

Watt Street Bus Service To Extend To Morse Place

"Is it getting near Christmas?" asked Councillor Suttie in reaction to news that the Watt st. bus would make trips to Morse Place and the Transit Commission would level out a hump on the old car track site on Watt st. which is a nuisance to motorists.

Councillor Suttie made the remark at the Monday East Kildonan Council meeting after letters were read from the Greater Winnipeg Transit Commission. He commented that it was a welcome surprise to find the transit body co-operating with Council as often in the past the transit body had found it necessary to refuse various requests.

Replying to a Nov. 25th letter from the municipality asking for continuation of the Watt st. bus line to Gateway Road in order to serve Morse Place, the Transit Commission said the service would consist of a number of trips in the morning and afternoon.

It made it clear that the service was of an experimental nature and it would see how many people use the bus.

The service started Monday and is as follows:

Monday-Friday, bus leaves Johnson and Kelvin at 8.25, 8.34, 8.45, 9.21, 10.51 a.m. and 1.51, 2.51, 3.51, 4.06 p.m.; bus leaves Gateway and Munroe at 8.33, 8.42, 8.51, 9.30, 11.00 a.m. and 2.00, 3.00, 4.00 and 4.15 p.m.

Saturday, first bus leaves Kelvin at 9.21 a.m., other trips as above; first bus leaves Gateway at 9.30 a.m., other trips as above.

The first three buses in the morning from Monday to Friday are especially convenient for students attending Salisbury School instead of Polson due to overcrowding. The other buses are convenient for shoppers.

It was moved the Transit Commission's letter be acknowledged with appreciation.

The Commission also said by letter that the hump on Watt st. near the city limits would be remedied. The bad spot is in the center of the road on the site of the old car tracks. The result is a jolt for some motorists because Watt st. in the City of Winnipeg is higher where the car tracks have not been removed, and the road does not gradually slope down to the lower level of the road where the tracks have been removed.

The difference in levels is near the city limits due to the fact that the tracks were taken up in East Kildonan but not in Winnipeg.

Kildonan Council Approves Removal Of 4 Outdoor Taps

Outdoor taps will be dismantled at four locations in East Kildonan following approval by Council of a recommendation from the engineer. The taps are not being used, according to Mr. Battershill.

They are at Bronx and Henderson, Hazeldell and Henderson, Roberta and Brazier, and Oakview between Brazier and Roch.

Councillor Armstrong said there was a standpipe at Grey and Munroe which was used by only one resident who did not have sewer and water.

He said he believed sewer and water facilities were desired in this case and asked that the party concerned be contacted for arrangements about the installation of these facilities. If they did go in, the standpipe could then be removed.
