway there.

May 1946 – Neil Avenue is opened all the way to Brazier Avenue.

May 1946 – East Kildonan provides a grant of \$50.00 to the Winnipeg-St. Boniface Harbour Commission.

June 1946 – A new engine is ordered for the police cruiser, the old engine is using 2 quarts of oil per day.

June 1946 – Steve Claus of 625 Oakview asks for a sidewalk and gravel for his block.

June 1946 – June 10 1946 is observed as the King's Birthday and is declared a holiday.

June 1946 – Mr. H. A. Leigh the Secretary-Treasurer announces he is resigning as of August 31 1946. East Kildonan advertises for a competent man at a starting salary of \$200.00 per month.

June 1946 – Council declares formally that Returned Veterans have preference on all building lots in East Kildonan.

June 1946 – Council orders the shack known as 210 Linden moved to an empty lot on Linden east of Watt.

June 1946 – Council retains the price of \$1.00 for lots on streets served by sewer and water but raises the price of other lots. Lots that were \$1.00, \$2.00 and \$3.00 per foot frontage are raised to \$2.00, \$4.00 and \$6.00 per foot frontage.

June 1946 – Gravel is placed on Melbourne east of Watt.

June 1946 – Chief of Police Coley retires after over 32 years of police service, for 30 years he was the chief of police. For many years he was the only police officer and with his other duties he worked 17-hour days.

June 1946 – There is a complaint that a resident of Prince Rupert Avenue is using a vacant lot on Government Avenue to store lumber.

June 1946 – Council hears that an unauthorized well has been dug at the corner of Linden and Watt.

June 1946 – Council receives 29 applications for the position of Secretary-Treasurer.

July 1946 – Mr. Byars is offered the position of Secretary-Treasurer at \$237.50 per month.

July 1946 – Council tells the Public Utility Board that it disapproves of its decision to reject any further sewer and water projects for the Morse Place area.

August 1946 – A letter comes to council from the school board about a new school site for a high school.

August 1946 – S. McPhail is given an increase from 75 cents per hour to 90 cents per hour for collecting garbage and night soil in Ward Three (Morse Place).

September 1946 – The East Kildonan Community Club takes over the responsibility for supervising all East Kildonan community rinks.

September 1946 – The Greater Winnipeg Water District levy is set at \$7,667.41 for 1946.

September 1946 – East Kildonan reduces its debt by \$109,500.00 by making its largest debt repayment yet.

September 1946 – A large number of rats are seen behind the Shop-Easy Store at Ottawa and Henderson.

September 1946 – There are complaints about the number of chickens in the 600 block of Munroe. One resident at 626 Munroe is reported to have over 200 chickens. The by-law governing chickens, says one can only keep enough chickens for their immediate family needs.

September 1946 – Melrose Avenue is ditched on the north side of Melrose Avenue (Kimberly) from Gateway to a point 1200 feet east.

October 1946 – The police make plans to get a 2-way radio for the cruiser car.

October 1946 – The Kildonan Ski Club is to be built at the foot of Bronx Park.

October 1946 – East Kildonan's equalized assessment is set at \$2,781,000.00 for 1946.

October 1946 – Council receives a proposal for a hotel at the corner of Ottawa and Henderson.

October 1946 – Eight temporary constables are approved for Halloween.

October 1946 – The School Board asks council to set aside land for a high school. The school board is interested in the Bronx Park land. Council asks the school board to consider a site adjoining Neil Avenue between Henderson and Brazier.

October 1946 – The School Board asks council to station police constables at all 4 schools on Halloween. Council says it can not have constables at the schools for the entire evening.

October 1946 – Mr. D. Hewitt of 305 Leighton asks for cinders to be placed on Brazier and Leighton. He tells Council he has been driving across the grounds of Lord Wolseley to get around but the Police have now stopped him from doing this.

October 1946 – The East Kildonan School Board asks Council to consider instituting a tubercular test for all residents of East Kildonan.

October 1946 – A postage meter machine is purchased for \$240.00.

October 1946 – An application for sewer and water for the 200 block of Oakview is referred to the Public Utility Board.

October 1946 – Retired Secretary-Treasurer H. A. Leigh is to be given a retiring allowance of \$2,693.00.

October 1946 – G. J. Russell is appointed Acting Chief of Police at \$160.00 per month.

October 1946 – The membership fees for the Kildonan Ski Club are  
Life Membership - \$10.00  
Yearly Membership - \$3.00  
Junior Membership - \$1.50  
The Manitoba Ski Club is to provide coaches and the ski building is to be 40 feet by 60 feet.

October 1946 – All hospital accounts incurred prior to 1926 are now to be considered uncollectable.

November 1946 – The pump at 442 Linden Avenue is reported to be contaminated.

November 1946 – Council sells 541 Henderson Highway for \$2,000.00.

November 1946 – East Kildonan announces that it will join the proposed health unit that will include North Kildonan, West Kildonan, Old Kildonan, East St. Paul and West St. Paul. The unit will consist of 1 director, 1 sanitary engineer and 1 nurse per 5,000 population. The total cost is estimated to be 33 cents per capita.

November 1946 – Residents of Morse Place want the old Morse Place Labour Hall used for a community club.

November 1946 – East Kildonan's engineer recommends a site along Neil between Henderson and Brazier as the site of East Kildonan's high school.

November 1946 – Adele Mayer of 504 Dunrobin complains about the poor condition of the roadway in her block.

November 1946 – The Canada Credit Reporter Ltd is given the contract to collect delinquent accounts.

November 1946 – A case of diphtheria occurs at Lord Wolseley School.

November 1946 – The Imperial Bank tells Council that there would not be enough business in East Kildonan to set up a bank branch (There are no banks in either East Kildonan or North Kildonan).

December 1946 – Mr. Robinson Secretary of the Prince Edward Legion tells Council that veterans can not afford the \$9,000.00 to \$10,000.00 homes being built in East Kildonan. He asks for 100 wartime homes to be built in East Kildonan for veterans.

December 1946 – The Municipal Hall is now valued at \$6,500.00.

December 1946 – A. Horsfall resigns as East Kildonan's Accountant.

December 1946 – Council decides to purchase a first aid kit for the Police Cruiser Car.

December 1946 – The rental for 860 Kildonan Drive is set at \$20.00 per month.

December 1946 – A small tot ice rink is to be flooded at the rear of 128 Helmsdale.

January 1947 – Reeve W. P. Larsen, Councillors G. Suttie, F. W. Dryden, C. H. Vickers and Thomas Armstrong.

January 1947 – Tax collections for 1946 were \$222,335.62 as compared to \$220,526.77 for 1945.

January 1947 – Council tells the Kildonan Ski Club that rules banning people of Jewish background will lead to council rescinding its use of municipal land.

January 1947 – Municipal employees receive increases of \$10.00 a month for salaried employees and 5 cents per hour for hourly employees.

January 1947 – East Kildonan asks the R.C.M.P. for what cost it would take over patrolling East Kildonan.

January 1947 – The Roxy Theatre asks for an uniformed police officer to be stationed in the theatre on Mondays and Friday nights.

January 1947 – East Kildonan's share of the new Health Unit is to be \$2,972.97.

January 1947 – There are 22 applications for the position of Chief of Police.

January 1947 – Mr. D. S. Cummings is appointed as Accountant for a trial period to March 31 1947 at \$140.00 per month. If he is found to be suitable his monthly salary will be \$160.00 per month after March 31.

January 1947 – The Greater Winnipeg Sanitary District levy is set at \$2,206.96 for 1947.

January 1947 – G. J. Russell is appointed the new Chief of Police at a salary of \$170.00 per month.

January 1947 – East Kildonan discontinues selling vacant lots for \$1.00. Lots now sale for \$2.00, \$4.00 and \$6.00 per foot per lot.

February 1947 – A resident at 293 McLeod runs a power saw day and night interfering with radio reception of his neighbours.

February 1947 – East Kildonan requests 50 war time homes to be built in East Kildonan.

February 1947 – Council gives permission for a developer to build houses on all the vacant lots on Hazel dell and Leighton Avenue from Henderson to Kildonan Drive. The developer is responsible for all costs for sewer, water, sidewalks, fire hydrants and streetlights.

February 1947 – The Kildonan Ski Club denies it practices any form of discrimination.

February 1947 – Council is to sell 135 Rossmere Avenue for \$3,260.00.

February 1947 – Mr. D. S. Cummings resigns as East Kildonan's Accountant but he continues as Clerk at \$110.00 per month.

February 1947 – J. Clay resigns as Public Works Foreman.

February 1947 – The price of Souris Coal is set at \$8.45 per ton.

February 1947 – F. Weedon resigns as Caretaker of the Municipal Hall and F. Prokopiuk is appointed in his place at \$110.00 per month.

February 1947 – M. Swindlehurst is appointed as a Police Constable at \$130.00 per month.

February 1947 – Council approves a developer's plans for Dunrobin Avenue to construct homes on all vacant lots west of Henderson to the River. The developer agrees to pay for all costs as in the previous agreement on Hazel dell and Leighton.

February 1947 – J. E. Barton is appointed as the Accountant at \$200.00 per month.

February 1947 – The water meter at Salisbury School # 1 bursts due to the fact that there is no heat in the building.

February 1947 – Lights are to be installed at the skating rink on Munroe at a cost of \$62.00.

February 1947 – J. W. Battershill is given a car allowance of \$42.50 per month.

March 1947 – The Greater Winnipeg Water District Levy is set at \$7,228.01 for 1947.

March 1947 – East Kildonan's equalized assessment is now \$2,918,965.00.

March 1947 – East Kildonan's population is now estimated to be 9000.

March 1947 – Developer makes a proposal to develop the Raleigh Family land located on Henderson between Leighton and Lay Avenue (Moir).

March 1947 – East Kildonan Council turns down a request by municipal workers for a 40-hour workweek.

March 1947 – The 50 wartime homes are all to be built in Morse Place.

March 1947 – Council is told that the Provincial Government will spend \$1,900,000.00 on education in 1947. The East Kildonan School District will receive \$45,685.00 of this amount.

March 1947 – Council approves the Casey Shows for Bronx Park as a fundraiser by the Women's Auxiliary of St. Stephens Church to pay off the mortgage.

March 1947 – East Kildonan's share of the operating costs of the Greater Winnipeg Planning Commission is \$465.00. The Commission was set up in 1945.

March 1947 – The total assessment on 482 Sydney is \$930.00.

March 1947 – Council reserves land on Chelsea Avenue, east of Roch for a site for an elementary school and a junior high school.

March 1947 – Constable J. I. Walker is promoted to a newly created position Sergeant.

March 1947 – Retired Chief Constable Coley is given a retiring allowance of \$1,000.00. Retired Public Works Foreman J. Clay is given a retiring allowance of \$800.00.

March 1947 – The Winnipeg-St. Boniface Harbour Commission is given a grant of \$65.00.

April 1947 – The Lockport Bridge closure greatly increases the traffic on Henderson Highway.

April 1947 – The construction of the wartime houses are to begin in May 1947.

April 1947 – The East Kildonan Community Club has put in swings, sandboxes and teeter-totters on their land east of Henderson Highway on Melrose (Kimberly). They ask Council to level Bronx Park for a baseball diamond.

April 1947 – The price of wood for relief purposes, white poplar \$11.25 per cord uncut and \$12.25 per cord cut.

April 1947 – Those working for the Municipality of East Kildonan now number 46.

May 1947 – A developer asks permission to develop a parcel of land on Kildonan Drive in the Hazel Dell Avenue area.

May 1947 – The Bank of Montreal tells Council that there is not enough business in East Kildonan for it to set up a bank branch.

May 1947 – The chief of police and another constable are sworn in as provincial constables giving them additional authority in federal and provincial laws.

June 1947 – Streetlights are approved for Montrose between Henderson and Brazier and on Consol, Wallace (London), and Ottawa east of Watt, Donald and Brazier and on Kildonan Drive at Canterbury Place.

June 1947 – The total East Kildonan School District levy is \$68,063.65.

June 1947 – The Morse Place Community Club asks for permission to construct a building.

July 1947 – The East Kildonan Kiwanis Club agrees to do a TB survey of all the residents of East Kildonan.

July 1947 – Radio Oil asks for an option on 15 acres of land on the north side of Munroe in order to expand their premises.

July 1947 – Watermains are constructed on Brazier from Melbourne to Chelsea and between Henderson and Brazier on the most heavily populated block not yet having water. Water taps are established on Government Avenue and Roberta Avenue.

July 1947 – Miss Buchan is hired as the Public Health Nurse for East Kildonan.

July 1947 – Mr. T. Sotham of 405 Greene speaks on behalf of a group of residents who petition for sewer and watermains on Greene and Roberta east of Henderson Highway. He tells Council this part of the municipality is not getting the right amount of attention. He has lived in East Kildonan for 36 years and his parents lived in East Kildonan when the Indians were still here.

July 1947 – The service station at Melrose and Henderson is allowed to move its gas pumps so that traffic is allowed to enter from Henderson rather than Melrose.

July 1947 – There are complaints that some of the vacant lots in the 400 block of Greene and Roberta are high with thistles.

July 1947 – North Kildonan requests some fire protection from East Kildonan for the part of North Kildonan south of Springfield Road.

July 1947 – A new horse is bought for sidewalk repair at a cost of \$75.00.

August 1947 – A 30-watt transmitter is purchased for the police cruiser car at a cost of \$825.00.

August 1947 – The Canadian Legion Golf Club asks whether East Kildonan would consider a golf course on Parish Lots 68-75 (Rossmere Country Club). Residents of East Kildonan would be allowed to play but the course would be restricted to veterans only on the weekends.

August 1947 – Council is told that now that the City of Winnipeg's Nuisance Ground is now closed a lot of dumping from the City of Winnipeg is occurring at the East Kildonan Nuisance Grounds on Melrose (Kimberly). As the East Kildonan Nuisance Ground is restricted to East Kildonan residences and businesses a man is to be employed to stop this illegal dumping.

August 1947 – The cottage at 860 Kildonan Drive is to be sold for \$416.40 and then torn down. A new \$10,000.00 house is to be built on the site.

August 1947 – H. A. Sells of 240 Melbourne complains about the state of the backlane between Henderson Highway and Brazier.

August 1947 – The Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire I. O. D. E is given permission to hold a tag day.

August 1947 – The Winnipeg Electric Company cuts back service on the streetcar service; service is now ended at 1 AM. East Kildonan protests the cutback in hours of service.

August 1947 – An annual fee of \$50.00 is instituted for businesses such as barbershops, beauty shops, boot and shoe repair, plumber shops and tailor shops.

August 1947 – A bulldozer breaks the concrete sidewalk of the new subdivision on Hazel Dell.

August 1947 – It is reported that human waste is being dumped in the lane near Munroe and Henderson.

September 1947 – The water service charge to connect the wartime houses to the watermains is \$53.00 per house.

September 1947 – The police car is involved in an accident when it runs into a parked car.

September 1947 – The 5 policemen and 4 firemen are authorized to request calls to be transmitted over the City of Winnipeg Police Radio System.

September 1947 – The drunken owner of a truck is found lying in the ditch at Munroe and Grey. The police take him home and an unlicensed driver drives the truck home.

September 1947 – The water pipe serving Morse Place is deemed to be too small to meet the growing demand for water.

September 1947 – The East Kildonan Kiwanis Club purchases a 2 victim oxygen inhalator for the fire hall.

September 1947 – Rats are reported to be a problem in areas where chickens are kept.

September 1947 – Complaints reach council that rubbish is being dumped on Consol Avenue.

September 1947 – East Kildonan complains that trucks from Winnipeg are dumping garbage and filth on the highways of East Kildonan.

September 1947 – Residents complain that Radio Oil trucks are speeding on Watt St.

October 1947 – Streetlights are established at Oakview and Watt, Linden and Watt, Linden between Roch and Watt and 2 streetlights on Dunrobin in the new subdivision west of Henderson.

October 1947 – Washington Fuel is to build a new office at Washington and Watt.

October 1947 – The Municipal Office is to be remodeled at a cost of \$5,000.00.

October 1947 – East Kildonan reserves sites for new school grounds

1. Roberta west of Woodlawn (Woodvale) 5 acres
2. Leighton Avenue at Roch 2 acres
3. Helmsdale at Roch 7.7 acres
4. Munroe at Roch 3.25 acres
5. Melrose (Kimberly) at Brazier 5 acres
6. Fleming at Wallace (London) 6 acres

October 1947 – Other land is set aside for a playground at Melrose and Roch 7.7 acres, for a proposed golf course 180 acres and land is set aside for a Municipal Hall between Henderson and Brazier 6 acres.

October 1947 – Eight special constables are to be hired for Halloween to combat possible trouble.

October 1947 – Mr. Thomas Tchorowski of 626 Munroe is in violation of the planning regulations for too many chickens on his property. Council is also told that he has a vicious dog and 2 white goats, which are molesting people on the street.

November 1947 – Wartime houses are to be turned over from the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation Construction Department to the Property Manager Mr. A. Fitz.

November 1947 – The Caretakers in the schools are given \$3.00 for their extra work on Election Day.

November 1947 – Council purchases a 1948 Henderson Directory for \$20.00.

November 1947 – East Kildonan residents are encouraged to contribute to the Princess Elizabeth Gift Committee; the wedding is to take place on November 20 1947.

November 1947 – The East Kildonan School Board asks for a loan from the Municipality of East Kildonan.

November 1947 – The police purchase a used stretcher for \$8.97.

November 1947 – A water standpipe is to be installed at Government and Wallace (London).

December 1947 – The Prince Edward Legion asks for an additional 50 Peacetime Homes to be built in East Kildonan for veterans.

December 1947 – Mr. R. Kilpatrick of 253 Melbourne tells Council his home was broken into and the response of the Police was unacceptable. The officer arriving told him he was so busy that he hadn't had time to smoke so he lighted up a cigar. He pointed out the finger prints and other clues but the officer ignored him

December 1947 – Council advances the East Kildonan School Division \$20,000.00 on its 1948 levy.

December 1947 – All houses on streets with new watermains are to be charged 42 cents per foot frontage from 1948-1953.

December 1947 – The new clubrooms of the Prince Edward Legion open officially on December 22, 1947.

January 1948 – Reeve J. L. Bodie, Councillors F. W. Dryden, C. H. Vickers, T. Armstrong and W.T. Snowdon

January 1948 – Agents for the collection of water bills and sewer rental charges  
K. Morgan - 833 Henderson Highway  
W. Obirek – 498 Jamison  
William Anderson - 770 Moncton  
Roxy Pharmacy – 341 Kelvin (Henderson Highway)  
W. Lakey – 380 Brazier

January 1948 – The salary for Miss Shirley Manns is increased to \$80.00 per month.

January 1948 – The cost of installing new streetlights is \$320.00 per streetlight and \$53.00 per year to operate.

January 1948 – The premises known as 1025 Henderson Highway is to be turned into the Kildonan-St. Paul Health Unit and the Unit is to pay \$65.00 per month in rent after the building is renovated at a cost of \$3,000.00. The Unit will have a doctor and 4 nurses. Baby clinics are to be held in churches and schools.

January 1948 – New prices for municipal lots for sale are, unimproved lots (without sewer and water) \$1.00, improved property (with sewer and water) \$2.00, improved property in town planning area \$3.00, Henderson Highway \$6.00, riverbank at least \$10.00 per foot frontage.

January 1948 – The lease for the East Kildonan Community Club on Melrose (Kimberly) is extended for 20 years. East Kildonan Kiwanis Club is to do the landscaping, help put in a permanent rink structure for skating and hockey to a value up to almost \$2000.00.

January 1948 – New pipes are put into the shack at the Chelsea rink.

January 1948 – Trent Avenue is to be gravelled in the spring from Watt St. to the power lines. Melbourne is to be gravelled from Henderson to Brazier at a cost of \$105.00. Streetlights are put in at Henderson and Melbourne and at Consol and Besant.

January 1948 – Council is told that if the R. C. M. P. were to take over the police duties for East Kildonan it would provide 1 policeman for each 1,500 population, thus providing 6 men and 2 cruiser cars. The costs would be \$1,200.00 per man and each single man would have to be provided with accommodations. East Kildonan would have no control of the R. C. M. P. for police discipline or appointment.

January 1948 – Council asks the R. C. M. P. for help locate wife deserters from East Kildonan.

January 1948 – Council is to purchase 3 typewriters at a cost of \$406.71.

January 1948 – Police radio calls are now made through the R.C.M.P radio system.

February 1948 – Reports reach council of obscene language and very obscene practices being carried out at the Prince Edward Legion.

February 1948 – Hourly East Kildonan employees receive a 5-cent per hour increase while salaried employees receive a \$10.00 per month increase.

February 1948 – Safeway Stores tell council that it is interested buying property on the east side of Henderson Highway between Melrose and Bronx.

February 1948 – Council appoints a notary public for East Kildonan.

February 1948 – The total East Kildonan School Board Budget for 1948 is \$143,428.00. Of this \$68,063.65 comes from the school levy.

February 1948 – Chief of Police Russell is given a phone allowance of \$3.00 per month while Sergeant Walker is given an allowance of \$5.00 per quarter.

February 1948 – The estimated value of 247 Melrose (Kimberly) is \$2,000.00.

February 1948 – East Kildonan considers contracting out garbage removal. The estimated costs would be 2 trucks at \$1.50 per hour and 4 men at 70 cents per hour for a cost of \$12,437.10 per year.

February 1948 – Council is purchase its own fuel tanks and pumps for gasoline and fuel oil to save money.

February 1948 – Council is told that some residents of North Kildonan are stealing water from East Kildonan standpipes.

February 1948 – There are concerns that some members of the fire department are too old to fight fires properly.

February 1948 – The estimated cost of sewer construction  
Brazier from Linden to Greene - \$4,050.00  
Brazier from Dunrobin to Helmsdale - \$4,050.00  
Greene from Brazier to Henderson - \$4,500.00

February 1948 – East Kildonan gives a grant of \$42.00 to the Winnipeg-St. Boniface Control Board and \$65.00 to the Winnipeg-St. Boniface Harbour Commission.

February 1948 - The Chief of Police is given the authority to suspend any member of the Police Department at his discretion and he is to notify the Public Safety Committee in writing of the detailed reasons for the suspension.

February 1948 – Miss Alice Tompkins resigns her position.

February 1948 – The East Kildonan Community Club announces plans to move from the southeast corner of Melrose (Kimberly) and Henderson Highway to Bronx Park. The East Kildonan Kiwanis Club is willing to grant \$2,000.00 for the beautification of the grounds and the new building.

February 1948 – Council tells Canada Safeway that it is willing to sell the soon to be abandoned East Kildonan Community Club grounds to it for \$2,500.00.

February 1948 – There are numerous reports of area school children thumbing rides on Henderson Highway. The principals of Lord Wolseley School and Prince Edward School are told to tell their children not to thumb rides.

February 1948 – Sixty-Peace Time homes are to be built under the federal government plan. The homes are to be built on Melbourne, Sydney, Trent, Melrose (Kimberly), Washington, Oakview and Government.

February 1948 – Mr. B. Moonay offers \$10,000.00 for land on the east side of Henderson Highway south of McLeod for a hotel.

February 1948 – The R. C. M. P. tells Council it is unable to enter into an agreement with East Kildonan for policing because it has a manpower shortage.

March 1948 – A new Chevrolet car is purchased for the police department at a cost of \$1,759.32 minus a trade in of \$1,373.00.

March 1948 – A developer plans to build homes on Melrose (Kimberly) west of the highway. He signs a deal to put in all services, sewer and water, concrete sidewalks, streetlights etc.

March 1948 – Radio Oil Company makes a proposal to buy 33 more acres of land for their oil refinery on Munroe.

March 1948 – The 50 wartime houses built in 1947 are sold to veterans.

March 1948 – The food allowance for relief recipients is increased by 10%.

March 1948 – The Fire Hydrant at Roberta and Henderson is wrecked by a taxi of the Black & White Taxi Company who is ordered to pay to replace the hydrant.

March 1948 – Council adds 2 extra councillors and changes the ward boundaries for the fall elections. There is to be a second Councillor for Ward Two and part of Ward One and Ward Two is to become a new Ward to be known as Ward Four.

March 1948 – The budget for the Kildonan-St. Paul Health Unit is set at \$20,531.00 for 1948 with East Kildonan's share being \$3,003.00.

March 1948 – There are reports of a number of households in the Watt St. area involved in gambling and bootlegging.

March 1948 – Concrete Sidewalks are approved for both sides of the streets for

1. Melbourne from Roch to Watt
2. Dunrobin from Henderson to Brazier
3. Oakview from Henderson to Brazier

April 1948 – East Kildonan agrees to come to North Kildonan fires for a rate of \$25.00. North Kildonan agrees to pay the City of Winnipeg to come to a fire in East Kildonan if the East Kildonan fire department is already fighting a fire in North Kildonan.

April 1948 – A new garbage truck is purchased for East Kildonan for the price of \$5000.00.

April 1948 – The Liquor Control Commission turns down an application for the proposed hotel for Henderson Highway and as a result the project is shelved.

April 1948 – The Police Radio frequencies switch from AM to FM as the R. C. M. P. switches to a different system.

April 1948 - Reeve Bodie on a visit to the Police Office at the Fire Hall finds the office unlocked with no officers present but two Firemen and a stranger in the office. The Reeve sees confidential police reports from the City of Winnipeg Police and the R. C. M. P. visible for anyone to read. Chief of Police Russell is ordered to have the door locked when there are no offers presents and keys are to be issued to all of the Policemen but to no one else including members of Council.

April 1948 – The East Kildonan Municipal Budget for 1948 is \$214,000.00 and the East Kildonan School District Budget for 1948 is \$103,473.37.

April 1948 – Mr. Campbell Taylor of 228 Montrose (Larsen) President of the Morse Place Baseball Club is told he can use the planks used for the hockey rink in the winter for the backstop for the baseball diamond.

April 1948 – Two old skating rink buildings at the corner of Trent and Roch are sold for a total of \$45.00.

April 1948 – A watermain is to be constructed on Dunrobin from Henderson to Brazier at a cost of \$3,495.00. A sewer is to be built on the same street at a cost of \$3,984.00.

April 1948 – Mr. F. Cockriell the Public Works Foreman is given a car allowance of \$10.00 per month.

April 1948 – The Prince Edward Legion is given permission to hold a tag day.

April 25 1948 – A emergency meeting of the East Kildonan Council occurs on a Sunday to discuss measures to deal with the rising Red River which is at its highest point since 1916. Dikes are built along Kildonan Drive and on Rossmere Avenue from Woodlawn (Woodvale) to Leighton. Additional rings are placed around rings in the low-lying areas. Council sets aside up to \$3000.00 for flood fighting.

April 1948 – Streetlights are approved for Neil and Brazier, Henderson and Dunrobin, Leighton and Kildonan Drive and on Bowman in the middle of the block between Henderson and Brazier.

May 1948 – The head of the Council is now called Mayor instead of Reeve. Mayor Bodie is the first man to hold that title.

May 1948 – The Public Works Staff are to work 9 hours per day during the summer months on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursday, 8 hours on Fridays and 4 hours on Saturdays. Council also decides that the Municipal Offices will only be open from 9 AM to Noon on Saturdays and only be open 9 hours per day from Monday to Friday.

May 1948 – An Emergency Flood Relief Committee is formed for Greater Winnipeg

May 1948 – Mr. Paul Devisscher of 550 Sydney tells Council he wants to build a bowling alley on Henderson Highway 50 feet by 120 feet along with a coffee shop and a soda bar.

May 1948 – The Morse Place Community Club tells Council that unless sewer and water is installed on Munroe from Gateway to Grey the site of the clubhouse should be on Prince Rupert where the skating rink is located in the winter.

May 1948 – Residents complain that the basement excavation at 313 Linden is filled with 5 feet of water. Council gives the owner 3 days to pump out the water or else Municipal Staff will fill in it and his option on the property will be cancelled.

May 1948 – Council approves a partial basement for 210 Linden.

June 1948 – June 7 1948 is declared a legal holiday for the King's Birthday.

June 1948 – Gurvey's Pharmacy is made an agent for the collection of water bills and sewer rental charges.

June 1948 – Mr. Corbett of 240 Montrose complains to Council that when he went to purchase a bicycle license at the Fire Hall there were no constables to sell him one. There were 2 Firemen there but they were too busy to sell him one and they told him to 'bugger off'.

June 1948 – The Police investigation of the caretaker at Prince Edward School finds nothing wrong so he is reinstated.

June 1948 – The services of Mr. Reed are dispensed with and Miss Shirley Manns is transferred to the Water Department at a salary of \$87.50 per month.

June 1948 – A reserve Company of the Winnipeg Grenadiers is to be formed in East Kildonan.

June 1948 – Canada Safeway is to pay \$6,650.00 for land on Henderson Highway between Melrose (Kimberly) and Bronx. The land has a frontage of 245 feet on Henderson Highway and a depth on Melrose of 120 feet and a depth on Bronx of 266 feet.

June 1948 – Former Chief Constable Thomas is to receive a further \$550.00 retirement gratuity.

June 1948 – The American Lutheran Church offers to purchase the Melrose Hall along with a further 100 feet of property for \$6,000.00. In the meantime it is to rent to the hall for church services for \$50.00 per month.

June 1948 – Concrete sidewalks are approved for

1. North side of Jamison from Brazier to Watt
2. South side of Winterton from Brazier to a point 267 feet east
3. South side of Melbourne from Brazier to Roch
4. South side of Montrose from Watt to the east end
5. South side of Helmsdale from Henderson to a point 230.6 feet east
6. West side of Henderson from Kildonan Drive to Canterbury
7. South side of Greene from Henderson to Kildonan Drive

June 1948 – East Kildonan Council tells the police department it is not happy with the policing in East Kildonan. It asks why the police are not always available when they are needed.

July 1948 – Property at the corner of Fleming and Wallace (London) is added to the Salisbury School playground.

July 1948 – Council decides the position of Police Sergeant is not necessary so Sergeant Walker is reduced to the level of Constable. Walker resigns from the Police Department in protest.

July 1948 – Mr. G. Robinson is appointed as Relief Officer at a salary of \$160.00 per month.

July 1948 – The scrub along the sidewalk in front of Lord Wolseley School is cleared out.

August 1948 – Ads are placed in local newspapers asking for applications for men 21 to 30 years old for the Police Department.

August 1948 – East Kildonan is to contribute \$195.00 to the Winnipeg and St. Boniface Harbour Commission for a high speed boat with a 2 way radio and loud speaker for river patrols.

August 1948 – North Kildonan asks East Kildonan to transfer the south side of Oakland to North Kildonan.

August 1948 – Miss E. S. Preston is hired at a salary of \$110.00 per month.

August 1948 – Council decides to hire a member of the Corps of Commisionaires for temporary police duties at a wage of 70 cents per hour.

August 1948 – Rev K. J. Kennedy of St. Alphonsus Church asks for East Kildonan to give the Parish 225 feet of land east of the Church for a new school at no charge. Council asks \$100.00 for the land.

August 1948 – J. W. Battershill is relieved of his duties as Assessor so he can concentrate on his duties of Engineer of Public Works.

August 1948 – The East Kildonan Kiwanis Club is given permission to hold a tag day on September 18.

August 1948 – The St. John Ambulance Brigade is to form a unit in East Kildonan.

August 1948 – Miss Clara L. Forrest resigns from the East Kildonan staff.

September 1948 – D. S. Cummings is appointed Assessor of East Kildonan at a salary of \$180.00 per month.

September 1948 – There are 35 applications for the position of Police Constable.

September 1948 – The East Kildonan School Division asks Council to present a \$150,000.00 money by-law to the voters.

September 1948 – Mr. G. Pritchard is appointed to the Fire Department at a salary of \$130.00. He is hired after E. Edberg is fired after he walked off the job during a fire.

September 25 1948 – The west side of Henderson between Bronx and Chelsea is closed for a street dance party.

September 1948 – A watermain is approved for Oakland between Henderson to Roch, North Kildonan pays half the cost.

September 1948 – St Alphonsus Church plans to build a new school and it asks the East Kildonan Council to exempt it from taxes.

September 1948 – Lanes are opened on the north sides of Helmsdale, Dunrobin, Oakview, Hazel Dell, and Linden and on both sides of Leighton from Brazier to Golspie.

September 1948 – A watermain is approved for McLeod from Henderson to Roch.

September 1948 – A piece of land is transferred to St. Stephen's Church.

September 1948 – The water standpipe is moved to just east of Brazier on Chelsea.

October 1948 – It is reported that cars and trucks are driving across the school grounds of Prince Edward School.

October 1948 – The Morse Place Labour Hall is sold to the St. Alphonsus Roman Catholic Parish and is to be moved into Elmwood.

October 1948 – The East Kildonan Community Club announces its plans to turn over full control of the Melrose Hall to the American Lutheran Church as of September 1 1949. The Club plans to build a building worth \$20,000.00 capable of seating 500 people.

October 1948 – A new Public Works and Fire Department Building consisting of a 2-storey building 50 feet by 70 feet is proposed. Council asks for new plans to be developed to include the Police Department.

October 1948 – Council is again to hire 8 special constables for Halloween. The special constables are to be paid \$4.00.

October 1948 – East Kildonan's equalized assessment is now \$3,355,000.00.

November 1948 – The water taps at Dunrobin and Brazier and on Hoskin Avenue are removed.

November 1948 – The Victorian Order of Nurses ask for a grant of \$200.00, the cost of each visit to a home is \$1.25 but if the patient is destitute there is no charge.

November 1948 – A store is to built at the northeast corner of Sydney and Roch

November 1948 – A Tractor Machine Operator is to be hired for the winter at 85 cents per hour.

November 1948 – Miss J. Taylor resigns from the office staff.

November 1948 – Mr. B. Koper is hired for the Fire Department at \$150.00 per month

November 1948 – Caretakers in East Kildonan schools  
Lord Wolseley – S. Field  
Prince Edward – A. Christie  
Polson – F. Steel  
Salisbury – A. Lilley

November 1948 – Miss S. Klassen resigns from the East Kildonan staff due to ill health.

December 1948 – East Kildonan employees receive a \$5.00 a month increase and a \$5.00 Christmas bonus.

December 1948 – East Kildonan sells the land along Eldorado, Lay (Moir) and Rossmere between Henderson and Woodlawn (Woodvale) to A. M. Tallman for \$2,500.00 to build homes.

December 1948 – East Kildonan requests North Kildonan to have a policeman present when the East Kildonan Fire Department is fighting fires in North Kildonan. Children have been tampering with the fire truck during fires.

January 1949 – Mayor J. L. Bodie, Councillors F. W. Dryden, T. Armstrong, W. Snowdon, G. N. Suttie, E. S. Hanel and O. A. Earle.

January 1949 – Mr. Kotyk the Sanitary Inspector the Kildonan-St. Paul Health Unit is appointed East Kildonan's Sanitary Inspector.

January 1949 – Council pays the yearly membership fees of the Winnipeg Suburban Municipal Association, which have risen from \$10.00 to \$12.00. Council pays the yearly fees of the Union of Manitoba Municipalities, which are \$10.00 per year, and the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities which charges a fee of \$25.00 per year.

January 1949 – The East Kildonan Community Club holds the official opening of its Community Club on January 22 1949.

January 1949 – Constable Swindlehurst is suspended for 2 weeks without pay for not reporting in a timely manner to an accident in front of 284 Montrose (Larsen) on Christmas Eve.

January 1949 – East Kildonan is to have further discussions with the R. C. M. P. over the possibility of having the R. C. M. P. taking over police duties.

January 1949 – East Kildonan's share of the costs of the Kildonan-St Paul Health Unit is \$3,393.35.

January 1949 – East Kildonan protests the increase in the streetcar fares.

January 1949 – The East Kildonan Municipal Offices are broken into but the burglars fail to open the 2 safes.

January 1949 – The number of letter carrier delivery routes is increased as streets are developed.

January 1949 – The Public Works Department gets a new truck.

January 1949 – The school board tells council that schools in East Kildonan are getting very crowded.

January 1949 – There are more reports of hitchhiking by area students along Henderson Highway especially at 1 PM.

January 1949 – North Kildonan is now charged \$35.00 for fire calls looked after by the East Kildonan Fire Department.

January 1949 – Low rental Peacetime housing is requested for Sydney between Roch and Watt, Melrose between Henderson and Brazier and Munroe between Gateway and Grey.

January 1949 – Private driveways are being plowed by East Kildonan staff at a cost of \$1.00 for short driveways and \$2.00 for long driveways.

February 1949 – Sewers are approved for Brazier from Greene to Roberta, Roberta from Henderson to Brazier and a watermain is approved for Roberta from Henderson to Brazier.

February 1949 – The Mayor's indemnity is now \$50.00 per month while Councillors make \$37.50 per month.

March 1949 – Council is to purchase a 10,000-gallon per hour pump for flood control at a cost of \$375.00.

March 1949 – East Kildonan is to contribute \$250.00 towards the Greater Winnipeg Anti-Mosquito Campaign.

March 1949 – The Morse Place Community Club is given permission to construct a recreational building.

March 1949 – A fire starts in the Morse Place Streetcar Shelter at 2 AM but this time the fire is started by a wiring problem in the electrical heater.

March 1949 – Mr. B. Moonay asks for a new option on land for a hotel. The new proposal calls for a 20-room 40 by 100-foot hotel.

March 1949 – Miss S. Manns is let go for unsatisfactory work. Mr. L. Kulchycki is hired in her place at \$115.00 per month.

March 1949 – Council grants a tag day to the East Kildonan Scholarship Foundation Fund.

March 1949 – Council agrees to sell the Municipal Hall site for \$2,750.00 in order to build 2 apartment blocks once a new Municipal Hall is built.

March 1949 – The Imperial Oil Company makes a proposal to purchase land at the northeast corner of Dunrobin and Henderson for \$3,090.00 for a new service station.

Council makes it a condition that the present station and building at the northwest corner of Melrose (Kimberly) and Henderson be removed.

March 1949 – The East Kildonan Masonic Temple Association is to purchase land for a hall near Henderson Highway.

March 1949 – East Kildonan asks the local MLA W. Doneleyko to oppose proposed Provincial Legislation that would prohibit Daylight Saving Time.

March 1949 – Radio Oil asks East Kildonan to purchase 43.16 acres of land at \$140.00 per acre for an expansion to their oil refinery. This proposal would require Munroe to be closed from the Powerlines to Gateway within 3 years.

March 1949 – All available empty lots on Hazeldell between Henderson and Brazier are sold to A. M. Tallman for \$1.00 per lot for new homes. Mr. Tallman is to construct a sewer, a watermain and construct a concrete sidewalk on the north side of Hazeldell.

March 1949 – East Kildonan sends a telegram to Newfoundland welcoming the Province to Canada.

April 1949 – East Kildonan cancels its lease with the Lutheran Church over the use of the East Kildonan Community Hall. East Kildonan makes arrangements with the Imperial Bank of Canada to set up temporary quarters there while Imperial Bank builds a branch at Melrose and Henderson.

April 1949 – The Eastern Division Community Club (East End) on Montrose (Larsen) asks for the land to be designated as a park site. They wish to improve the playground by building a baseball diamond, hockey rink, install swings, sandbox and fence in the site. They also wish to install sewer and water in the building.

April 1949 – Mr. Paul Devisscher is to sell the diary at 550 Sydney to Mr. J. W. Wiens who is to turn the property into a chicken ranch.

April 1949 – S. Mallin is given permission to operate a bicycle sales and service store at 851 Henderson Highway.

April 1949 – Council announces it will transfer its banking business to the new East Kildonan Branch of the Imperial Bank when it is open for business.

April 1949 – Mr. Paul Devisscher announces he will begin construction of his bowling alley when construction materials are available.

April 1949 – Summer office hours for the Municipal Hall, Monday to Friday 9 AM to 5:30 PM closed Saturdays.

April 1949 – It is reported to council that the railway ditch near the Morse Place streetcar shelter is full of newspapers.

April 1949 – East Kildonan old age pensioners confined to institutions are to see their incidental allowance raised from \$3.00 to \$3.50 per month.

April 1949 – The East Kildonan School Board asks for a 4-room addition to Lord Wolseley School for strictly elementary students at a cost of \$55,000.00. It also asks to build a new 8 room collegiate between Roch and Watt and Trent and Sydney facing onto Roch at a cost of \$185,000.00. The board wants the new collegiate to have a partial basement with an auditorium in the basement and 8 classrooms above on the second floor. It is to house Grade 9, 10 and 11 students. If the voters approve the money by-law the Lord Wolseley expansion can be completed by Christmas 1949 (It is defeated by the voters).

April 1949 – L. Kulchyski 's salary is increased to \$125.00 per month.

April 1949 – J. Willis President of the East Kildonan Community Club asks for permission to hold the Casey Shows on the grounds of Bronx Park.

May 1949 – East Kildonan signs development agreements to develop Helmsdale between Henderson and Brazier, Chelsea and Bronx from Henderson to Brazier. There is also an option to develop in 1950, Melrose, Bronx, Chelsea and Helmsdale from Brazier to Roch and to develop Hazel Dell from Henderson to Brazier. The developers agree to put in all services at no cost to East Kildonan.

May 1949 – The Canadian Co-Operative Implements Ltd ask for the site of the Eastern Division Community Club (East End) to expand their property.

May 1949 – Council offers to sell the Melrose Community Hall to the East Kildonan Masonic Temple Association Ltd for \$6,000.00.

May 1949 – East Kildonan is to buy a Champion Power Grader for \$17,000.00.

May 1949 – There is a rat problem in parts of East Kildonan.

May 1949 – The Radio Oil Company proposal to close Munroe Avenue between the Powerlines and Gateway to expand their property is opposed by a petition signed by 2172 residents.

May 1949 – The R.C.M.P. tells council it can not enter into an agreement to provide policing in East Kildonan as it has a shortage of officers.

May 1949 – The East Kildonan Municipal Council tells the East Kildonan School Board that it should look into a site bound by Roch and Watt and Melrose and Chelsea as a site for its new collegiate. The School Board still wants to build on the site between Trent and Sydney.

May 1949 – Plans are made to widen Henderson Highway between Washington and Ottawa.

May 1949 – Council hires N. Partyka a 3<sup>rd</sup> year engineering student for the summer at \$125.00 per month. Leslie Lovasz is hired as a Water Meter Reader at \$125.00 per month he is to replace Mr. A. Atkinson who has resigned.

May 1949 – Mr. J. R. Crawford, Mr. Fry and Mr. Lindsay ask for a concrete sidewalk in front of their homes on Kildonan Drive.

May 1949 – As of May 15 1949 construction has begun on 88 new homes for 1949 at an estimated construction value of \$535,750.00 an average cost of \$6,088.00 per home. As of May 15 1948 construction had begun on 53 new homes with an average value of \$5,896.00 per home.

May 1949 – East Kildonan along with Winnipeg and other suburban municipalities announces that they will hold referendums of whether citizens are in favour of daylight saving time.

May 1949 – A sewer is to be built on Munroe between Gateway and Grey at a cost of \$3,420.00, a watermain on the same street is to cost \$3,591.00. A sewer is to be built on Melrose (Kimberly) from Henderson to Brazier at a cost of \$3,851.10.

May 1949 – Bangs Disease is reported in the herd of the Morse Place Dairy.

May 1949 – A telephone booth is established at Hazel Dell and Woodlawn (Woodvale).

June 1949 – Council tells the East Kildonan School Board that the property between Chelsea, Melrose and Roch and Watt is assessed at a value of \$22,450.00 but it is willing to sell the property to the school board for \$7,180.00. The site contains 8.752 acres.

June 1949 – Mr. Paul Devisscher tells Council he is unable to get any money from the mortgage companies to build a bowling alley but he asks for permission to build a snack bar and suite until money becomes available.

June 1949 – The Glenwood Development Company asks Council to raise the value of homes in the development west of Henderson Highway from \$7,000.00 to \$12,000.00.

June 1949 – A fire caused by arson is reported at the Morse Place streetcar shelter.

June 1949 – East Kildonan pays \$2.50 per day for its residents living in nursing homes.

June 1949 – A new store is approved for Oakview and Brazier.

June 1949 – The School Board informs council that it will need the room in Polson School presently being used as a health clinic for a classroom for the bulging school.

June 1949 – Council approves the plans for the new St. Alphonsus School.

July 1949 – H. L. Gelfant is given permission to build a dental and medical office at the southeast corner of Henderson and Oakview.

July 1949 – A petition is circulated among the residents in the vicinity of 453 Montrose complaining about the residents of 453 Montrose.

July 1949 – No dumping signs are to be placed at Melrose (Kimberly) and Birds Hill Road (Panet), Munroe and Birds Hill Road, Munroe and Roch and at Munroe and Besant.

July 1949 – The salary of the Confidential Secretary Miss Edith Preston is raised to \$150.00 per month.

July 1949 – The East Kildonan Kiwanis Club is given permission to hold an apple tag day.

August 1949 – The Public Utility Board turns down plans for the new collegiate. The school board asks the council for help in trying to change the decision.

August 1949 – The School Board tells council that a door to Prince Edward School was left open. It asks why the police did not discover the door open on their police rounds.

August 1949 – Council is told that Polson School sits on a school site of 1.91 acres and will have to be rebuilt to take care of the growing school population. It asks for land bounded by Roch, Watt, Munroe and Trent to be set-aside for a site for a future school. The School Board also tells Council that it have to stagger the hours for students in September 1949 unless it can obtain space in church basements.

August 1949 – A dry cleaning plant is approved for 598 Washington.

August 1949 – D. S. Cummings resigns as Acting Assessor, J. C. Stacey is appointed in his place at a salary of \$2,250.00 per year. Miss E. S. Preston is appointed Assistant Secretary Treasurer at a salary of \$2,100.00 per year. Miss Estelle Hoski is hired at a salary of \$115.00 per month, if her performance is satisfactory she will be paid \$125.00 per month.

August 1949 – The Eastern Division Community Club is now known as the East End Community Club.

September 1949 – The Canadian Corps of Comissionaires are paid 75 cents an hour for work in East Kildonan.

September 1949 – An agreement is signed to develop Winterton from Brazier to Roch.

September 1949 – The Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire are given permission to hold a tag day.

September 1949 – Mr. George Mathieson is hired as an Assessment Inspector at a salary of \$150.00 per month.

September 1949 – Robert C. Kirk resigns as the weekend caretaker.

September 1949 – The School Board advises Council that it does not carry any public liability insurance. Council tells the school board that its insurance does not cover the schools in East Kildonan.

September 1949 – A developer brings plans for a new Drive-In theatre on Henderson Highway. This will become the Eldorado Drive-In Theatre.

September 1949 – A proposal for a hotel beside the Drive-In Theatre on Henderson is made to Council. This hotel will be called the Curtis.

September 1949 – A mouse is found in the well at Linden and Watt.

September 1949 – A motion is passed at council to ask for the proper wording of a possible referendum dealing with amalgamation with the City of Winnipeg.

October 1949 – A water standpipe is approved for Munroe east of Grey.

October 1949 – The East Kiwanis Club is to run a Tuberculosis Clinic from November 22-30 1949.

October 1949 – Council drops plans to hold a referendum regarding the possible amalgamation of East Kildonan into the City of Winnipeg.

October 1949 – Council is told that there are still 21 public wells in East Kildonan.

October 1949 – J. O. Hornibrook is hired as the weekend and relief Caretaker for the Municipal Office.

October 1949 – Jim & Bet's Snack Bar is given a license to operate a fish and chip shop at 809 Henderson Highway.

October 1949 – The Victorian Order of Nurses is given a grant of \$200.00.

October 1949 – Miss Anne Cuff of 271 Munroe is given permission to operate an infant's home.

October 1949 – The sidewalk is reported to be in poor condition in front of Lord Wolseley School.

October 1949 – Wallace (London) is to be opened from Munroe south to the City of Winnipeg boundary.

October 1949 – Imperial Oil makes a proposal to purchase land for a service station at Dunrobin and Henderson.

October 1949 – Eight special constables are hired for Halloween night.

October 1949 – Drunken Partygoers cause damage to property on Watt St. as they leave Ukrainian halls on Watt St at Montrose and Jamison and Watt

October 1949 – Approval is given for a snack bar at 809 Henderson Highway.

November 1949 – A 1950 Henderson Directory is to be purchased for \$35.00.

November 1949 – Mr. Gordon Phillips of the East Kildonan Ratepayers Association brings forward a petition signed by over 1,000 people ask for 10 minute interval streetcar service instead of the present 15 minute service.

November 1949 – Council is told that a large amount of vandalism is being done to the Peace Time Homes in Morse Place and on Washington Avenue.

November 1949 – The water standpipe on Munroe is moved east to in front of 701 Munroe.

November 1949 – Mr. P. Ranchuk is to take over the collection of garbage and night soil collection in Morse Place with his team of horses at \$1.25 per hour.

November 1949 – The One Big Union is to become the bargaining agent for East Kildonan employees and East Kildonan School Board Staff.

December 1949 – Council signs an agreement with a developer to develop Munroe from Brazier to Roch.

December 1949 – Council denies the request of the East Kildonan Ski Club to lower the riverbank at Bronx and the Red River by 3 feet.
