

Co-op Board Picks Site In East Kildonan For New Shopping Centre

Final negotiations for Greater Winnipeg's second Co-op shopping centre, located on Henderson Highway opposite the Curtis Hotel, should be completed this week.

The Red River Co-op Board of Directors, at the March 21st meeting, authorized the expansion committee to complete negotiations with the Arnovitch and Leipsic real estate firm pending agreement on rental minimums agreed to by the board.

The new Co-op centre would be constructed by the real estate firm and leased to Red River Co-op on a 20-year basis. This procedure is almost exclusively followed by supermarket chains.

The new Co-op centre would comprise 20,000 square feet of store space. The Co-op centre at Ellice and Wall comprises some 30,000 square feet.

Services at the new centre would include groceries, meats, produce, drugs, hardware and coffee bar. There would also be a three-bay Co-op service station on the property.

Two McLeod avenue residents appeared before North Kildonan Council at a recent meeting to protest the widening of that portion of McLeod avenue that lies in North Kildonan.

One resident told Council he would lose his trees and hedge which he valued at \$500.

Council said that McLeod, like other streets in the municipality, would have to be widened for the installation of such service as sewer and water.

The portion of McLeod in North Kildonan runs from the tracks to Highway 59 and will be widened from its present 45 feet to 66 feet.
