The ribbon, cut by the Premier in opening the building, was a tartan of the Glengarry clan, with which Macdonell was connected. Officials attending wore ribbons of the same tartan.

Among those attending was H. L. Carter, a former school trustee, who is on a visit here from Toronto.

A plaque honoring Miles Macdonell hangs on the left side of the foyer facing a map of the district of Assinibola on the opposite wall. The district is the tract Macdonell received from the Hudson's Bay Company.

The map was prepared by H. G. Beresford of the Department of Mines and Natural Resources. A photostat of the original grant of title to the tract was secured by J. L. Johnston, provincial librarian, and will be placed in the Collegiate library.

The Hudson's Bay Company donated the four pictures which hang in the hall the foyer runs into. These were selected by Clifford Wilson, librarian.
